7. Specific features (location, no., appearance of porches, windows, doors, chimnies, dormers, ells/wings-see also description), decorative elements:

1 1/2-story gambrel-roofed ell in center of rear-gable roofed dormer on each central chimney. 6/6 sash-taller 1st story windows.

8.Outbuildings:
Cove window head moldings 1st story.

Latticework side yard enclosure left of house (modern).

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## DESCRIPTION:

2 1/2-story gambrel-roofed Georgian house with central chimney. Slate roof. Lower second story. 2-story gambrel-roofed ell (with gable-roofed dormer on each side) in center of rear. 5-bay facade with center door. Door surround consists of projecting cornice, full entablature, Tuscan pilasters, rectangular 3-light transom light. 6/6 sash 1st, 2nd stories. 1st story window heads have cove molding. Wooden spindle Colonial Revival fence on brick wall with slate parapet.

Howells: The house formerly stood on lot no. 1 of Glebe lands, directly behind the North Church, and was moved to Haymarket Square c.1800. It is known as the Oracle House because the Oracle of the Day was published here by Charles Peirce in 1793. It was moved to its present location (as part of the Prescott Park development) in 1937.

## SIGNIFICANCE:

Home of the first daily newspaper in New Hampshire this early Georgian house is representative of many Portsmouth houses in having been moved, in this case twice, and each time to areas of significant development at the time. It was built originally as the result of subdivision of the Glebe lands.
