"The way some of our meetings are conducted is enough to make us stand aghast," he remarked in the course of his talk. He said that he hoped the meeting had done the society some good and that they had learned a lesson from it.

M. A. Stuckey spoke on improvement and Dr. Garber pronounced the benediction on one of the most helpful and enjoyable meetings ever held by the Christian Endeavor in the College Chapel.
