Team Will Play During Vacation

Basketball practice has been going on smoothly this week. The squad has been cut down to fifteen men. These men have been showing the stuff that goes toward the making of a winning team. By the time this article has been published the varsity squad will be known, and the game with Kent on Thursday night will give Coach Murray a line on his material in action.

Many playing combinations are being tried and it is hard to tell just what five will start the Kent game. The team has gone into strict training for this is the hardest schedule Ashland has ever undertaken. To make it a success and to make it come up to the standard of other collegiate endeavors, the men must keep themselves fit physically.

Not until after the holiday recess will the students and basketball fans of Ashland College have the opportunity to witness an Ohio Conference basketball game on Ashland's floor. Kenyon comes here on January 19th. On Christmas afternoon the varsity will play the Ohio Brass quintet, industrial champions of Mansfield last year. On New Year's Day the Korner Klub of Wooster will be with us again. Those who remember that thrilling 26-25 game of last year will not want to miss this game.

Will Be Completed This Winter

When school opens in the fall of 1923 another addition will have been added to Ashland's growing equipment. Although there is not a sufficient sum of money on hand to complete the proposed stadium the work has already begun. It is at least assured that future Ashland grid men and their opponents who come to Ashland to play, will not have to play upon a stony and uneven field. The new field will be perfectly level, well drained and sodded.

The Phillips Contracting Co., of this city is doing the work of excavation at a minimum of cost. The soil is reported to be soft with few stones and the excavation and leveling is proceeding rapidly. The preliminary work will be done within two or three weeks. It will be continued regardless of the cold weather.

As soon as all the dirt that has to be removed is removed, the ground will be drained and leveled off. Large tile are to be run the whole length of the field and smaller tile will add to its facilities for carrying off the water. An attempt will be made to drain the new field well enough so that in event of a rainy day the field will not be too wet for playing.

The ground will be seeded in March. With care in the summer the grass will be heavy enough by fall to afford a good playing surface.

Field to be Fenced

The arrangements for the fencing of the field are not complete. It has not been decided as to the fence which will surround the stadium. The matter as to whether the fence should be of boards or wire is under consideration and may not be decided until the close of school in the spring.

The new stadium will be a large asset to the College from all indications. A conference team has already been scheduled to play the opening game. This fact alone is significant because heretofore teams of the Ohio Conference were reluctant to play at Ashland because of the poor playing field.

Plans for the layout of the new stadium are yet somewhat indefinite. The field will probably not be so much of a stadium as at first was supposed. The actual playing field will be set down from the level of the surrounding ground at least three feet, however.

Rev. Baer Says Control of Self is Hardest Struggle

Rev. George Baer, Editor of The Evangelist, delivered the morning sermon at the chapel last Sunday. He preached on the topic of the "Conquest of Self."

His first few remarks were to show the importance of the topic and to prove that few ever pay any attention to it in spite of its universal worth. He told how men were being challenged the world over by great tasks but that the greatest of these was the conquest of self.

"No task is too hazardous for men to attempt but the largest receives the least attention," he said. "The selfish man finds it hard to share his comforts with others and the indulgent man finds it hard to deny himself the comforts of life," he argued. "He shuns the displeasures of life," he continued.

"It is a hard task to conquer self for habits are hard to break. It is hard to keep sweet in all circumstances but loss of control cheapens one in the sight of others."

"On every hand, there are material things to satisfy passions. Temptations are strong and make it hard to subject one's self to high and holy things," he said.

"No true success is attained till we have attained success in this life. Great men have been unable to control themselves," he said. He showed how Alexander, Napoleon and Caesar had met disaster because they were unable to control self. "You may conquer wealth, power, position, and science but you have not attained success until you have conquered Self," he asserted.

His next phase was to offer a solution to the problem which he did by saying that we may control self through the Grace of Christ. "Paul controlled Self by this means, so why cannot we do likewise?" he said in closing.

The three Conference teams which appear on the schedule are: Wooster, game to be played at Wooster on September 29; Mt. Union, game to be played at Ashland on October 13; and Baldwin-Wallace, to be played at Ashland on October 19.

The Mount Union game will be the opener for the Athletic Field and the Baldwin-Wallace game has already been designated as the Home Coming Contest. Baldwin-Wallace, it will be remembered, dropped out of the Ohio Conference a few years ago but application was made at the recent meeting for re-admittance and was accepted.

The other three games on the schedule are with Dayton, Bowling Green and Defiance. Dayton is to be played here on Thanksgiving. Both Defiance and Bowling Green will be played in their own back yards. Bowling Green on November 10, and Defiance on November 17. Both of the latter teams are members of the Northwestern Ohio Conference.

Ashland May Join Northwestern Conference

When Coach Murray was at the meeting of the Northwestern Ohio Conference at Toledo last week he received a cordial invitation to have Ashland join the Conference. This Conference is at present composed of Toledo University, Defiance College, Findlay College and Bowling Green State Normal. All of the members are located in the northwest portion of the state and if Ashland enters she will be the most distant school in the conference.

Each year the colleges in this Conference play among themselves a specified number of games and at the end of the season a championship is awarded to the team with the highest standing.

This project will be placed before the Athletic Committee of the College and their decision will be announced later.

Out of State Teams to be Scheduled

An attempt will be made to play out of state teams next year. Some Indiana College and a Pennsylvania College will, in all probability, be on Ashland's schedule for 1923.
