Originally the Converted to apartments in by Thomas H. Odion, which it remained until 1981 conversion to condominiums. Extended eaves, canted mansard roof with pedimented dormers (4 x 2). Inset doorways with transom light and sidelights. Door surrounds consist of panelled piers, wide frieze band, dentil frieze and projecting cornice. Fishscale slate roof with curb cornice. 6/6 sash.

An austere brick building enlivened by the heavy Greek Revival door surrounds, extended eaves and mansard roof with dormers. An interesting eclectic combination which relates well to the Fraser and Colcord houses across Pleasant Street.

According to Brewster, the building was unsuccessful as a church because of the westward movement of population within Portsmouth (presumably referring to the movement out South and Middle Streets and the area between.
