My mother, Mrs. Anna Riggs Warner, was buried in the Fairhope Cemetery in February, 1926. My father, Horace Everett Warner, died in 1930, and his ashes were later placed in her grave. Some time thereafter I had another plate made for his name and dates, and arranged to have it attached to the cement curb about the lot, and at the same time had the curb reinforced and the lot put into good order.

At the time of my mother's death, my father gave a small amount to the Cemetery, I think a Fairhope town bond, the interest of which was to go towards care of the lot. For about twenty years I have let matters slide, but have doubts whether the income from that bond is now sufficient to pay for more than mowing the grass, and wonder whether there may be need for repairs that would not be covered by it. In that case, I want to attend to and pay for them immediately, but I feel the need of a little provision for the future.

Possibly I might make a small gift now, to augment the amount of that Fairhope bond, and if I could afford it, would prefer to arrange it presently, but possibly it would be easier for me to plan a small legacy to the Cemetery Association, for a small income available after I cease to need it myself.

Will you kindly inform me as to the following: (1) What is the present condition of the Warner lot? Does it need special treatment of any kind? (2) Income from the bond bought in 1926? I imagine that series may have matured and the amount reinvested. Does it continue to yield about the same income, and how much more do you think is needed to provide for minor contingencies? At that time it seemed as if a town bond was about as safe and convenient form of investment as any; what is its present status -- if Fairhope bonds still exist? (3) Has the Cemetery had any important additions to its endowment fund in recent years? (4) Does the Association manage to keep the Cemetery as neat and in as good order as formerly, or does it have a tendency to "run down" a little? There were always a good many burials of persons whose friends were unable to look after the graves, which made a great burden on the general upkeep of the Cemetery. Dear Miss Warner:

First may I ask your pardon for my slowness in answering your letter of last August 3d: Mr.& Mrs. Dyson, Mrs. Anne B. Call (my mother) and I are the cemetery committe, all doing our part with out any compensation. My mother is the secretary and I the treasurer of the committee; as my mother has been having trouble with her eyes for the last three years, I have been doing her work as well as my part. Hence I am sometimes rather slow.

Now to your questions: (1) The present condition of the Warner lot is very good and the only thing it might need right now is a little fertilizer so that the winter grass Mrs. Dyson has planted every winter would be a little more lush. (2) In 1926 the cemetery was cared for by the Colony council and the money was not invested in town bonds but in North American Trust shares. At that time they were paying very well, here are the figures of what they have paid in 1950- \$1.26, 1951- \$4.38, 1952- \$1.28. The ten shares are now worth at present market \$18.00 At the time they were bought they paid better than city bonds but as the committee was not appointed at that time I can not tell you much about it. (3) The committee has stared a trust fund hoping to build up a big enough fund so that no matter how the colony or town fare there will be something to care for the cemetery. We had put a charge of \$50.00 on all grave spaces on all not either members and their families, or leasse of the colony Members and their families (that is all at home, such as children or mothers and fathers) have their spaces free as do the leasse so long as they remain leasse. This \$50.00 is put in to the trust fund as are any gifts. We have had no realy large gifts, several of a hundred but not many. We have several thousands but not enough yet to bring in interest enough to pay the care of the grounds. But the colony is giving us so much a year and Mrs. Dyson has done wonders with it. We get many compliments on the care we give. Every winter she has the spaces of those, who have given for the care of their lots, planted to winter grass. I guess this has also answered your question in.4. (5) No the committee is not incorporated, we are all members of the Fairhope Single Tax Corporation and appointe ed by the colony council. Our trust fund is banked as Fairhope Cemetery Trust Fund.

As for a gift to the cemetery, we would appreciate any thing you feel able to do but likely it would be best to leave us a legacy. One never knows how much they will need while in these days of inflation.

Dear Miss Call

Thank you for your letter of September 5th. It explains most satisfactorily everything I wished to know. I recall Mrs. Dyson, and her faithful interest in the cemetery, and am glad to know she is continuing on the committee. I do not definitely remember your mother or yourself.

From your account it seems to me the cemetery is on a better footing than formerly. The trust fund is a good idea. And the charge made to "outsiders" for grave spaces likewise. Unfortunately, many elderly and invalid persons went to Fairhope for reasons of health, but after they had died, their relatives left the town, and often without making provision for their cemetery plots.

