Ashland College of Arts and Sciences is now fully recognized by the State of Ohio for the training of High School teachers, so that those who graduate from this College and who have taken work in Education as indicated in the College catalogue, will be certified without examination.

The Normal Department is fully recognized also by the Department of Public Instruction of the State of Ohio for the training of elementary teachers, and those who complete the work are granted a temporary certificate without examination.

This does not mean that heretofore graduates from Ashland College were not granted certificates to teach in High Schools. It only means that in the past the graduates of this Institution were required to pass an examination before teaching in High School.

# IMPORTANT Y. M. CABINET MEETING

In order to discuss some important matters President Barnard called a meeting of the Y. M. C. A. Cabinet last Tuesday night. A majority of the members were present.
