New Formations to be Used By Murray Men

The Purple team from a layoff of three days went through the snappiest signal drill of the year Monday night. Coach called the squad at 2:30 P. M. and gave them some new formations which are to be used for the first time this year against Defiance. After a stiff two hours signal drill the two teams were running through the new formations in good shape, although some rough spots were plainly evident. These new formations look like the most powerful that could be placed in the hands of the quarterback. Against the second team they worked well but have not yet reached that machine-like stage that several more good drills will make them.

Defiance here Saturday will be up against these new formations which are bound to give her a lot of trouble.

Every man on the squad is in perfect condition after a week's lay-off except Freese and Rowsey whose injuries seem to possess remarkable stick-to-it-iveness. Freese's injury will probably keep him out the rest of the year. Rowsey's charley-horse has caught the fever and is doing considerable shifting, finally landing on his left knee, but Coach Murray expects to have Rowsey able to take his place at guard when the team lines up Armistice Day.

PROF. R. R. HAUN SPEAKS IN CHAPEL

Talk Appropriate on Election Day

Prof. R. R. Haun delivered a pointed Chapel talk Tuesday morning upon the need of upright men in politics. He spoke of the issues at stake in the election and the part which every voter played in the conduct of government.

Mr. Haun illustrated first with an example from a short story. A young man who was a drifter was by a strange circumstance elected mayor of the city in which he resided. Up to this time he had had no part in affairs of any consequence but he was equal to his task. The story, Mr. Haun explained, was highly improbable but it nevertheless demonstrated exactly what might be done by any individual of ability.

DR. MARTIN SHIVELY PREACHES AT SERVICE

The Positiveness of Christ's Teaching—Subject

Dr. Martin Shively, Bursar, filled the pulpit in the Chapel Sunday morning, November 4. Dr. Shively ably discussed the positiveness of the teachings of Christ.

"When Jesus talked, he spoke as one having authority and not as the Scribes and Pharisees." . . . "This is a day of questioning," said Dr. Shively. "Too many people are prone to question the statements of Jesus even to go as far as to doubt the Sonship and the Resurrection. Jesus positively declares, 'In my Father's house are many mansions. . . I go to prepare a place for you.'"

Jesus concisely declared that he would come again. There was no questioning in his mind in regard to this. Jesus was such an one as to transform that character Peter from one who was thoughtless and independable to one of the most devoted apostles of whom we have account. "Such a complete change came over Peter as to cause him to stand before that raging mob on the day of Pentecost and set forth the statement that, 'there is no name under heaven by which men may be saved save that of Jesus Christ.'"

The speaker cited many instances which prove the positiveness of the teachings of the Master while he walked and talked with men.

Mr. R. D. Barnard, president of the Y. M. C. A. called for volunteers to entertain the members of the Student Volunteer Movement who are to be here for the Fall Retreat which opens on Saturday next, in chapel Tuesday morning. A good response was made by the students whose homes are in the city and with this matter settled the arrangements for the Retreat are complete.

As stated before this affair brings students of the highest type to Ashland from fourteen other Ohio colleges. Every effort possible should be put forth to entertain them adequately.

The Student Volunteer Movement, it should be remembered, is an organization devoted to the training of missionaries for the foreign field. The purpose of the movement, as explained by Mr. Barnard, is four-fold. (1) To see the missionary needs, (2) To find the volunteer, (3) To help and advise in his preparation, (4) To seek and encourage his support in the home land.

The object of the Fall Retreat is to form a get-together for the leaders of the Volunteers and afford time for the discussion of the conduct and betterment of the movement. Some of the topics which will be discussed this week end are:

The principle of the Student Volunteer Movement.

The Volunteer's responsibility in private life and on the campus.

Efficient and successful methods of mission study.

Deputation work.

Poster campaigns and advertisements.

The Retreat will last from Saturday morning until Sunday noon. Delegates will arrive Friday night.
