Greek Revival entry porch with corner posts set on granite parapets. Cut granite foundation. Granite front yard curbing. Doorway has transom light and full length sidelights.

House form is mid-18C but doorway, portico extensive use of granite, high 1st story windows with lengthened lintels point to c. 1820 Greek Revival work. cf. Leonard Cotton house on Washington St., a Georgian house with Greek Revival work. According to Garvin, the hammered granite foundation, if original, should date the house 1790s or later.

Howells relates that Capt. Charles Blunt was the original owner, and that the house was occupied in the 1840s and 1850s by Capt. March, a builder of clipper ships, including the Franklin Peirce, the Frank Jones and the Granite State. The Howell's photograph shows the house clapboarded, before the appli-ation of the existing wood shingles.
