


BOILING ROCK

PJ 24 Feb 83 -- We are informed by Mr. Wm. Pickering, that during a recent cold snap there was a complete ice bridge across the Piscataqua river near Boiling Rock, over which three venturesome, not to say rackless boys went in safety. It last but a short time, breaking up at the next turn of the tide. It was a remarkable occurrence, which is not paralleled in the recollection of those living near the river. The current is very rapid at that point, and the river at least a quarter of a mile wide.

Notes Boiling rock is located in Newington. It is in the Piscataqua River at the end of Boiling Rock Rd. If one were to cross Woodbury Ave. (formerly Bloody Point Rd.) from Gosling Rd (named in 1759) going East toward the river.

Boiling Rock is in the part of the Piscataqua known as the Long Reach.

Boiling Rock landing was used from the earliest times as a public landing and was probably used in transporting the Fug's waste to ships in the pool between Great Island and Portsmouth.

Notes Boiling rock is located in Newington. It is in the Piscataqua River at the end of Boiling Rock Rd. If one were to cross Woodbury Ave (formerly Bloody Point Rd) from Goolish Rd (named in 1759) going East toward the river.

Boiling Rock is in the part of the Piscataqua known as the Long Beach.

Boiling Rock landing was used from the earliest times as a public landing and was probably used in transporting the King's Wastes to ships in the pool between Great Island and Portsmouth.