I am glad to know the Warner plot looks well. It was planned and curbed (Raymond Dyson did the neat cement work) with the idea of needing minimum care, but it seems to me the income from that original gift, I think supposedly worth \$100, could hardly be expected to go so far in these days. I send a small check towards Mrs. Dyson's winter seeding and fertilizer in general, and shall talk over your letter when I get a chance with my brother, who does not feel the same concern about the Fairhope cemtery that I have, but might be a good adviser about a further gift or legacy. It could not be a very large one, but in any case it would swell the Trust Fund a very little bit, and I hope there will, be some "big" as well as a great many little gifts toward to in course of time.

Dear Miss Call

I feel very guilty to have neglected the matter of the Fairhope Cemetery so long. Your excellent letter of September 5th last gave me much to ponder about, but I was not satisfied about the investment of the fund my father provided for the care of our lot. It is my recollection that he bought a Fairhope Town bond, \$100, which in 1926 was paying 4%, which was to be used for care of the lot. Mrs. Dyson wrote me Hanuary 29th, 1932, saying that the Committee received \$4 annually from the \$100 invested by the Colony Treasurer through the bank. So it may be my father merely gave \$100 to be invested for care of the lot, with the understanding that it would be in form of a 4% bond.

Of course town bonds that were current in 1926 would in all probability have long since matured and the principal reinvested. Also it seemed to me probable that if new issues of bonds yielded a lower rate of interest, reinvestment might be made in other securities. I have made a good many futile attempts to find out about North American Trust, and finally, my brother asked his broker in Keene to look into them. He found the yield on several of the issues now current, but as you did not tell me the date of maturity of the particular shares, we could not get a very definite idea about them, but it would seem as if some of the issues, notably one that should mature this year, are practically worthless.

You told me the market value of the ten shares was \$18 (certainly not \$18 a share, or the yield would be more than it has been). Hence I conclude that when the former bond or other investment came to maturity, and if it was then worth as much as \$100, the amount was invested in very dubious securities. This conclusion is something of a deterrent to my idea of contributing to a permanent Cemetery Endowment. If the funds were invested as unfortunately as that \$100, there is some question whether you would have it very long.

Investment is a puzzling business, and everybody is liable to make foolish ones. But I have seen a number of cases in which trust funds such as these for religious, educational or other purposes, have been invested by banks in securities supposed to be "safe", which not only did not gried yield anything worth while, but proved

eventually to have no capital value. It now looks to me as if the original sum given by my father had practically disappeared. It can no longer yield enough to ensure proper care of the lot; so I think my first responsibility should be to set up another fund for the purpose, rather than contribute to a general endowment fund, although it is reasonable to expect that a larger fund can be handled more efficiently than small individual gifts of a hundred dollars or so.

I would like to know more about the handling and investment of the trust, and what could be done to provide an individual fund that would not be wholly liquidated, as the former is soon likely to be. Can you tell me more about it, or should I get in touch with a trust officer of the Bank of Fairhope?

I indeed appreciate the work of the Cemetery Committee. I knew Mrs. Dyson slightly, and knew she was even then doing wonders in the development of the Cemetery. It really was a sweet spot, and it is good to know that it is being made more and more lovely all the time. You and your mother and the Dysons are surely public benefactors, and I hope your efforts are properly appreciated.

Your letter of July 2d. should have been answered sooner but I have been very busy and I wanted to try to answer your letter carefuly.

In regard to the investment of the \$100 your father gave, we as a committee were not in existence and the investment was made thru! the Colony office and when the committee took over the care of the cemetery the Colony turned over the shares and also gave us a certain amount a year from the general fund: What they give us yearly is in a chequeing account to pay for current work. The charge of \$50 a grave space is put in a savings account in the local bank, when the account became of some size we invested in U.S. government bonds. The interest from the trust share bought with your fathers money is also deposited in the savings account as will the money recieved when it matures in December. Of course you understand that in caring for the cemetery, we must care for the whole and as long as the colony is paying for the general up keep it seems best to add all interest to our trust fund, so that in time the interest will be enough to Now as to the worth of the trust shares

Now as to the worth of the trust shares there is this to remember. Anything bought before 1929 had to stand the shock of the crash. Many investments

don't even exist now that were very good then.

