the 8th Janry. 1778 came to a resolution that the Clerk should be directed
to call upon the Rector & request him to render an account
of the moneys he had from time to time received for digging
Vaults for the use of private families & common Graves in
the land then lately purchased, & the Clerk was accordingly
directed to call upon the Rector for that purpose.

Then the Tax for defraying the Expenses of the Parish for the present year was laid as follows —

On the Rents of all the Houses in Bridge Town, one Shilling and four pence in the pound on said Rents —

On all lands in the Parish, Two Shillings and six pence per acre.

And that the Highway Tax be as follows

On the Rents of all the houses in Bridge Town, One penny halfpenny in the pound on said Rents

On the Tax laid on Trade, Six pence in the pound

Mr Michael Keane attended the Vestry & informed them that he had a power of Attorney to receive the Manumission Interest money due to Mary Ann Harrington, who he said he personally knew, & was ready to attest that she was alive when he left the Island of St Vincent, & was the identical person who was freed, some of the Vestry observed that at a former meeting it was carried by a majority that no Manumission Interest money should be paid but to the persons themselves, & that they were not instituted to any annuity when off the Island, and it being observed by Mr Mayers that upon a reconsideration of the former resolution of this Vestry, he thought it militated against the Law itself: for the Law clearly stated, that the annual Interest of such Sums, should be allowed the party Manumitted, & at the time the Law made, £50 was meant as a deposit to raise such annuity, he therefore it would be frustrating the end of the Law, not to pay it & as it clearly appeared to him, that the party was alive

alive, she had a right to delegate a power to W^r Keane to receive it, & notwithstanding the former resolution of the Board, yet every case was to stand upon its own circumstances, and therefore in this case he was of Opinion, that the claim of annuity set up by W^r Keane in behalf of Mary Ann Hammington should be paid. It was then motioned by Thos Maxwell Esq & seconded by Colonel Keeling that the money be paid. The Question was then put; If the annuity should be paid or not; and it was carried that it should. The members voting as follows - That it should. Joseph Mayers, The Hon^{ble} Joseph Keeling. Henry Trotman, Thomas M^cIntosh, Henry Edey, James Fraser, Thomas Maxwell & George Walrond Esquires, that they ought not to be paid. John Beckles, John Arthur Chase, John Pettejohn & Thomas Woodin Esquires

The Warden was then directed to pay W^r Keane the amount due Mary Ann Hammington -

Then Thomas Woodin Esq, the Gentleman in turn to succeed to the Wardenship on 25th March next, proposed to the Vestry Thomas Griffith & Dotin Maycock Esq^s as his Sureties for the faithful discharge of his Office agreeably to Law, & he then withdrew, upon which the Vestry present unanimously approved the Security offered & ordered the same be entered in this day's minutes

Keeling that as Doctor Whartons health was very much impaired in the long + faithful discharge of his duty in the Parish, as a grateful return for such services, that the sum of £60 currency should be added to his present, this year, which was unanimously agreed to.

Thomas Hallett, attended the Vestry + acquainted them, that he had served out the time he was indentured for to the business of a Weaver, + that he would be very thankful to them to give him the Weaving materials belonging to the Parish, that he may be able to work at his profession; the Rev. Mr. Dent speaking very favourable of him, the Vestry requested Mr. Dent to give Hallett the possession of the Weaving Materials, + directed the Clerk to give Mr. Dent up the receipt he gave for the Loom, Spinning Engine, a Clock Reel, a Weavers Swift, four pair of Cotton Cards. Two spinning wheels, a washing frame, an hour glass + a bobbin frame with Twenty Three bobbins -

The Warden was desired to give Mrs Ann Sanderson. Five pounds to assist her in her intended Voyage to America -

Mr Robert Clarke attended the Vestry and informed them that Mr John Thomson had resigned the Office of Register in Chancery, & he had accepted of it; & that he was informed the Vestry had laid a Tax of £15. on the Office, which he assured them was more than it could bear, & that he would be obliged to them to reconsider the matter. Mr Clarke was asked what he thought the Office could afford to pay, who assured them not more than £10. The Vestry then ordered £5. to be taken off. Then Doctor John Crawford a Surveyor for the last
the last year attended the Vestry & delivered in ^{his} Captain
Valentine Clarke's account, & said they both having being

Mr Henry Bourne also attended with his account the settlement of which was defer'd till the expiration of the year.

Rebuilding of the Church

Then the Warden laid before the Vestry a letter he had received from the Rev'd W. Saml Dent which was by order read & is as follows viz:

Dear Sir

Having determined to pay a visit to General Mathew at Granada, in consequence of a very kind & pressing invitation. I hope yourself & the Gentlemen of the Vestry will be so obliging as to excuse me from the duties of this Parish, & to permit me to be absent for three

or four weeks, in order to take a view of the Parish & Island, & from thence to draw a conclusion with respect to my final determination.

Doct^r Wharton is already acquainted with my resolution, & has kindly promised to provide for the discharge of the Duties of the Lectureship till my return.

The last Minutes being read, The Wardens then observed that as Monday was School day it was necessary that a Master be appointed for the care & Mission of the Parish Children, whereupon Coll^o Keeling proposed W^r John Odell, and was seconded by W^r Chase as a person properly qualified for that office, which ^{was} unanimously approved of.
