

FOOTBALL SQUAD NOW HAS NEW EQUIPMENT

School Colors To Be Worn

The varsity football squad, for the first time since football was re-introduced here a few years ago, is to appear in the school colors of purple and gold. It has formerly been impossible to obtain uniforms with the conventional colors.

Complete new equipment was ordered by Coach Murray and has already been distributed among the members of the squad. The new jerseys are of special construction with padded elbows and extra size shoulders to admit shoulder pads. The body is of royal purple with narrow gold stripes around the sleeves. Conspicuous gold numerals on the back will aid spectators and scorers to keep track of the players and their positions.

The trousers are of the approved Illinois style, planned and designed by Coach Zupke of the University of Illinois. Made of heavy olive drab khaki, they are designed to give the maximum protection with a minimum of weight. Instead of the usual ill fit they are so constructed that they fit snugly and yet allow the greatest freedom of action.

The sox, of heavy ribbed material, also carry the color scheme of purple and gold. Besides this standard equipment the squad is to be furnished with new sweat shirts, headgears and shoes.

For the past two seasons the teams have been apparelled in colors other than the established colors of the college. It is considered especially fortunate that the teams are to be once more garbed in the purple and gold of Ashland.

REV. BOARDMAN TALKS AT CHAPEL

To Leave Soon as a Mission-
ary to Argentine

Eddie Boardman, former student at Ashland College, who has recently completed work at Princeton gave an interesting and inspiring talk in Chapel Friday morning, September 15. Boardman is to sail for South America, October 21 and is now making a tour back home. He has spent nine years in preparation for his life work. Besides being a graduate of this institution, he has been for some time in active work in the ministry of the Brethren church at Hudson, Iowa.

"The ministry," said Boardman, "appeals to the highest and best that is in any man and the need of today is red-blooded manhood in that profession... Two great moments come to every one, first the decision of Christ or not, and then the choosing of a life work... The call to the Argentine appeals because there we face the wreck of a country which might have been just as magnificent as the United States... It is there that sanitary conditions are in a terrible state." Also he said, "There are cities of five thousand people which do not have a Christian church within their borders... The first contingent of American soldiers who went to Europe had for their watchword 'Carry on,' Let us also remember that the grandest thing in all the world is building souls for eternity. Are we willing to carry on?"
