

Y. M. PLANNING EXTENSION OF ACTIVITIES FOR NEXT YEAR

Recreation Room and Employment Bureau May Be Provided

The Y. M. C. A. under the leadership of the new President, Herman Koontz, is planning a wide extension of activities next fall when school opens.

One of the innovations will be a men's recreation room in one of the rooms of the Administration Building that will be vacated when classes are established in the new building.

It is planned to fit this room up for general service of all the men of the school under the supervision of the Y. Comfortable chairs will be placed in the room and an attempt made to make this a real value to the men of the school.

Employment Bureau Planned

A telephone will be installed in the room so that messages relative to employment of the men out of school hours will be taken care of. At present these messages from persons that desire men to work for short periods are given to the office of the President and involve a great deal of trouble that will be eliminated if the Y. M. takes the work in charge. Men are sometimes notified about work at the same place and the result is that more than one of the men often apply at the same place. The Y. M. will attempt to place men in such positions and thereby relieve the President's office of this duty and arrange an orderly system of work for the men.

This new plan is one which Y. M. C. A.s of other colleges have had in operation for some time and one which if properly handled will be salutary in many directions.
