



The poultry situation has a brighter outlook than it has had for several months due to the fact that storage stocks are considerably below the five year average and less than 60 per cent of last year's stock, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. J. O. Boatwright of Memphis.

The number of hens on farms is below the 5 year average and below April 1st numbers for 1929 and 1930. Commercial hatchings for this year also are about 40 per cent below last year, and storage stocks of dressed poultry are moving out at a faster rate than they have for the past five

These conditions should brighten the hopes of poultrymen who have on hand their usual number of young chickens from which to develope pullets for winter layers, states A. J. Chadwell, U. T. Extension Poultry-
