These abstracts of obituaries, death notices and funeral notices have been extracted from the Delaware Gazette. Every effort has been made to extract the information as it was originally printed. Names are reproduced as they were published, with no attempt to resolve differences in spelling for what appeared to be the same family name. The oratory and prose of the obituaries are not included.

All survivors mentioned are listed. In the case of cause of death, that too is included. Some of the terms for a disease are no longer in use, or are known by other names today.

In many cases the only mention of a death or funeral appears in the weekly columns contributed by correspondents from the Townships and small villages, such as Ostrander, Bridle, Berlin, Woodgrove, etc., and are indicated at the beginning of the citation, such as Brown or Hyattsville. Some of the deaths are mentioned more than once.

<u>January 1, 1918</u> - Mr. William G. Hoffman, aged 75 yr, died at his home on Heffner St., Thursday night. Death was due to Bright's disease. The remains will be conveyed to Leo, WV, the former home, where funeral services and burial will take place. His widow, four sons and six brothers survive.

Jay William Corzilius, 4 mo old son of Mr. & Mrs. Fred Corzilius, of N. Union St., died of bronchial pneumonia at the home of Mr. Corzilius' mother in Grove City Thursday. Funeral services and burial will take place in Grove City on Saturday.

The funeral services over the remains of Miss Lillian E. Smothers, 17 yr old daughter of Mr. Albert Smothers of Africa, were held at the Africa church Thursday conducted by Rev. O. G. McKinley. The young lady pall bearers were Misses Bessie Moore, Lottie Mason, Olive Neal, Maymie Wood, Carrie Wood, and Callie Patterson. Burial in Africa cemetery.

Mr. Charles Wilcox, aged 83 yr, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. W. James in Berlin, Saturday. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. James and Mrs. D. S. Sparrow, of Cheshire; also two sisters and two brothers: Mrs. Laura Everett of Berlin; Mrs. Mary Butt, of Westerville; Mr. John Wilcox, of Berlin; and Mr. Ed Wilcox, who is in the West. The funeral services were held at the residence Monday, conducted by Rev. E. M. Page. The pall bearers were Messrs. Joseph Rousch, C. J. Slough, William Fisher, John Richardson, Charles Hensel, Thomas Griffith and Martin Smith. Burial in the Cheshire cemetery.

Miss Freundin A. Johnson, aged 19 yr, daughter of Rev. & Mrs. F. I. Johnson, of W. Lincoln Ave., died at the home of her parents. Death was caused by endocarditis, or inflammation of the heart. Miss Johnson was graduated from Delaware High School last year and was a first year student at Ohio Wesleyan University this year. She was a member of Asbury church. The funeral services will be held in Asbury church Wednesday conducted by Dr. R. H. Walker, assisted by Dr. R. T. Stevenson. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

Obituary. Nehemiah Martin was born in Troy Twp, Delaware Co, OH, August 23, 1830 and departed this life November 5, 1917, aged 87 yr 2 mo 8 da. He united with the Marlborough Baptist church at the age of 14 yr. He was united in marriage to Eliza A. Risher May 1, 1855 and to this union ten children were born, four daughters having preceded him. He leaves his wife and six children and one brother. The children are: Lawrence W., of Columbus; James Elwin of Delaware, Benjamin L, of Ashley; Mrs. Wm. Pickett and Mrs. Nettie Risher of Delaware, and Wesley C. at home. One brother, James W. Martin of Troy Twp. Mr. Martin was a life long resident of Troy Twp. For the past

