## Description:

Narrow late 18th/early 19th century center chimney house with 4-part facade originally gable end to Deer St. New 6/6 sash, wood shingle roof, foundation and clapboards. Originally triangular pedimented door, with plain pilasters, entablature with transom below. New 6 panel door.

The triangular pediment and pilastered doorway, triple-run stairway and interior finish surviving in the house suggest a date in the last quarter of the 18th century (NR form).

## Significance:

As an example of an almost unaltered interior and exterior in a small urban vernacular building of the late 18th century, the house is one of a small number of such structures remaining in Portsmouth. It is illustrative of the simple urban building practices of the late colonial period. Its original location opposite the noted Michael Whidden house, suggests a possible attribution to that carpenter builder whose major work includes the Governor Langdon Mansion and other elaborate buildings of the pre and post Revolutionary period (from NR form).
