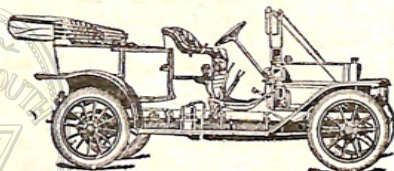

Automobile Routes

PORTSMOUTH TO YORK HARBOR.—From Market square follow trolley via Market street, crossing railroad twice, then turn, right across toll bridge, across the river, re-crossing the railroad in bearing right into Kittery, Me. Turn first left and go straight ahead following telegraph poles to York Corner, then branch to the right for the Harbor and Beach; 14 miles.

PORTSMOUTH AND RYE BEACH.—From Market square go west up Congress street, bearing left into Middle street and left again into Miller avenue, which follow direct into Sagamore road, main highway through Rye Centre to Rye Beach, following the trolley line. For Hampton and direct road to Boston, follow coast road past Hampton Life Saving station to main road. Rye Beach 10 miles.

PORTSMOUTH TO BRETTON WOODS.—From Market square down Congress to Vaughan street, to Maplewood avenue, Continuing on past Jones farm to Dover point bridge, thence through Dover, Rochester, Ossipee to the White Mountains and Bretton Woods.

PORTSMOUTH TO GREENLAND AND EXETER.—From Market square up Congress street to Middle, straight out Middle to South road, following trolley line to Plains. Follow trolley line through Greenland, Stratham, Stratham hill, to Exeter, 14 miles.

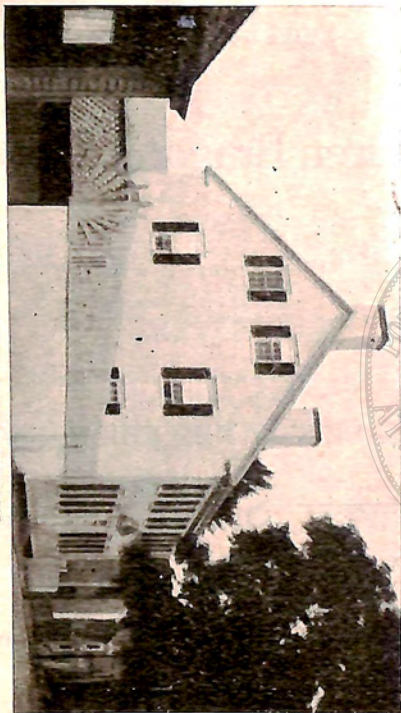

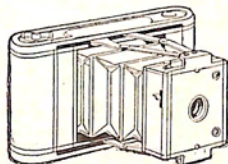

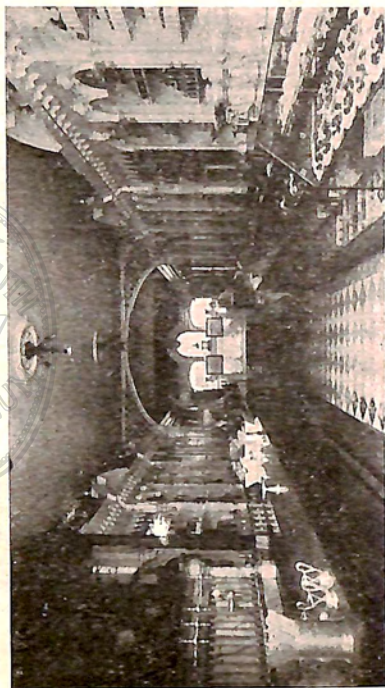

ROCKINGHAM HOTEL — On State Street. Was originally the Woodbury Langdon House, erected in 1739, destroyed by fire and rebuilt in 1785, 1830 converted into public house, 1870 remodeled and enlarged. Destroyed 1884, present building rebuilt 1885. The Colonial dining-room is the same as in the original Langdon House.

THE GOVERNOR LANGDON HOUSE

— On Pleasant Street, opposite Universalist Church. Built 1784 by Gov. John Langdon, the first President of the United States Senate. Washington was entertained, also Louis Philippe and President James Monroe. A model of this house was used for New Hampshire Building at the Jamestown Exposition.

