The varsity basketball team played seven games during the Christmas vacation. These games were played for the most part with various independent teams in the state and were calculated to round the team into shape for the collegiate schedule.

The first game was played at Lorain against the Lorain Y. M. C. A. and was dropped by a score of 40 to 22.

The next was played with the Elyria Y. M. C. A. at Elyria and after a hot contest was won 19-17.

Ashland played the Ohio Brass team of Mansfield in the College gymnasium on Christmas day and won easily over the Mansfield five 41-33.

The Polk Golden Links were next on the roster and the game was played at Polk. Ashland won by good passwork and good shooting by a 43-18 score.

Canton Team Beaten in Good Game

The Canton Grottos, a fast Masonic team of Canton were next played at McKinley High School gymnasium in that city. The game was hotly contested and both teams played superior basketball. Ashland came in strong in the last half and won 31 to 19.

The Korner Klub of Wooster were played on New Year's night on the home floor and were beaten easily 36-17. The Korner Klub with a basket in the last minute had put over a 26-25 win on the varsity last year and the Purple stalwarts were out to show their wares in this game.

Of these six games played during vacation five were victories. They served to give Coach Murray a line on the material out of which he could build this year's varsity and also gave the players valuable experience.

PURPLE TAKES COUNT AGAINST BEREANS

Loses 23-32 In Hard Game At Baldwin-Wallace

Baldwin-Wallace raked Ashland across the board again in a game at Berea when the Purple and Gold lost by a score of 23 to 32.

Ashland got a poor start in the first half and were unable to locate the basket while the Bereans showed good passwork and garnered 19 points, while the Purple gathered but 7.

The long floor to which the Ashland team was unaccustomed proved somewhat of a handicap while strict guarding by the Baldwin-Wallace guards foiled many Ashland short shots.

Ashland exhibited a weakness on defense that proved mortal. The opposing forwards were continually allowed to get behind the Ashland guards and several baskets were made that close guarding would have foiled.

Ashland Makes Good Comeback

The Purple played much better basketball in the second half than in the first. Passes were more accurate and faster and the playing of the team as a whole was much more like a machine.

Entering the second period with a handicap of 12 points the Purple uncorked a volley of shots that added rapidly to their total. In this period Ashland scored 16 points against their opponents' 13.

The game as a whole was rough and slow. Frequent held balls were called and bad passes were thrown out of bounds.

The last three games with Kenyon, Baldwin-Wallace and Hiram have resulted in victories for the opponents of the Purple and have incidentally exhibited some weak points in Ashland's defense.

No apprehension is felt here as to the ability of the Ashland team as two of the three games lost have been by narrow margins. Kenyon got away with a good first half but barely won by three points when the Ashland five came back strong in the last period. Hiram won in the last minute of play after Ashland had led almost the entire game.

Special effort this week has been put on the perfection of the five man defense system. In the two games played last week it was plainly shown that the players had difficulty in shifting from defense to offense.

The Dayton quintet comes here with a good record behind them in this year's games and with almost the entire squad of last year back have had ample opportunity to build up a winning combination.
