## Description:

2½ story mill building located at outlet of South Millpond. Gable roofed with end to March Street. Stove chimneys in right and left roof slopes. Extended eaves with bargeboard, frieze band below. 2/2 sash, possibly original. 2x4 bays in second story, first story altered by modern storefront. One story shed roofed lean-to on right side and rear, connected with one story gable roofed shed - placed crosswise - at rear. Building is said to have been a mill originally, and is unusual for being built entirely on wooden pilings over the Piscataqua River.

Gurney, 100A (building to right), and 89f: Town granted mill privilege to the first John Pickering in 1658 "on condition that he should keep in repair, a bridge over the dam, for foot passengers going to church." The mills built at this time. The city bought the mill and mill privilege in 1881, following which the mill was demolished and a store built on the site.
