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The log begins on April 17, 1764, when Eliphalet Daniel assumes charge of the Portsmouth city jail. Daniel notes the names of prisoners present when he arrives, then keeps a chronological record of commitments and discharges through January 19, 1765. Following this orthographically disoriented chronology, a better educated hand arranges the census alphabetically, correcting obvious mistakes, and omitting many financial details. Names are generally indexed as rendered by the alphabetizer (for example, Daniel's John Neuter is listed as Nutter). Others, the annotator has corrected (Branscum becomes Branscomb).

Daniel also uses the book as a ledger. Some entries record charges incurred by, or paid on behalf of, prisoners. Other entries are not clearly connected to the jail. Moreover Daniel, or a successor, sporadically used blank pages to keep accounts long after 1764. The latest entries record wages paid to laborers on a house frame in 1788.

Every person "committed to his majesty's goal," is indexed as a prisoner. All others are indexed as "persons other than prisoners." Some of these, may, in fact, have been incarcerated, but they are not explicitly so listed.

PORTSMOUTH JAIL

In 1759, a gaol was built in this town, at the corner of Prison-Lane, and Fetter-Lane. It was constructed of oak timber hewn square and covered with iron bars, well spiked to the timber, and lined with plank. A dwelling house was annexed to it; the whole was two stories high. [Adams, p. 199] This jail, located at the corner of Chestnut and Porter Streets where the Music Hall now stands, burned in 1781.

BDESERTED from the Brig LOCKHART, the 18th of October Inst. *Paul Junkins*, Master, a Sailor named *Michael Tool*, about 30 Years of Age, a well set likely Fellow, about five Feet eight Inches high, an Irish Man, speaks pretty good English: Had on when he went away a short blue Jacket, Tarr'd Trowsers, a small round Hatt, light Stockings, and a Pair of new Shoes. Whoever will apprehend or discover said Runaway so that he be brought to Justice, shall receive FIVE DOLLARS Reward of NATHANIEL BARRELL *Oct. 25*. [NHG, adv. October 26, 1764] Barrell had committed Tool to jail for debt on October 13. No date of release is recorded.
