More Will Be Honored Next Fall

At the special business session which continued for three hours Wednesday morning, May 9, two new members were elected to the literary and honorary organization of the "Scribes" here.

Herman Koontz of Waynesboro, Pa., was chosen to be one of the honored men and Geo. K. Stone of Ashland, was the other. Both of the new members are Juniors, Mr. Koontz in the Seminary and Mr. Stone in the College of Arts.

Koontz entered here for the second year's work having taken one year at Carnegie Technical Institute at Pittsburgh. Since his entrance here he has been active in the activities of the school. He is at present President of the Junior Class, President of the Y. M. C. A., and has been a member of the Gospel team. Koontz is also a member of the Hesperian Literary Society.

Stone spent his initial college days at the College of Wooster coming here after remaining out of school for about a year. From his entrance at the beginning of last year he has demonstrated marked literary ability. This year he has been the conductor and the original author of "Parnassus Breezes" in this paper. Stone is also a member of Hesperian.

Daily Rehearsals of Entire Cast Being Held

Annual Event Will be Staged on Front Campus

Daily practices are being held at Chapel time for the entire cast and other special rehearsals are held for the episodes in the pageant.

The pageant will be given on the front campus between the Administration Building and the Dormitory. This spot forms an ideal setting for the processional of the queen to the throne and the dances and festivities that take place before the throne after the crowning.

Musical Setting For All Numbers

Musical settings will be used for all of the numbers in the pageant. Music will be furnished by the College orchestra with Mildred Lichty at the piano.

Costumes for the pageant are being made by the Domestic Science Department under the direction of Miss Lillian Mull.

Nearly all of the students in the Special Departments under Mrs. Haun, Miss Brauer and Mrs. Steele will have parts in the pageant. Dances in the pageant are under the direction of Catherine Teeter. The pageant in general is under the direction of Mrs. Steele.

Pageant Will Be Historical

The pageant which will be given before the queen will be of an historical theme. It is divided into five chief episodes.

First will come the episode of Ancient Briton, or The Coming of the Cross. Second, the scenes shown will be of Medieval England, or Bold Robin Hood. Third will come the Colonial Garden Party. The fourth episode will be The Days of '61, and the last scene will be American Triumphant.

This will be the most complete and the most elaborate May Day pageant that has ever been staged here at Ashland. A cast of between sixty and seventy-five will be used.
