Thirteen Students Preparing For Foreign Missionary Endeavor

Africa and South America Are Fields To Be Entered

One of the organizations on the campus which is relatively inconspicuous, according to the publicity which is given it, is the Student Volunteer group of young men and women who are preparing to be missionaries in foreign fields. But despite the quiet nature of their work and preparation these young men and women are examples of the highest type of Christian manhood and womanhood that a Christian college can turn out.

This organization holds meetings every Wednesday evening at seven o'clock in the Administration Building, taking up subjects that aid them in preparing for their work. The discussions at these meetings take up three phases of the missionary work. They discuss: The lives of great missionaries; Local problems in religious education, and General discussion of the needs of the world and the application of their specific work to them.

Organization Active in City

In the last few months the Volunteers have been active in holding services at local churches. Deputation work has been put on at the local Congregational Church, at the Epworth League of the Methodist Church, and at the Colored Mission.

These services are primarily missionary in spirit. Some specific field is discussed and a program given. The program includes several short talks, readings and special music. Miss Harriet Becknell has sung "Sweet and Low" in the language of the African tribes that are now under the missionary influence of the Brethren Church in Africa. Heartly response is always received from the audience at these services.

NEW WIRELESS INSTALLED IN ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

Prof. R. R. Haun, head of the Department of Science, has constructed a wireless in the Science rooms in the first floor of the Administration Building. Programs are listened to every night and come in clearly.

Next week a class in wireless telephony will start to which anyone interested will be given admittance. The class will meet at six in the evening and will cover the fundamentals of wireless. Points that will be taken up are wave lengths, resonance, induction, various types of detectors, the vacuum tube, telephony and a few of the simple circuits.

The aerial is placed on the top of the main building and is splendidly located, free from high tension wires and other elements that hinder in the reception of wireless.

IMPORTANCE OF ENTERING OHIO CONFERENCE URGED

Chapel Speech By Murray On Future Activities

In a Chapel talk Tuesday morning Coach Murray delivered a challenge to the students of Ashland to keep their school up to the standard of other Ohio colleges. He spoke with earnestness and conviction of the future of Ashland and the imperative need of a united support from the student body in all activities.

One of the points that he made was that it is the student activities that helps put colleges on the map. He demonstrated by the use of figures on a blackboard that Ashland is trying to be in the light with colleges that have three and four times as many students enrolled. This, he said, meant that students must put four times as much vim into their support as other students do.