ten years he has been totally blind. The funeral was held November 8, 1917 at the Marlborough church, conducted by Elder Wellie Shoemaker, assisted by Elder Thomas. Pall bearers were all grandsons of Mr. Martin. Interment in Marlborough cemetery. Mr. Martin was a soldier in the Civil War. He belonged to Co C, 145th regiment O. V. I. Farming and stock raising was his lifelong occupation. The old farm on the Horseshoe road on which he and Mrs. Martin had lived sixty-two years has been owned by the Martin's for over 100 years. Benjamin Martin, grandfather of Nehemiah, came from Virginia in the winter of 1812, and settled on this farm. He built a log house and before it was completed he was drafted into the army and marched through the woods to Sandusky, OH, to fight the Indians, leaving his family in a partly finished log house, in the dead of winter, and the constant dread of attack by the Indians. Benjamin Martin's family was composed of 7 boys and 4 girls. James, the oldest son, was the father of Nehemiah. He next came into possession of the farm, and then it was purchased by Nehemiah in about 1856. The large brick house was built in 1832, and Nehemiah, then only two years old, walked across the first log that was laid over the cellar of the house that later proved to be his home for 62 years. Nehemiah had a splendid memory and greatly enjoyed telling incidents of his young days. Mr. & Mrs. Martin celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary May 1, 1915. Mr. Martin was a local correspondent of the Delaware Gazette for a great many years and the family have scrap books containing articles written by him more than fifty years ago.

January 4, 1918 - Obituary. Charles Wilcox, son of Martin and Lottie Wilcox, was born in Outville, Licking Co, OH, October 30, 1834. Died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Walter James, December 29, 1917, aged 83 yr 2 mo. He was united in marriage to Harriet Williamson, July 9, 1857. To this union were born five children, three of the number with the mother preceding him to the great beyond, leaving two daughters, Mrs. Dorton Barrows and Mrs. Walter James, eleven grandchildren and seven great grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. James Budd and Mrs. Laura Everetts, and one half sister, Mrs. Maurice Jaycox; two brothers, Mr. John Wilcox and Mr. Edwin Wilcox. May 30, 1912, the wife "passed over" and a few years later his daughter, Mrs. James Young was taken. The two children, Lizzie and Leonard, died in their childhood. Mr. Wilcox spent most of his life in Delaware County. He and his wife were members of the Baptist church.

Rev J. W. Icenbarger, former pastor of the Baptist church here, died December 31, at Dayton. He had suffered a stroke of paralysis several days previous. He died at the home of his son, F. T. Icenbarger. Since his retirement Rev. Icenbarger divided his time between Dayton and Sidney. Burial was in Woodland cemetery.

Obituary. Mrs. Wm. Harris, formerly Miss Jennie Morris, was born in Troy Twp, Delaware Co, June 18, 1868. She departed this life in Berlin Twp, in December 1917. She was the youngest daughter of John and Sarah Morris, deceased. She is survived by four brothers: Charles, William, Arch and Bert and by three sisters: Mrs. Mary Williams, Mrs. Alice Mansur and Mrs. Kittie Dix. Another sister, Mrs. Lizzie Foust preceded her in death. All her early life was spent in Troy Twp until September 17, 1895, at 27 yr of age, she was

joined in marriage with Wm. Harris, of Berlin Twp and spent the remainder of her life with him there, save for one year when they removed to Marion, OH.

Mr. J. R. Pumphrey died Wednesday at his home on W. William St., following an illness of long duration. Hardening of the arteries was the principal illness. He was 71 yr old. Mr. Pumphrey had been a resident of Delaware for the past 33 years. He was born in Knox Co, near Centerburg. He was one of the most extensive real estate men of the city. He was for many years President of the Hotel Donavin Company. He was a member of the People's Building and Loan Association until about two years ago. For six years he served as Delaware County Commissioner. Mr. Pumphrey was a member of the Masonic Lodge. The deceased is survived by his widow, seven children and two sisters. They are Mr. Hoard Pumphrey, of this city; Mrs. E. G. Chenoweth, Blue Island, IL; Mrs. William Hunter, Ligonier, PA; Mr. R. P. Pumphrey, New York City; Mr. C. C. Pumphrey, Decatur, IN; and Miss Mildred Pumphrey at home, all children. The sisters are Mrs. T. D. Updyke of Centerburg and Mrs. S. F. McClelland of Pasadena, CA. The funeral service will be private and will be held Friday, conducted by Dr. A. E. Day pastor of William St. church. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

The funeral services of Mr. Dana Thurston were held at his father's home on Lake St., Thursday conducted by Dr. A. E. Day who was assisted by Rev. L. E. Rush. The pall bearers were Messrs. F. F. Thurston, George Young, Cloyd Burkhart, John Lowe, Carl Simpson and Frank Dyke. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

Mr. Dana L. Thurston, aged 28 yr, died at St. Luke's Hospital, Cleveland, Monday as the result of diabetes. The decesed was the son of Mr. & Mrs. L. T. Thurston of Lake St.

