Ashland Graduate Receives Honors

Charles L. Anspach Elected to Honorary Society at University of Michigan

One of Three Successful Out of Thousand

Charles L. Anspach, a graduate of Ashland in the class of 1918 and who is well known among the students and friends of the College, was the recipient of the highest honor that can be conferred upon a post-graduate at the University of Michigan when he was elected last week to the honorary fraternity of Phi Delta Kappa. Mr. Anspach was one of three out of one thousand applicants who were eligible for election.

Anspach, after graduating from this institution, engaged in post-graduate work here and is now taking his Master of Arts degree at the University of Michigan.

There are two honorary fraternities among the large universities to which membership is very select. One, the Phi Beta Kappa, admits only undergraduates and the other, Phi Delta Kappa, of which Mr. Anspach is now a member, draws its membership from the fields of literature and education and from graduate students as well as undergraduate students. The nature of both organizations is the same. The membership is strictly limited and a thesis must be submitted and an examination taken before a board at the University where the honor is conferred. Scholarship is the essential qualification in both organizations.

Two other men who were admitted with Anspach are both doing extension work at Michigan and are both members of the faculty at that university. One was Prof. H. J. Sundwall, M.D., Ph.D., and the other was Prof. E. E. Sutherland, M.A.

Some of the prominent men before whom the examination was taken were: Dr. Freeman, Dean of the Department of Research, University of Chicago, Dr. Sutherland, Dean of Department of Psychological Research, Los Angeles, California; Dr. V. A. C. Henmon, Dean Department of Edgettion University of Wisconsin and Dean

Murray Secures Six Big Games

Coach Contracts with Three
Ohio Conference Teams
Mt. Union to Play Here
for Stadium Opener

Ashland May Enter Northwest Ohio Conference

Coach Murray has been busy the last week scheduling football games for the 1923 season. On Friday of last week he attended the meeting of the coaches and managers of the Northwestern Ohio Conference and on Monday he was present at the fall meeting of the Ohio Conference at Columbus.

Six games have already been scheduled as the result of Murray's efforts. Of the six games three are at home and three are to be played on foreign gridirons.

Three Ohio Conference Games Scheduled Ohio Conference teams are contracting for very few games with non-conference teams for the next season. The games secured by the schools which are not in the Ohio Conference were few and Ashland can attribute the three games which are on her 1923 schedule to her record in the past for clean playing and good sportsmanship. The reason that the Conference mentors give for not scheduling more games with outside schools is that the other teams in the conference are wont to claim that they are picking on easy marks so that they will have more chance to win honors in the Conference.

The three Conference teams which appear on the schedule are: Wooster, game to be played at Wooster on September 29; Mt. Union, game to be played at Ashland on October 13; and Baldwin-Wallace, to be played at Ashland on October 19.

The Meant Union game will be the yener for the Athletic Field and the Baldwin-Wallace game has already been designated as the Home Coming Contest. Baldwin-Wallace, it will be remembered, dropped out of the Ohio Conference a few years ago but application was made at the recent meeting for re-admittance and was excepted.
