Armistice Parade To Be Big Affair

Parade Starts at 10:30 A.M.

DON'T GO HOME THIS WEEK



New College Building to cost \$80,000

Work on the new Library and Recitation Building which the College is erecting just to the east of the old Administration Building is progressing fairly well and if the present rate of construction is continued the new building will be ready for early spring occupancy.

The building is to be one hundred and eighteen feet long and sixty-four feet wide. It will contain on the second floor, four recitation rooms with offices for the professors, the Preside t's office and the Bursar's office. The entire third floor will be devoted to a modern and fully equipped library.

The building is being constructed of rough texture, red ,face brick. Windows and entrances up to the first floor are trimmed in gray stone, and windows on the two upper stories are to have the stone ledges.

The building will be fireproof and mod-

ern in every respect, conforming to the requirements of the state code.

The crowded conditions which at present exist cause students and teachers to hail with joy the construction of this building and look eagerly forward to the time when more room will be available.

It will be remembered that the funds for the new building were raised by the citizens of Ashland and the members of the Brethren Church.
