Election of Weekly Staff This Month

Balloting to be Held Last Week in April

Candidates Appointed by Publication Board

One of the most important events of the year will take place the last week in April when the new staff of the "Collegian" will be elected.

Altho this will be only the second staff that will be elected for the weekly the interest which characterized the election of the now obselete "Purple and Gold" has carried over and students are now speculating upon the possibilities for the 1923-24 staff. As the present weekly occupies a position of even greater importance in school life than the monthly the need of electing an adequate and efficient staff has increased.

Certain difficulties are sometimes encountered in the selection of candidates for the offices of Editor and Business Manager of the weekly by means of the point system which was adopted by the faculty last year. According to this system each activity in which a student is engaged is rated at a certain number of points, depending upon the nature of the work and the time required for its completion. No student is allowed to carry over twenty-five points and candidates that might otherwise be forwarded are apt to be disqualified on those grounds.

Selection of Candidates

Three years ago the College adopted the "by-laws and regulations for the management of student publications" by which elections are governed. This provides that the Editor-in-Chief and Business Manager be elected by the student body from candidates nominated by a committee composed of one representative from each organized class, one representative from the retiring staff and a committee of five from the faculty. This year the members who are elected will work with the present staff for the last five issues in order to become accustomed to the nature of the work of the publication so that they will be able to assume their full duties at the opening of the next school year.

Mode of Election

The candidates for the Queen of the May are limited to the three upper classes. No candidates are forwarded but the selection is made by the use of the preferential ballot. According to this plan each student has four choices-a first, second, third and fourth. The girl receiving the largest number of first choices or a certain number of second and third choices is regarded as selected. This system is especially designed for use when there is no limit to the number of candidates and insures a fairer election than if the honor was awarded merely upon the basis of first choices. The balloting will take place at Chapel time on next Friday, April 13. Former students who have been honored by selection as May Queen are not allowed to be considered as contenders for the honor this year.