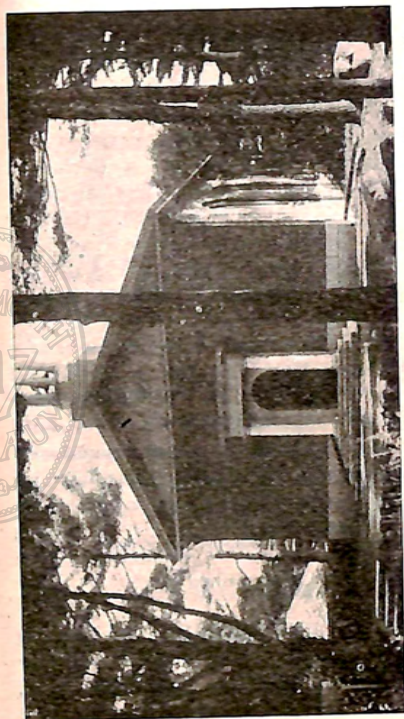
GOVERNOR BENNING WENTWORTH MANSION — At the end of Little Harbor Road. This old mansion, made famous by Longfellow's "Lady Wentworth," was built by Governor Benning Wentworth in 1750 and occupied by him until his death. In 1759 he married his housemaid, Martha Hilton. Pres. Washington during his visit was a guest at this house. The house contains 45 rooms. The famous Council Chamber is preserved in its original state.

THE FIRST WENTWORTH HOUSE — On Manning Street. Erected in 1670 by Samuel Wentworth, the first of the family in this city. Birthplace of Lieut. Gov. John Wentworth and Gov. Benning Wentworth.

PORTSMOUTH PUBLIC LIBRARY — Designed by Bulfinch and built 1806. The library contains 18,000 vols.

SHILLABER HOUSE — Foot of Langdon Street. Birthplace of Benjamin Shillaber, author of Mrs. Partington.

LITTLE HARBOR CHAPEL, Portsmouth, N. H.—Sunday mornings from June 20 to September 5 (inclusive). Undenominational services at 10.30 o'clock. All are welcome. Cars for Rye, passing Little Harbor Road, leave Market Square, 10.05, 10.35. Cars pass Little Harbor Road returning from Rye, 11.50, 12.20.

WARNER HOUSE—Corner of Daniel and Chapel Streets. This is the oldest brick house in Portsmouth. Erected 1712-15. The brick and material were brought from Holland. The lightning rod on West end of house erected by Benjamin Franklin in 1762. Lafayette, Webster and other distinguished men have been entertained here.

TOBIAS LEAR HOUSE—On Hunking Street. Marked by a bronze tablet by S. A. R. Birthplace of Tobias Lear, who for sixteen years was President George Washington's private secretary.

ASSEMBLY HOUSE — Corner of Vaughan Street and Raitt's Court. Built 1750. Was used for dance hall. George Washington attended a ball there and in his diary he states that it was one of the finest halls he had seen in the United States. 1838 building remodeled and cut in two, a half on each side of Raitt's Court.

DENNETT HOUSE — Prospect Street. Second oldest house. Erected 1668 by John Dennett.

OLD JACKSON HOUSE — Northwest Street. The oldest house in Portsmouth. Built by Richard Jackson 1664 and is still in possession of the family.

BOYD - RAYNES HOUSE — Corner of New Vaughan Street and Maplewood Avenue. Erected 1740. In the ship yard in the rear, America, a 54 gun ship, was built for Royal Navy.

PORTSMOUTH ATHENÆUM — On Market Square. Building erected 1803. Society incorporated 1817. It is a library controlled by a stock company, and has 20,000 volumes.

THE HUNKING WENTWORTH HOUSE — Corner of Church and Congress Sts. (Marked by bronze tablet S. A. R.) The meeting place of the Committee of Public Safety during the Revolution.

THE FRANK JONES BREWING COMPANY PLANT — On Islington Street. The largest ale plant in the United States and a model of its kind. Visitors are welcome and passes may be obtained at the Brewery office.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH (EPISCOPAL) —

One of the most historic buildings in Portsmouth. The original Queen's Chapel on the same site, erected 1732. Queen Caroline endowed it with a service of plate still in use, with it the "Vinegar Bible." The marble font was captured at Senegal in 1758. The bell which hangs in the belfry was captured at Louisburg. It hung in the old chapel until it was destroyed by fire in 1806. It was recast by Paul Revere and recast again in 1896. In this Church Washington and other noted men attended Divine service.

THE WEEKS HOUSE — Greenland. This is said to be the second oldest house in New England. It was built about 1638. It is of brick and of massive construction.