The funeral of Miss Freundin Johnson was held at Asbury church Wednesday conducted by Dr. R. H. Walker and Dr. R. T. Stevenson of this city. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery. Pall bearers were Messrs. Irwin Gephart, Frank Gooding, Amos Tarbill, Robert Hook, Archie Childs and Charles Hammond of Conneaut.

<u>January 8, 1918</u> - Dr. Ira H. LaFetra, graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University in 1872, died at the Methodist Hospital in Los Angeles, CA. He had been a missionary in Chille for over twenty five years. He was born in Harveysburg, OH, in 1851.

Mrs. Dorothy Barden Cole, aged 97 yr, Marysville's oldest pioneer citizen, died Thursday as the result of infirmities of advanced age. Mrs. Cole was the mother of the late Mrs. Fairbanks, wife of former Vice President Charles Fairbanks, of Indianapolis. The funeral services will be held Saturday at the residence in Marysville.

Rev. Daniel W. Lambert, aged 80, died at his home in Westerville from infirmities of age. He has been a resident of Westerville for twenty five years. Rev. Lambert was a member

of the Scioto Conference, United Brethren church. Besides his wife, three daughters, and three sons survive.

Mr. Thomas J. Griffin, aged 57 yr, well known grocery man of East Delaware, died at his home on E. Central Ave., Monday following an illness of long duration with Bright's disease. Mr. Griffin has been an invalid for several years. Mr. Griffin was a director of the Delaware National Bank and also the People's Building and Loan Association. He is survived by his widow and one sister, Mrs. Mary Weldon of Chicago. Funeral services from St. Mary's church Thursday conducted by Rev. Father John H. Warrner. The remains will be placed in the vault.

January 11, 1918 - Mr. Frank Strahl, of Westerville, suffered a heart stroke while shoeing a horse Monday. Mr. Strahl was 56 yr of age and a Westerville blacksmith. His death occurred just a week after that of his brother. Surviving are one son, Mr. Leslie Strahl, of Hopedale, OH; three daughters, Mrs. Fred Snyder, Mrs. Clarence McCombs and Mrs. Charles Vaulkner all of Westerville; a brother of Pickering and a sister Mrs. William Barer of Columbus.

Word was received in the city, Tuesday telling of the death of Mrs. J. E. Haas, aged 69 yr in Marion. Death was caused by pleurisy contracted New Years Day. The deceased is survived by her husband, six children, two sisters and one brother. The children are Mrs. Frank Vining, Mr. C. O. Haas, Mr. W. E. Haas, Mrs. Edward Schweitzer, all of this city and Mrs. Frances Rogers of Marion and Mr. J. B. Haas of Sharon, PA. Mrs. John Huffman and Mrs. J. Coone, both of Crestline, are sisters. Mr. Joseph Frank of Eldora, Iowa is a brother. The funeral services will be held at St. Mary's church, Delaware, Thursday.

Mr. Thomas Fox, aged 49 yr, was instantly killed and Mrs. Charles Emerson narrowly escaped a similar fate, Tuesday when an explosion of a steam boiler in the Fox laundry, located at the corner of Union St., and Fountain Ave., occurred, the concussion being so strong it was felt for several blocks. The explosion was violent enough to hurl the boiler nearly two hundred feet into the air and it dropped to the ground nearly 250 feet away. Mr. Fox had operated the laundry for the past two years. He is survived by his widow and four children, the eldest being Miss Jennie Fox aged 17 yr, a senior at Delaware High School. The other children are Margaret, Alden and Eleanor. The funeral services will be held from the residence on N. Union St., Thursday. Burial in Claibourne cemetery, Union Co.

