8. Outbuildings:

Description:

The Portsmouth Academy building forms the original part of the library. A two story hip-roofed brick building with 7 bay facade facing Islington Street; the facade has a three bay pavilion projecting about 8" with gable roof and lunette window. The door surround consists of paired engaged Ionic columns supporting a full entablature, with dentil frieze, which breaks forward above them. The doorway on the left is similar but with single columns; both doors are inset with fanlights. A marble stringcourse runs around the building above the doorway cornices, and the main raking and horizontal cornices have delicate comma brackets.

The Benedict House is a three story brick Federal house with hip-roof, 5 x 2 bays, low third story. The five bay facade has a central door with broad fanlight covering 3/5 sidelights and semicircular portico resting on engaged and freestanding Ionic columns (4 in ell). Above this is a Palladian window motif with louvered fan and sidelights, enframed in a blind arch with keystone. The extended eaves (unusual in a Federal house) surmount a delicate series of vertical cylinders.

A recent major renovation and addition by Stahl, Bennett, architects connected the two buildings with a modern, but unobtrusive, brick and glass addition. Interior details, where added, are Colonial Revival.

Significance:

A major public building of the Federal period with subsequent work by a local architect and a major Boston architectural firm.

8. Outbuildings:

Description:

A 2½ story Georgain house with gambrel roof, five bay facade. Three dormers with triangular pediments. The first story windows have shouldered architrave surrounds with architrave window heads and cornices. The house received a Greek Revival doorway with transom light and full sidelights and a columnar porch (with palmetto capitals) c. 1850.

Extending from the front windows on the right side is a two story hip and gable roofed ell. This is remarkable chiefly for its elaborate Federal doorway (c. 1810) with greatly projecting triangular pediment on columns surrounding a semicircular fanlight. This ell has a cut granite foundation. Behind this is a lower two story gable roofed ell on a brick foundation.

The house has unfortunately lost its roof balustrade. Otherwise the exterior is largely intact.

Significance:

An important early house in a critical location (important to maintain integrity of Islington/Bridge Street corner).
