To Take Preparatory Course Goes to Africa from There

Graduate of Ashland In Class '19

January 17, on the French ship "Paris" Rev. Florence Bickel of Elkhart, Indiana, graduate of Ashland in the class of '19, sailed for Frence where she will take a brief course in a French Bible Institute prior to her going to Africa as a missionary of the Brethren church.

Miss Bickel is a girl of sterling qualities. During her four years at Ashland College she distinguished herself as an energetic, enthusiastic and devoted whole-heartedly to the service of her Master. She was always active in Y. W. C. A. and in the Student Volunteer Band. She was a member of the Philomathean literary society and for some time President of the House Council.

Hospital Training

Miss Bickel is a graduate nurse. She has spent three years in training at Elkhart General Hospital and Cook County Hospital in Chicago, all but three months of which time she was at Elkhart. Her training in the Bible Institute in France is primarily for the purpose of becoming more familiarly acquainted with the French language.

During her stay she addressed the Student Volunteers, the World Fellowship Club and the College students in Chapel. CHAUTAUQUA LECTURER SPEAKS AT CHURCH

Prof. Gomer of Anti-Saloon League Tells Benefits of Prohibition

Henry D. Gomer, popular writer and lecturer for the Radeliffe Chautaugua and a man of experience in the Educational field, lectured in the College Chapel at the regular Sunday morning service, January 14 on the subject of the "Status of Prohibition as the Present."

Mr. Gomer asserted that the success of the Anti-Saloon League in the last election is due to the co-operation in fostering the dry forces of the state. With the victory of the last election the responsibility of the Anti-Saloon league is not ended. The 700,000 who expressed their desire for the return of wine and beer which means the return of the open saloon must be educated. It is now necessary that the League be still more thoroughly organized that the laws will be enforced to a greater

Crime and Business Depression

The speaker clearly showed how the present crime wave and business depression are not due to Prohibition. He recalled that after war, history has always been blotted by such social conditions. It could not be otherwise when so many men trained in the nefarious art of war are released and when business so completely collapses.

Hiram Gets Win In Final Minute

Basket Gives Hiramites 2-Point Margin 31-29

Ashland lost the second Ohio Conference game of the season when Hiram was played at Hiram on Saturday, January 12. The night previous the Purple squad had played at Baldwin-Wallace.

Hiram won the game in the last minute of play with a goal made from a short shot near the basket. The game was hotly contested, neither team having a decided advantage. Ashland took the lead early in the game with a short shot from under the basket and seored a foul basket before Hiram had a point to her credit. Hiram's first four points were scored on foul goals.

The officiating in the game was the best that the College team has played under so far this season. Close attention was paid to personal fouls.

Wood and Kellogg contracted three personal fouls each in the opening period and were forced to retire from the game shortly after the beginning of the second half when the disqualifying foul was called on them.

Ashland Leads at End of First Half

Ashland was in the lead at the end of the first half by four points, the score being 17 to 14. At the opening of the second half Hiram made the first basket but the Purple stalwarts came back with two of their own in rapid succession.

Hiram slowly began to overcome the Ashland lead and forged ahead. Curry and McClintock opened up a battery of shots that tied the score with one minute to play. Time was called and when play was resumed Hiram made the basket that won the game.

Bright of Hiram Stars

Bright, center on the Hiram quintet, was a star on shooting field goals. Curry and McClintock were the best basket getters for Ashland, with five each.