Mrs. John C. Sauer of N. Henry St., has received word of the death of her brother-in-law, Mr. John Meyers, which occurred at his home in Columbus. Funeral services will be held from the Cathedral, Columbus, Saturday. Mrs. Saur and daughter Nellie will attend.

The funeral of Mr. T. J. Griffin, were held Thursday from St. Mary's church, conducted by Rev. Father John H. Wagner. The remains were placed in Oak Grove vault to await

final interment. The honorary pall bearers were Messrs. E. I. Pollock, T. M. Thomson, James McDonald, Robert Parker, Jr., George Parker, Wm. McKinzie. The active pall bearers were Messrs. J. F. Gaynor, W. F. Gannon, Jerry Hanning, John Enright, Ed McChristian, Daniel Cummins.

The funeral services over the remains of Mrs. J. E. Haas of Marion were held at St. Mary's church in this city Thursday, conducted by Rev. Father Denning of Marion. The pall bearers were Messrs. Wm. Haas, Vincent Haas, Charles Haas, Frank Vining, Edward Schweitzer and Chas. Vining. Interment in St. Mary's cemetery.

Obituary. Dana Leroy Thurston was born March 23, 1890 at Glenford, OH, and died December 21, 1917 at St. Luke's Hospital, Cleveland at the age of 27 yr 9 mo 5 da. He was the son of Leroy and Nettie Thurston, and the grandson of Rev. Frederick Thurston, for many years a minister of the Methodist church and also a grandson of Rufus Dike. He joined the Methodist church at Irvington, Alabama, in 1911.

Obituary. Mr. E. J. Hayman, who passed away on Monday December 31, 1917, and was laid at rest in Evergreen cemetery, Newport, KY, Thursday January 3, 1918, aged 63 yr. His work was that of representative for the C. D. Osborne Glove House, Chicago, IL.

<u>January 15, 1918</u> - Joan Grace Nooks, 6 mo old daughter of Marie Nooks, died Thursday. The funeral services will be held Saturday at the residence on Ross St., Rev. Mr. Lowe will conduct the service. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

Mrs. D. M. Weiser received word Wednesday of the death of her brother, Mr. C. F. Sellar, a former resident of Delaware which occurred at Paris, IL.

The funeral services of Mr. Thomas A. Fox were held at the residence on N. Union St., Thursday, Rev. Mr. Baker conducted the service. The remains were taken by motor to Claibourne cemetery, Union Co, for burial.

Mr. Fred M. Sheets, son of Mr. Montie Sheets, died in a Gallipolis hospital Tuesday. The remains were brought to this city on Friday and taken to the home of his grandparents, Mr. & Mrs. Fred Force, on W. Central Ave. The burial services were held in the Kilbourne Presbyterian church Saturday. Burial was in Kilbourne cemetery.

Joseph Lawrence VanBrimmer, aged 17 mo, died at the home of his parents Mr. & Mrs. J. L. VanBrimmer, in Cleveland January 9. The remains were brought to this city Saturday and taken to the Miller Morgue where they will remain until weather conditions will permit services and burial at Warrensburg, the home of the family.

Mr. Timothy Ryan died Sunday at the Jane M. Case hospital as the result of complications from injuries sustained in a fall on the ice a short time ago. Mr. Ryan has been a resident

of Delaware for forty years. During the past 35 years he has been employed at the Delaware Chair Factory. Surviving are two brothers and two sisters, who are: Mr. Celeatine Ryan, of Louisville; Mr. Joseph Ryan of Delaware; Mrs. Thomas O'Keefe, of Toledo; Miss Catherine Ryan, at home. The funeral will be held from St. Mary's church Wednesday.

Mrs. Elizabeth Maugans, widow of Mr. Martin Maugans, one of the oldest residents of Ostrander, passed away Thursday. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Leroy Thompson and Mrs. Mary Turney. Also three grandchildren, Mr. Gordon Turney, Mrs. Bernice Thompson, and Mr. Don Thompson. Funeral services were held Friday.

