#### To Train H. S. Teachers

Ashland College of Arts and Sciences is now fully recognized by the State of Ohio for the training of High School teachers, so that those who graduate from this College and who have taken work in Education as indicated in the College catalogue, will be certified without examination.

The Normal Department is fully recognized also by the Department of Public Instruction of the State of Ohio for the training of elementary teachers, and those who complete the work are granted a temporary certificate without examination.

This does not mean that heretofore graduates from Ashland College were not granted certificates to teach in High Schools. It only means that in the past the graduates of this Institution were required

# Game Ends in Scoreless Tie GOOD FOOTBALL DISPLAYED BY BOTH TEAMS

The Purple and Gold eleven in what proved to be one of the hardest games on the Ashland schedule, played Mount Union at Alliance to a scoreless tie last Saturday. The Ashland team played with distinction on both offense and defense.

The game, played on a slightly slippery field was spectacular. Both teams attempted and completed a large number of forward passes. In the first half the Ashland forwards outcharged the Mount Union linemen and continually forced the Mount backs to punt. Mount Union came back strong in the third quarter and threatened the Ashland goal line but the Ashland line proved their steadiness again and held until Mount passed over the goal line and failed to complete.

The game was spirited and both teams possessed an unimited amount of fight. Neither team fumbled more than could be expected and good football was played throughout the contest.

The entire Ashland line starred in the game. Weber made a name for himself by his long punts. Weber's punts averaged fifty-three yards and one time he booted the pigskin for sixty. Wharton gained consistently through the line and made a number of good tackles. Curry played the best all around game, making long gains running back punts and in the open field. Curry showed himself able to handle the team when a loss would have been disastrous.

Rupert, playing his first game of football, as a halfback played like an old timer. He ran good interference and was on the receiving end of a pass from Curry that netted twenty yards.

Fleming was the outstanding player of the Mounts. His runs off tackle and around end gained ground for the Alliance aggrecation. Moore the Mount Union services SECOND QUARTER-

Mount punted 43 yards to Curry who ambled 7 yards before tackled. With the ball on Ashland's 43 yard line Wharton found a hole and went for 6. Fox made a yard at center and Curry failed to gain through left guard. Weber punted 43 yards to Whitman who returned 18 yards. A pass, Freese to Curry netted five vards Freese threw two more passes which with several line plunges took Ashland to Mount Union's 16 yard mark. Here Freese passed again but Whitman intercepted and ran 2 yards. Whitman punted 42 yards to Freese who came back 4. Ashland passed but failed. Curry made 2 off right tackle. Weber punted to Fleming who ran 15 yards to the 40 yard line. Myers made a yard through guard. Myers passed to Harris and gained 5. Ashland was penalized 15 for alleged roughness. Fleming made 3 at right guard. Fleming tried center but flunked. Myers passed but did not connect. Myers drop kicked a weak one that fell ten yards short of the cross bar. Curry received and wallowed 6 vards upstream. Weber punted out of bounds on the 26 yard line. Myers tried another drop kick from the center of the field that went out of bounds. Half ended with the ball in Ashland's possession on the 12 yard line. Score, Ashland 0-Mount Union 0.

#### THIRD QUARTER-

Moore of Mount Union kicked off to Wharton on the 20 yard line. Wharton returned 5 yards and was tackled by Myers. Curry jabbed at left guard but Whitman and Mattes broke through and stopped him on the line. Fox made a yard at the same place. Weber punted out of bounds on Mount's 49 yard line. Fleming made 6 yards in two smashes at right