Donations, such as the £10 you sent us last fall we put in the chequeing account and try to see that all who have given anything extra have extra care, such as winter grass etc. We feel that the money your father gave obligates us, regardless of what the investment brings in. At the present wages it takes much more than the interest, even if good,

In regard to any further gifts to the cemetery, for the care of your father's and mother's graves we appreciate any help of course but want you

to do just what ever you think is best.

Thank you for yourse letter of the 18th. Of course I realize that investments are subject to depreciation, but some of them seem to be unluckier than others. It was important to me to know the current value of those North American Trust shares, in order to get solve idea of the investment that would correspond at the present day to even the very modest provision my father planned in 1926.

You indirectly answere my inquiry when you noted that the North American Trust shares "mature in December". My brother made some inquiries through his broker, and got the impression that the issue of 1953 was almost worthless -- some of the issues are, of course, worth more than others. I can make further inquiries of our broker, and consider the probable maturity value of the shares in estimating the amount of investment that would be equivalent at the present time to \$100 in 1926. I imagine that with the increased cost of labor and the like, one could not possibly expect to get the interest from \$100 to go more than half so far.

I realize, also, that whemever any provision whatsoever has been provided for permanent care of graves, the Committee feels an obligation to care for them whether the annual income is sufficient or not, and I know very well that the yield from that \$100 was only barely sufficient at best, and in recent years not anywhere near enough. So I feel that it would be rather "cheap" for me to think of making a gift to the Cemetery endowment in general, when I have not begun to bear my share of expense for my own lot for some time. One can never be sure of providing for the future, but it is possible to provide amply for the present, and I feel very ashamed that I have let matters slide so long.

Since I am getting old and cannot safely put off matters, I am anxious to get this matter clear in my mind, and to be just before I try to be generous! I indeed feel that the Committee is doing wonders with its resources, and wish to cooperate as well as possible. I hope to write you again very soon; this is merely an acknowledgment of your recent letter.

Dear Miss Call

Thanks to the satisfactory information in your recent and previous letters, I can now take the first definite step about the Fairhope Cemetery Fund.

I enclose my check for \$100 (one hundred dollars), made out to the FAIRHOPE CEMETERY TRUST FUND, for care of the graves of Horace Everett and Anna Riggs Warner.

The original receipt given me by Walter Mask does not show the number of the cemetery lot, nor that it was a double space, a fact of which I am quite sure. This is doubtless perfectly clear in the cemetery records, and the number of the lot will doubtless be shown in the receipt or certificate of participation in the Trust Fund. It might be very important at some future time, when my generation has passed away.

My broker in Keene informs me that the North American Trust Shares, series of 1953, are likely to be liquidated at the end of the year at not more than their present price of \$1.91. So the sum provided by my father for care of the lot has practically been exhausted. I am very glad indeed that the Cemetery Fund has been set up on a basis that promises its continuance. It is always the case that large funds can be invested with less danger of extinction by failure of any one company, than small individual funds which have to be treated separately. Some depreciation is inevitable in investment, but there may also be gains in some quarters, to serve to even things up. As the Cemetery Trust Fund increases in size, it ought to be more and more stable with honest handling.

This check does not settle my ideas about a small legacy, but merely makes normal provision for care of the Warner lot.

The childrenhave to take their chances at getting into the cemetery at a future date, with no assurance, they will be near the graves of their parents.

Our cemetery is not for the purpose of making money. It was started by the Fairhope Single Tax Corporation, for the benefit of members and lessees. As we had the only cemetery in town, until recently, we also allowed other towns people to be buried there, at a small charge. Mr. Mask found it an easy way to handle burials when neighboring towns had no cemetery. In fact he buried a number and then appeared with the money. We soon realized that could not continue and forbid any more burials with out the corporations consent.

As we no longer allow our members or lessees to take family lots, I do not see how we could do otherwise with you. You say in your letter, you could move Mr. Higgins to a new space. Perhaps it would be best to buy spaces in some of the other cemeteries, where you and your daughter could both be near him. I will have to tell you though, there will be no refund, on his present space. As we do not refund our after ten years occupancy.

I am very sorry, I can not let you have a third space. It is always hard to turn people down on such a question. But we no longer to take Fairhope citizens, unless they are Corporation members, lessees or already have some of the family buried there. Then it is not sure there is a space near them.

I believe you still have the leases I sent you, to sign, if you still wish the space next to Mr. Higgins.