Mr. William W. Ryder, aged 81 yr, died as the result of pneumonia at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Anderson Moore, with whom he made his home at Bellpoint, Sunday. The deceased is a brother of the late Mr. Granville Ryder, former jeweler of Delaware.

Funeral services for Dr. Harvey C. Keous were held Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Samuel T. Carvey, Neil Ave., Columbus. A practicing physician in Columbus for 25 years, his death occurred on Thursday from cerebral hemorrhage. Dr. Keous was 63 yr old and had practiced ten years in Delaware before locating in Columbus. He was a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and Starling - Ohio Medical College. He belongs to York Lodge and Scottish Rite Masons. His widow and daughter survive. Burial at Green Lawn cemetery, Columbus.

Mr. Morris Lynch, aged 62 yr, died at his home on E. Winter St., Saturday. He is survived by one sister, Miss Ann Lynch. Funeral services will be held at St. Mary's church, Tuesday. Burial in St. Mary's cemetery.

Obituary. Mrs. Ann Scott Brown Massey, eldest child of Dr. Gustavas Alexander Scott Brown and his wife Ann Murphy was born at the White Post, VA, January 3, 1829, and departed this life at Delaware, OH, July 19, 1917. She was 89 yr of age. Her ancestry is a notable one. Among her forbearers being knights and ladies of old Puritan and Cavalier wars, and many in America noted in the profession of medicine, law and arms. She was the seventh generation in direct line of decent from the Princess Christina, niece of Gustavas Adolphus, King of Sweden, who was compelled by her family to relinquish her royal claim because of her marriage in 1831 to a commoner, the young Scottish soldier of fortune, Cadet David Brown. Mrs. Massey's father was the son of William Brown, an attorney of wealth and prominence in the region of the Shenandoah Valley. The father of William Brown, Esq., was Dr. William Brown, a Surgeon General in the Revolutionary War. A brother of this Dr. William Brown was also a famous physician who was a frequent professional and social visitor at Mt. Vernon and who, with Doctors Dick and Craik, attended General Washington in his last illness. The father of Dr. William Brown was the Rev. Richard Brown, a minister of the English Establishment. His father was Dr. Gustavas Brown, of Port Tobacco, MD, who immediately following his graduation from the University of Edenburgh sailed in a merchant vessel for America. The parents of this Dr. Gustavas Brown were Gustavas and Lady Jean Mitchelson of Dolkeith, Scotland, and so on back for nearly 300 years we trace her distinguished ancestry. Her brother, the Rev. Alexander Gustavas Brown, D.D., an eminent minister of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, preceded her to the saints' everlasting rest by some 17 years. She was the mother of eleven children, 4 of whom preceded her in death, Mrs. Dora LaGoullan, Walter Massey, Edward Massey, and Wirt Massey. Those surviving are George T. Massey, Lorain, OH; A. B. Massey, Danville, KY; Anna Pierpoint, Topeka, KA; Mary Baker, Monaaca, PA; Irene Kober, Toledo, OH; Wilfred Massey, Dayton, OH; and Adela M. Irwin, Delaware, OH, besides some 40 grandchildren. At the time of her death she ws making her home at her daughter's Mrs. A. M. Irwin, Delaware, where she had been for the past two years. She was laid to rest on Sunday July 22, 1917, in Oak Grove cemetery.

January 18, 1918 - Mr. Charles W. Webster, 75 former county auditor and a Civil War veteran died Tuesday as the result of a stroke of paralysis, suffered Sunday. Mr. Webster had been in good health until suddenly stricken. For two terms from 1881 to 1888, Mr. Webster was Auditor of Delaware County. At the close of this service he entered the mercantile business, first at Berkshire and later going to Sunbury where he operated a mercantile business for four years. He then went to Columbus where he was engaged in business for 25 years. On his retirement two years ago, he returned to Berkshire to make his home. During three years of the Civil War, Mr. Webster served as a member of Company F 121st O. V. I. He is survived by his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Bert Armstrong and Mrs. Edna Blair of Columbus, and Mrs. A. F. Elkins of Chicago and one son, Mr. L. G. Webster of Columbus. Funeral services will be held Thursday from the residence. Burial in Sunbury cemetery.

