

Ashland Delegates Attend Cleveland Conference

"RUSSIA" THEME OF MEET

Four delegates from Ashland College were present at a conference held at the Y. M. C. A. in Cleveland to formulate plans for raising money from the student bodies of the various Ohio colleges to aid the starving students of Russia. A number of men, including Thompson of Baldwin-Wallace, Emery of Oberlin, and Prof. Tom Graham also of Oberlin, who spent the past summer in Europe studying the situation there, brought information to the conference scarcely believable. Not only students, but doctors, nurses and professors are literally dying with starvation. Their only hope is America.

No Food

Students in Russian Universities and other institutions of learning have less than an American breakfast to be distributed throughout the entire day. A Russian student may do one of three things—give up and die as many do, fight for an existence or wait for aid. Last year when the college students of Russia were being fed by American aid on rations supposedly too scanty for an American to live on, the students themselves, underfed as they were, petitioned to have the meals cut 20 per cent that more might be fed.

No Fuel

Every wooden house in Petrograd has been torn down and burned for fuel. Barges frozen in the ice have been cut off above the ice and used for fuel. What few students still manage to pursue their college courses must needs sit in unheated rooms with an insufficient amount of clothing and study from books shared by sometimes a dozen others.

\$15 Feeds Student

For the small sum of \$15 given to the American kitchen, and there are many of these now in Russia, one student may be fed through the academic year. Can the students of this land of plenty, independent as they are, fail to meet the obligations towards these Russian brothers?

Opportunity To Serve

The students of Ashland College will have brought to them on various occasions further information regarding the desperate conditions of the Russians, and methods by which the students here may render assistance.

six. Wharton made five at right tackle. Ashland was penalized fifteen yards for holding. Curry passed and Howald intercepted. Heidelberg grounded two passes, and LeGalley lost six on an attempted run around right end. Kingsmore punted twenty-six yards. Curry tried an end run and lost four when the Ashland line became a sieve. Ashland penalized fifteen for clipping. Fox made five off left tackle. Weber punted forty yards to Heidelberg's thirty yard line. Three plays gave Heidelberg nothing and Kingsmore punted. Ashland with fifty-seven yards to go, opened up with everything she had. Fox passed to Curry for sixteen yards. Ashland was penalized fifteen. Curry threw to McClintock and gained nineteen yards. Heidelberg was penalized five for off sides. Curry passed and failed to connect. Another pass netted Ashland thirteen yards. Curry threw to McClintock who caught on the three yard line. Fox made two at right tackle and Curry went through center for the winning touchdown. Fox kicked goal. In the remaining time Norris kicked off to Howald and Heidelberg was soon forced to punt. Ashland got the ball and McClintock caught a pass from Curry as the game ended. Score—Ashland 13; Heidelberg 6.
