THE VOTING CRAZE.

WE respectfully call the attention of the readers of the SUMMER CLOUD to the fact that we have not importuned them to "vote" on the question as to who is the belle of the beach, which young gentleman displays the most stunning sash, which stage driver wears the biggest boots, who is the most popular chiropodist, which boatman is most likely to take his passengers where fish can be found and least likely to drown them all on the way back, or any other matter,—"cut out this ballot, write in the name of your candidate, and send the ballot to this office."

If there are "sins of omission" as well as of commission, it follows that there must be virtues of omission likewise; and we claim it as an act of positive virtue that we have not been carried away by the newspaper voting craze which has swept over the land with the virulence of the epizootic or the grippe, and have refrained from asking our patrons to vote on any subject whatsoever. We claim especial commendation, from the fact that so few papers have escaped the epidemic. We do not know that any of the "summer papers," which come in with "the season" and go out with it, have been stricken; but there is hardly a daily or weekly paper in the country, published throughout the year, that has not had up some kind of a "vote"—for a bicycle to the most popular clergyman, a rifle to the most popular school teacher, a dictionary to the most popular butcher, a silver pocket-flask to the most popular temperance orator, a horn to the most popular fisherman, or something of the kind.

The whole business was, from the start, as absurd, idiotic and silly a farce as was ever conceived; and it has been carried to such an extent that it has made weary everybody who reads a paper. The only redeeming feature of the disease is, that from its very fury it must soon spend itself, and go back to the abyss of sin and folly from which it emanated.

To demonstrate the glaring stupidity of this voting business, it is only necessary to point out the fact that when a newspaper vote has been finally decided, and the count-up shows that somebody is "the most popular" this, that or the other, it shows nothing whatever of the kind, and is no more a proof (or even indication) of excessive popularity than being drowned is proof of ability to sail a boat.

Were each voter restricted to a single vote, the result might mean something in regard to the winners of these voting contests; but each voter can vote as many times as he or she pleases, the only restriction being that the ballot must be cut from the paper getting up the contest—this assuring, if any special interest is shown in the matter, a big sale of the paper while the voting is going on.

Let us take an example, by way of elucidation: In Boston, the present week, were assembled many thousand veterans of the Union army and navy, in attendance on the annual National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. At the

same time a Boston paper was "running" (no word seems to come in here as well as this slang term) a voting contest to see who should receive a thousand dollar sword, as "the most popular Grand Army man." The vote on this was enormous, the gross receipts of the paper, for copies containing the ballot, being thirty times the cost of the sword, or more.

But the result only shows,--not that the man who gets the sword is a more popular member of the Grand Army than any one of a thousand or ten thousand others, but that his admirers were willing to put out more money to secure the sword for him, than were the friends of any other one person for their favorite. Suppose that one wealthy man was willing to give two thousand dollars for Capt. Toadsticker, in voting for that thousand dollar sword; that would be 100,000 votes at two cents each. Suppose that 90,000 poor men each gave Private Bayonet a vote apiece, for the same sword. Capt. Toadsticker's one wealthy friend would count 100,000 in "popularity," and Private Bayonet's 90,000 supporters would be swamped by ten thousand majority, and by a single man! Could anything be more absurd?

It may be said in favor of this voting mania that it does no special harm, and will soon be over; it decides nothing, and as the public are getting so tired of it that any new scheme to secure their votes will be ignored, it will soon be given up--and some other "fake" adopted by the sensational press to temporarily increase circulation.

The winners of trophies of "popularity" by newspaper vote may point with pride to them for a short time, but their descendants will not have much to say on that subject. The public will be satisfied if the silly business is now abandoned. It has been kept up until it has become a nuisance.

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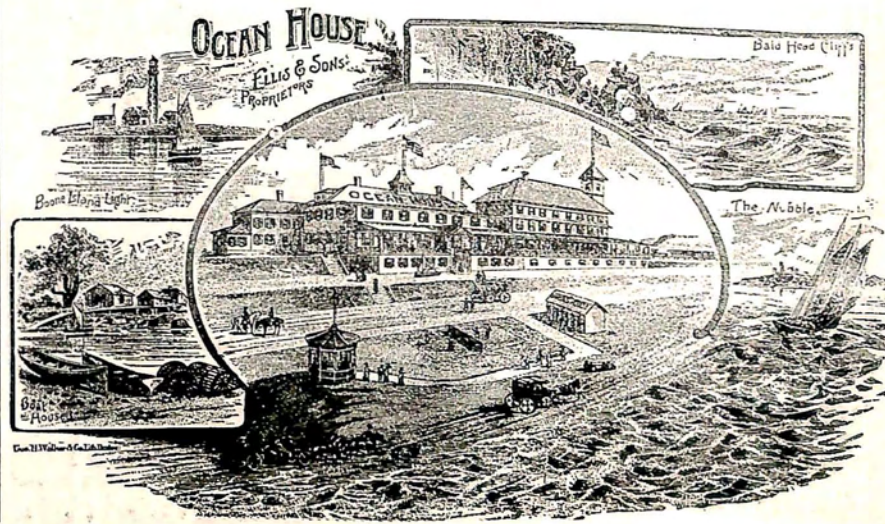
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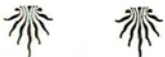
