

### Description:

A three story brick Federal building with hip roof, inset rounded corners, low third story. Three chimneys in high fire wall shared with row unit to E. Main architectural detail is the series of Palladian window features surmounted by stuccoied blind arches in the second story's these louvered fans above the central part. The Penhallow Street facade centers on a double fanlighted door with attenuated Ionic columns supporting a full entablature. Above this door, in the second story is a window matching the others but without the arches, and above that, a rectangular stone block (between stories) inscribed "CUSTOM HOUSE." There is a door with transom light and blocked sidelights in the right bay on this side, and a double door on the rounded corner at Daniel St.

A one story basement entry, incompatible with the building (picture window) has been added to the S end of the Penhallow St. side.

#### Significance:

Although similar to other Federal rowblocks in plan and elevation, the building is distinguished by its elaborate, Palladian type windows and its public function from c. 1815-1860, connecting periods of great shipping and shipbuilding activity in Portsmouth.

#### Bibliography:



Although its use of red brick and contrast of that material with white trim represents some concession to surrounding older buildings, the Federal Building is wildly out of scale with its smaller neighbors, required the sacrifice of numerous old buildings and several streets, and - all in all - represents a deplorable intrusion in a nineteenth century streetscape.

A  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story Greek Revival double house, situated gable end to the street. Symmetrical facade with polygonal projecting two story bays on either side with paired doors in middle above which is a door hood on three scroll brackets. Windows above the doors in second and third story.

Specifically Greek Revival are the extended eaves above a full, raking, entablature with cornice returns. Remaining sash is 2/2, possibly original.





An L-plan  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story gable-roofed Gothic Revival house with extended eaves a cornice returns and panelled corner pilasters supporting brackets under simplified capitals. In the left corner (the inside of the L) is a one story hip-roofed porch, now filled-in. The distinguishing Gothic feature is the pointed top of the second story window, which is filled with louvres. Its wooden shutters are an important decorative element as well. The first story of the front has a mid 20C glass and brick storefront with door at right.

A unique example of a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story Gothic Revival house in Portsmouth; an important part of the varied streetscape on the south side of Daniel Street.



A two story gable-roofed house with one section situated roof-parallel-to-the-street, the other joined to its rear at right angles and offset to the right. The latter contains the doorway with transom light and full sidelights, fronted by a one story hip-roofed Doric porch.

An interesting small Greek Revival house which is a valuable survival in the (once largely residential) downtown area.





A  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story gambrel-roofed brick Colonial Revival building set on a half basement story. The slate roof is broken in front by three shed-roofed dormers of 3, 2, and 3 bays respectively. Likewise, the console cornice surmounts a facade with windows of 3-2-3 spacing, the center two above a portico with console cornice and full entablature set on paired Tuscan columns. Wing to left as noted above.

One of a number of substantial Colonial Revival public buildings in Portsmouth.

2. Overall plan:



A 2½-story brick Georgian mansion with gambrel roof, central hexagonal wood cupola, five bay facade with tall windows (9/6 both stories). The gable ends have raised parapet walls incorporating linked chimneys at the W end, one chimney (rear) at the E end. An urn balustrade rests on the roof curb. Gable-roofed roof dormers (6/6 sash) have alternately triangular and segmental pediments. The horizontal eaves rest on consoles, while the main feature of the facade is the segmental-pedimented door surround with fluted Corinthian pilasters on pedestals. This feature is reflected in segmental relieving arches over the windows to either side. The door leads into a large central hall, the most interesting feature of which is the pair of Indian frescoes flanking the stair landing.

## Significance:

One of the earliest surviving brick houses in New England, the MacPhaedris—Warner house is a well-preserved example of the home of a prominent merchant (Archibald MacPhaedris) in the early eighteenth century. It was rented by Governor Benning Wentworth in the 1750s. The house is notable for its architecture, its cultural and historical associations, and for its elaborate interior including the stair frescoes depicting the Biblical story of Abraham and Isaac, and Indian sachems taken to England by Peter Shuyler in 1710.

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Large brick building located between river and Bow Street. It consists of a basement story with square arcuated window openings, above which is a projecting plinth with granite coping. The main story consists principally of tall arcuated windows which have been filled in with glass blocks. This is topped by a corbel-table cornice, above which is a stepped, simplified classical parapet.

The entrance is the Bow Street side. The large round chimney is on the North side.

An older building is attached at the South corner of the West side, and this matches a larger building on the site bounding the corner of Daniel and Bow Streets. The latter is a rectangular three-story brick building extending along Bow St.; it has windows similar to those of the main power plant building but retaining months sash, while having a more elaborate corbel table cornice.

#### Significance:

A typical utilitarian-classical building of c.1900 which carried on the traditional industrial-commercial use of the Portsmouth waterfront. It is similar in style to the former Portsmouth Brewing Co. building to the north on Bow St.
