

Important Questions Discussed at Y. M.

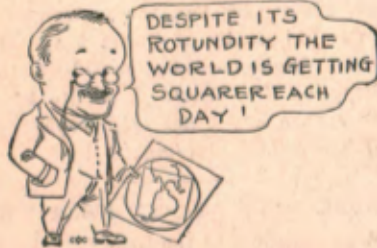
Pfleiderer Leads Meeting

The Y. M. C. A. met Tuesday night, November 14, as a discussion group under the leadership of Florizel Pfeiderer and debated the question: "Is America the hope of the world?"

Right from the first all formalities were thrown aside and a real "old time," "everyone for himself" discussion took place. About the first question raised was, "In what ways is or could America be the 'Hope of the World?'" Some suggested finance, another religion, home life and democracy. Each of these separate phases were taken up and discussed pro and con. Some members of the faculty were present and gave their views, this helped to make the meeting much more interesting.

Mr. Pfeiderer put the following questions before the group:

1. Does the hope of the world center in America?
2. In what respects does the hope of the world center in America?
3. Can any lasting good come from a pleasure mad race?



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4. Is the family life of America a fit example for the peoples of the world?
5. Is there any indication of the deterioration of American family life?
6. Can America be called a Christian Nation?
7. What hope have we for a better world with America indifferent to religion? Or is the religious life of America so deeply seated that it cannot be seen without microscopic examination?
8. If America is the hope of the world, from her present condition what is the hope of the world?

Obviously, upon these questions there was much discussion. Almost every man present took part and all derived some lasting benefit.

ry made three off right and Fox swept off left tackle for eight. Fox made three at the same place. Weber at right guard made three. Weber made one at left. Weber made ten yards off left tackle. Cur-tackle. Wharton at right tackle made another and Fox went over for a score. Fox kicked goal.

Norris again kicked to Warner who was downed on the thirty yard line. Defiance tried three futile plays and punted to Curry on the forty yard line. Curry returned ten yards. A line play and a pass flunked for Ashland and a pass Curry to Weber, made first down. Fox made ten thru center on a play that looked like a stampede. Fox made two off right tackle. A concealed play, Fox to Wharton, left Wharton around right end for twenty yards and put the ball on the ten yard line where Weber zigzagged thru the line for a touchdown. Fox missed goal.

Norris kicked to Bond on the ten and Bond came upstream to the twenty. A Defiance pass failed. Defiance punted to Weber who brought the ball down to Defiance's thirty yard line. Fox and Weber on off tackle bucks gained thirteen yards and Curry made the remaining seventeen off right tackle. Fox missed goal.

Warner caught the kick off on the twelve yard line and navigated to the thirty. Defiance fumbled on the first play and Ashland covered the ball. Fox smashed center for thirteen yards. Wharton slid off left tackle for five. Curry made two at right tackle. Fox made the same at center. Wharton made three at tackle. Curry failed to gain at left guard. Wharton ran right end for the next score. Fox kicked goal.

In the remainder of the quarter Conkey made a fluke kick which O'Neal picked off the ground and made twenty yards with. Score, Ashland 47; Defiance, 0.

FOURTH QUARTER.

Ashland with the ball on their opponent's forty yard line in four plays took it to their fourteen yard line but were penalized fifteen yards for holding. Curry passed twice and both were grounded. Warner intercepted a third pass on his own eleven yard line. Conkey punted out of bounds. Curry passed to Fox for five. Fox off left tackle made eleven before he was stopped. Ashland passed and Miller intercepted and gained ten yards. Defiance was penalized fifteen for clipping. Conkey grounded a pass and hit center for two. Conkey tried to pass but Baylor broke thru and caught him before he got rid of the ball. The punt was attempted on the fourth down and Ashland received the ball on Defiance's seven yard line. Fox off right tackle took the ball over on the first play. Fox also kicked goal.

Norris kicked to Warren who got to the twenty yard line. Conkey tried left tackle with no results and then attempted a pass which Norris blocked. Conkey punted out of bounds. Hatfield, playing his first game for Ashland, found a hole off right tackle and went thru for twenty yards. Hatfield lost three at the other side of the line. Wharton annexed four at right and Fox made one at center. A pass Curry to Hatfield netted five yards. Hatfield sneaked at right guard for two. Wharton failed to gain off left tackle. Hatfield was caught behind the line and lost a yard. Curry passed to Fox on the fourth down but failed to get the desired distance. Warner tried to run right end and dropped the ball which was covered by Norris on the sixteen yard line. Hatfield hit right guard for six. Hatfield went off left tackle for five, and in two plays thru center captured a touchdown. Fox kicked goal. In the remaining time Defiance kicked to Ashland and after three tries at the line McClintock punted. Defiance returned the punt as the game ended. Score, Ashland, 61; Defiance, 0.