Obituary. Thomas Alta Fox was born at Hudson, MI, September 27, 1868, died at Delaware, OH, January 8, 1918, aged 49 yr 3 mo 11 da. He was left an orphan in his early years, his father deceased in 1880 and mother in 1882. The family of five brothers, Adelbert, Charles, John, Fenn and Alph, and three sisters Clara, Mary and Lizzie remained unbroken. The first deceased was Clara in October 1917. He was united in marriage to Charlotte Wright at Mapel Dell, Magnetic Springs, OH, June 8, 1899. To this union were born three daughters, Jennie, Margaret and Eleanor, and two sons, Foster and Alden. One infant son, Foster, died January 15, 1903. His early years were spent on the farm. Later he worked in machine shops and attended school at Adrian, MI, and Ada, OH. Mr. Fox entered the laundry business in 1899. With his years of expensive with machinery, it remains an unsolved problem to his friends what occasioned the terrible explosion of the boiler that caused his instant and tragic death.

The remains of Mr. S. L. Inscho, who died at the home of his sister in Springfield Tuesday, were brought to Delaware Wednesday and taken to the Miller Morgue. The funeral services were held at Oak Grove chapel, Thursday conducted by Rev. F. I. Johnson. Burial was made in Oak Grove cemetery.

The funeral services of Mrs. Kate Alspach were held at the residence on Harrison St., Thursday conducted by Rev. E. R. Stafford assisted by Rev. Aura Smith. The pall bearers were Messrs Dan Benton, P. L. Hammond, L. D. Henry and W. A. Morrison. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

Word has been received of the death at Springfield, presumably Tuesday of Mr. Stiles Inscho, aged about 75 yr, and a resident of N. Union St., Delaware. Mr. Inscho became ill some weeks ago and was taken to the home of his daughter at Springfield, where he has since remained.

Richard Clark Swan, 11 mo old son of Mr. & Mrs. Leonard Swan, of Troy Twp, died Monday. Funeral services were held Thursday. Burial in Troy cemetery.

Mrs. Kate Alspach, aged 58 yr, died at her home on Harrison St., Tuesday following a year's illness. She is survived by her husband, one daughter, Mrs. Ora Whitman, three sons, Messrs. Ninde, Urlan and Ivan Alspach, three brothers, Mr. Aliner Hisey, of Johnstown; Mr. E. R. Hisey, of Wyoming and Mr. E. L. Hisey of Granville; two sisters, Mrs. Frank Phillips, of Galena and Mrs. J. H. Esmond of Columbus. Funeral services will be held from the residence, Thursday conducted by Rev. E. R. Stafford. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

Obituary. Charles S. Seller, 52 yr old, real estate dealer in Paris, IL, died Thursday January 17, at his residence in that city. There are many who are ill with influenza but are recovering as are the students at OWU. Mr. William Filler Welch was 25 yr of age. He was a son of Mr. & Mrs. F. P. Welch of W. Central Ave. His death occurred Thursday. The young man was chief electrician officer at the Marconi Wireless Station at New Brunswick, NJ. He came to Delaware Tuesday October 4 on a four day furlough to visit his mother. He had complained of feeling ill Tuesday. Mr. Welch is survived by his parents and two sisters, Amy Louise and Ann Elizabeth. Funereal services will be held Saturday from the residence. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery. Mr. Paul Jordan son of Mr. & Mrs. I. M. Jordan of S. Sandusky St., passed away Thursday, death being caused by Spanish influenza. For several years he had been afflicted with heart trouble, and the present epidemic found his constitution easily susceptible. He was taken ill last Sunday and he grew weaker each day. He was 28 yr of age, having graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1914. He is survived by his father and mother, two sisters, Mrs. Arbenz of Denver, CO and Mrs. Mildred Monroe of Delaware and one brother, Homer who is now in France.
