School Suspends When Boiler Leaks

Students Get an Impromptu Vacation Because of Cold Rooms

Classes at Ashland College were suspended Thursday and Friday of last week when the new boiler which heats Founders' Hall sprung a freak leak. The leak was discivered by the caretaker, Dad Petit, at about 11:30 Wednesday morning when it was leaking badly and threatening to extinguish his fires. He immediately called the workmen of the 3. F. Donley engineering company to repair the break. They continued work until late Saturday evening when it was again declared fit for use.

"The cause of the defective section was due to the presence of core sand in the interior of the section. I cannot see how the section held up as long as it did," Mr. Bernherd, the designe of the furnace declared upon investigation Monday. His investigation revealed he fact that when the section was east, the workmen neglected to remove the core sand and the intense heat caused this to dilate to such a degree that a crack over a foot long resulted.

Immediately upon discovery of the leak, the B. F. Donley Engineering Company began work on the similar furnace which will be used with the other one in the task of heating both the old building and the new building. The discovery of a defective section at midnight Wednesday caused them to give up all hope of repairing the furnace for school the next day and classes were forced to be suspended.

The furnace is so constructed that the break in about the middle of the machine necessitated the tearing down and rebuilding of nearly one-half of the boiler. To get to the defalcation, it was necessary to move ten sections of not make weight considerably over a half ton each. The task of refitting these sections after the leak was repaired was one which demanded much patience and skill. Each section had to be so perfectly fitted to the adjacent section so that not the slightest amount of water could seep through between them. Some of the sections required chipping with a chisel to make them fit snugly. The

Murray Men Take Easy Game From Normalites

Ashland won easily over Bowling Green Friday night here, 41 to 37 in a fast but somewhat loosely played game. Close guarding was not in evidence as the score indicates.

McClintock opened the scoring for Ashland with a shot from under the basket, while Bachman started the Bowling Green offense in motion by a ringer from near the foul line. Ashland clearly displayed their superiority early in the first half by running up a comfortable margain. The second half the Purple continued to outplay them, although Ashland's guarding grew hax late in the period giving Bowling Green several easy baskets.

Every man that saw action in the game shared in the scoring, McClintock and Wood led in field baskets with six apiece. Wood had the best of the center battle, repeatedly outjumping his man. Captain Curry was somewhat hampered by the presence of three personal fouls to his credit on the scorebook. Kellogg was at his usual form at guard. Hastings and Miller did good while they were in.

One feature which might be said marred the game as an exhibition of good basketball, was the inability of the members of both teams to catch the ball. Probably this might have been due to the frigid atmosphere, which was undoubtedly a source of discomfort not only to players but to spectators as well. Charles Weber made his first appearance on the varsity squad. He plays a forward position and has uncanny ability to eage the ball from almost unbelievable angles.

Ashland displayed much better shooting than the normalites. Ashland made 8 out of 32 long shots and 11 out of 24 short shots. Bowling order took more shots than Ashland. They made 7 out of 58 long shots and 5 out of 19 short shots. The upstaters had the ball out of bounds 28 times to the Purple's 17.