PORTSMOUTH NAVY YARD — Was purchased by the Government in 1800 and the addition of Seavey's Island was purchased in 1850. The yard contains one of the largest and without doubt the finest stone dry docks in the country, being excavated out of the solid ledge. The present Commandant residence is the only building standing that was on the yard when it was purchased. The famous frigate Kearsarge, of Alabama fame, was built on this yard and many other noted wooden ships. During the Spanish war the prisoners from Admiral Cervera's fleet were quartered on Seavey's Island at Camp Long. On the Easterly end of the Island are the graves of thirty prisoners who died here. July 22, 1905, Henderson Point on the westerly end of the Island, was blown up by dynamite, and it was the largest blast ever set off in this country.

In August and September, 1905, the Russian and Japanese Peace Conference was held in the general store building on the yard; this building is now known as the Conference Building. Here on the afternoon of September 5, 1905, was signed the Treaty of Portsmouth, which ended the World's Greatest War.

WILLIAM PITTS' TAVERN — Corner of Court and Atkinson Streets. Marked by bronze tablet by S. A. R. Built previous to 1767. Was first known as the Earl of Halifax Tavern. Hancock, Knox, Lafayette and Washington have stopped at this house. Grand Lodge of Masons held here in 1790.

THE THOMAS BAILEY ALDRICH MEMORIAL — On Court street, is the boyhood home of the author of the "Story of a Bad Boy," and it has been restored as nearly as possible to the exact condition as when he lived there. The memorial also contains his priceless collection of books, autographs and pictures. It is open morning and afternoon.

MOFFAT HOUSE — Market Street, between Hanover and Deer Streets. Erected by John Moffat, 1763. The home of Gen. William Whipple, who signed the Declaration of Independence and commanded the first New Hampshire Brigade in the Revolution.

MESERVE — WEBSTER HOUSE — Corner of Vaughan and School Streets. Erected in 1760. Daniel Webster brought his bride, Grace Fletcher, to this house when married. The stone steps are a part of the Old State House.

GRAY AND PRIME'S OFFICE — On Market Street. Here is probably the finest collection of old ship models in New England, as well as many old ship paintings. The models of some of the most famous merchant ships in the world are in this place, and visitors are always welcomed.

Points of Interest

York

THIS FAMOUS RESORT is one of the oldest towns in New England, and there is not a mile of its roads or lanes which is not associated with some quaint history. Settled in 1622, it was first called Agamenticus and subsequently changed in 1639 to Gorgeana.

THE OLD JAIL—York Village, is the most interesting of the historical buildings. It was erected in 1653, and to-day is used as a museum by the York Historical Society and is well worth a visit.

THE GARRISON HOUSE—At Brixham. Was built in 1640 and was the garrison house for the people of that section against the Indians.

YORK COUNTRY CLUB on York River. Considered one of the finest summer clubs on the New England coast. An eighteen hole golf course, eighteen tennis courts and a fine club house are among its attractions.

Kittery and Kittery Point

SETTLED ABOUT 1623, and its history is in a measure that of York and Portsmouth. It has many famous old landmarks, and was the birthplace of Sir William Pepperell, of Louisburg fame.

FORT MCCLARY — At Kittery Point. Was erected in 1700, and the old block-houses are still in a good state of preservation.

WILLIAM PEPPERELL HOUSE — One of the most picturesque old mansions, was erected in 1733. It was the birthplace of Sir William Pepperell.

OLD BRAY HOUSE — At Kittery Point. Directly in the rear of the Pepperell mansion. The oldest house in Kittery.

SPARHAWKE HALL — At Kittery Point. A fine old mansion erected by Sir William Pepperell.

New Castle

THIS OLD TOWN was settled at or about the same time as Portsmouth, in fact its early history is interwoven with that city. The town obtained a charter separate from Portsmouth, May 30th, 1693, and this charter is still in existence.

FORT WILLIAM AND MARY — Now Fort Constitution. Was built about 1630. On the night of December 14, 1774, this Fort was attacked by a party of patriots and fifteen barrels of gunpowder seized, which was afterwards used at Bunker Hill.

WALBACH TOWER — A picturesque old fort. Was built in 1812.

OLD BOATSWAIN ALLEN HOUSE — On the river front, near Postoffice. Was built 1734. Was the residence of the Boatswain Allen of the Ranger.
