DELOZIER'S TALK TITILLATES STUDENTS

Prof. DeLozier gave a rollicking talk at Chapel Wednesday. His subject was the peculiarities of human speech and he drew numerous examples of the humorous use of idioms in the English language.

DeLozier called attention to similarity of the idioms of English and the idioms of the Romance languages. He said that he was particularly anxious to dispel the common illusion that idioms were not good English and that he considered the idiom as a beautiful and compact vehicle of thought.
