

Dr. L. S. Bauman Brings Missionary Addresses

Dr. L. S. Bauman, a prominent preacher and evangelist of the Brethren church, paid the College a welcome visit during the past week and gave two stereopticon lectures on his recent visit to South America as well as spoke to the students in chapel Tuesday morning. Dr. Bauman for the past three months has been engaged in evangelistic meetings in the east having held successful campaigns in the cities of Washington, D. C., Hagerstown, Maryland, and Louisville, Ohio. He also visited the Brethren Mission school at Lost Creek, Kentucky and held a meeting there. Now he is on his way to Long Beach, California, where he is pastor of the First Brethren church.

South America Seen

The first of the stereopticon lectures was given in the chapel at eight o'clock Monday night. In this lecture the life of the South Americans was beautifully portrayed. Their high state of culture and attainment was impressively shown. The slides which Dr. Bauman presented were exceptionally clear and

beautifully colored. The terse, pointed comments of the speaker who a short time ago was in South America, were very interesting and instructive. On the following evening the second lecture was given. The theme of this lecture was "What is the matter with South America?" The seamy side of South American life as it is found in the region of the Argentine was depicted. The answer to the question asked in the theme of the lecture was shown to be the domination of the Roman Catholic church. Dr. Bauman spoke convincingly against the corruption and atheism for which the Catholic church is largely responsible. At the close of his address he said that every American should appreciate more than he does the citizenship which he holds in the United States. The stars and stripes should mean more to him when he considers the awful conditions which prevail in a land where Catholicism has full sway.

Ashland attempts three more passes and is held for downs. Adrian takes the ball and fails to gain. Kirk punts to Curry who returns to Adrian's thirty-seven. Curry, Weber and Wileox gain two yards. Baylor attempts a field goal from the thirty-five yard line and misses. Adrian takes the ball on twenty. Kirk gains eleven yards on a line plunge. Kirk again bucks the line to Ashland's thirty-four yard line. Kirk gains ten more. Adrian attempts two passes and Wharton intercepts on the twenty-four. Ashland is penalized for holding and Weber punts from the thirteen yard line. Adrian receives on fifty and returns to thirty-nine. Kirk brings the ball to Ashland's nineteen yard line. Adrian throws an incomplete pass back of goal. Ashland starts off on Adrian's twenty and is pen-
