



Upon the slope of Shepard Hill,




DEATH OF SURGEON DE BRULER.

Officer of the Gunboat Paducah Victim of Dilatation of the Heart.

SAN JUAN, P.R., May 8.—An autopsy on the body of Passed Assistant Surgeon James P. De Bruler of the gunboat Paducah shows that death was caused by acute dilatation of the heart.

The remains will be embalmed and sent to Evansville, Ind., for interment.

Dr. James Presbury De Bruler entered the navy in January, 1903. He was promoted in 1906 to be Passed Assistant Surgeon, and was assigned to the Paducah in the same year. He was born in Indiana and appointed to the navy from that State.

Nearly 1,000 Men Will March—Music by
Three Bands

The Memorial day parade on Monday next week will be the largest to be held in this city for many years, and it is expected that nearly 1000 men will be in line. The following orders have been issued by the chief marshal, Capt. J. Albert Sanborn:

Memorial Day Exercises, May 31, 1909.

GENERAL ORDER, NO. 1.

The parade on Memorial day, the 31st inst., will be formed in three divisions. The several units of each division will rendezvous at 1.55 sharp, as per circular instructions from these headquarters forwarded to the commanders of the same. The line will be formed promptly at 2 o'clock p. m. The column will move at 2.05 o'clock. The 1st and 2nd divisions will form on Court street, right resting on Pleasant street. The 3rd division will form on Market square, right resting on Congress block, and will take its place in line, as the left of the 2nd division clears its front.

ON SECOND MISSION OF PEACE.

Under Command of Rear Admiral Sebree, Fleet Consisting of Eight Armored Cruisers Clears at San Francisco Today for 28,000 Mile Journey to China, Japan, Hawaii and the Admiralty Islands.





Today there will sail from the Golden Gate a squadron of Uncle Sam's machines of war sent on an errand of peace. Eight of the strongest and fastest armored cruisers in the service will plow their way across the Pacific into oriental waters carrying to the peoples of Japan and China messages of good will and friendship from the citizens of this country.

The second "peace fleet" is not so powerful nor imposing as the first, but nevertheless made up of vessels representing the very acme of naval construction in their type.

The squadron consists of the cruisers Tennessee, California, South Dakota, Washington, West Virginia, Colorado, Maryland and Pennsylvania, all 22-knot ships, ranging from 13,000 to 15,000 tons in displacement.

According to the navy department's schedule, the vessels will arrive at Honolulu, Hawaii, Sept 11, where they will remain until Oct 5. Their next stop will be at Nares Harbor, Admiralty islands, off the coast of New Guinea, and from there they will steam to Manila, where they are expected to arrive about Nov 1. Then will come a month of hard work at target practice, upon the completion of which the vessels of the fleet will separate, and in pairs visit the ports of the Hermit kingdom and China. The ships will leave Manila on Dec 1 for the various ports as follows:



On the 19th the fleet will reassemble off Yokohama and steam for home. They will pay another visit to Hawaii from Feb 1st to 8th, and are expected to reach San Francisco about Feb 15.

During this five month's cruise, which will approximate 28,000 miles, the squadron will be under the command of one of the ablest naval officers in the service, Rear Admiral Uriel Sebree, a Missouri man, he entered the naval academy during early war times, graduating when only 19 years of age. He has seen service in all quarters of the globe, including the polar regions, being a member of the Arctic relief expedition on the Tigress, in 1873, and on the Greeley relief expedition under Admiral Schley in 1884.


In Honolulu, Manila and the ports of Japan and China, where the fleet is to stop, arrangements for the reception of the men and officers are being made. The festivities will be conducted on no mean scale and the men will be well taken care of during the stopovers. At Hawaii, where the schedule calls for a double stop, the Americans are planning a monster celebration, including a parade, open air theatricals and an athletic tournament. Every evening during the stay of the fleet, there will be an elaborate display of fireworks.

The plans for the receptions at foreign ports have not as yet been announced, but the sailors feel that they will be accorded the same hearty hospitality shown to the men of the first American "peace fleet."

ADMIRALTY ISLANDS.

Latitude: 2 degrees South.
Longitude 146 -- 147 degrees East.

The Admiralty Islands are about 40 in number, of volcanic and coral formation. They are densely wooded, the cocoanut tree and other tropical growth abounding. There are few if any animals, other than those brought by visiting ships, on the islands. These islands were discovered by the Dutch navigator Willem Cornelis Schouten in 1616, who is remembered as he who first rounded Cape Horn and gave it its name. They were named by Philip Carteret in 1767.

The inhabitants number about 800 and are of the Black race: described as "frizzle headed savages." It is said that, in some parts of the islands, these natives still practice cannibalism.

The Islands were annexed by Germany in 1885, and now form a part of the Bismarck Archipelago.

The largest island of the group is Admiralty Island which is 50 miles long and having an elevation of 3000 feet. Nares Harbor is at the northwestern side of this island and is named after Sir Geo. Strong Nares, Vice-Admiral, English Navy.
