

Old Ideas Revived by Experiments in Diet

Some remarkable cases of fasting have attracted attention lately, but one striking experiment in diet has met with less attention than it deserves.

This experiment was carried out by three scientists who lived for several months entirely on potatoes and vegetable margarine, with a slight addition of onion.

One of the results of this experiment is that science is now beginning to believe that there may be something in the old idea that potato water is a remedy for gout. The potato does appear to have considerable virtues where this disease is concerned.

Another result is that it is now claimed that the diet of the peasantry in some parts of Europe, in which meat figures very rarely, is healthier as well as cheaper than more elaborate fare.

Sir Rowland Hill, founder of the penny post, was very keen on dieting experiments. He lived for many periods of three days each on not more than two articles, such as boiled green peas and salt, and damson pie and sugar.

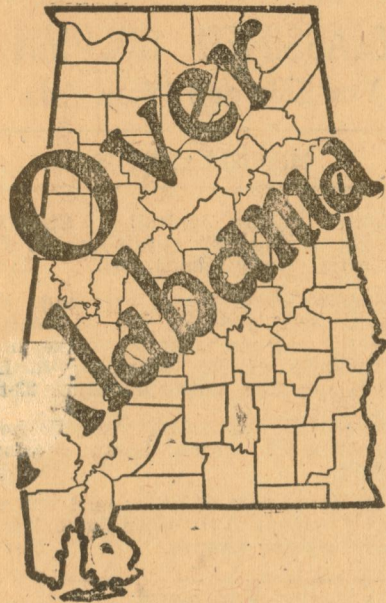

STATE NEWS PARAGRAPHED

A Resume of the More Important Events of Interest Condensed To An Epitomized Form

The sawmill of Wallace Wakefield, near Haleyville, was totally destroyed by fire a few days ago.

Winston County will produce the largest cotton crop this season that has been raised in many years, it is said.

Frank Owens, negro axman, sentenced to hang August 6 for highway robbery was reprieved by Governor Brandon until September 24.

An enthusiastic meeting was held recently in Selma in regard to putting on a boat to carry freight up and down the Alabama River.

John Whitehead, a negro, was shot twice and instantly killed at Eutaw by J. M. Key while he was attempting to burglarize the Key cafe and filling station.

Activity in breaking up of the fish law violations, which has resulted in a number of convictions for seining is reported from the state game and fish department.

The Alabama Motorists' Association of the Muscle Shoals district will re-organize in order that Sheffield and Tusculuma may become a part of the local organization.

The Southern Railway has voluntarily adjusted a complaint of the Calera Lime Works by establishing a rate of \$4.68 per net ton on lime from Roberts to Bastrop, La.

Anti-picketing laws did not mean anything to 24 union molders at Gadsden, and they were fined \$50 and costs in police court for picketing the N. & J. Stove Works.

Little Edna Ray Harvey, of Decatur, suffered the loss of her right eye, as the result of a thrown missile, which badly damaged here eye, causing its removal by physicians.

Harold Brunson, 10-year-old son of Mayor and Mrs. W. F. Brunson, of Georgiana, was drowned while on a swimming party and outing of which his mother was hostess.

Auburn will be host to three conventions during the first week of August, with the annual meeting of the Alabama farm bureau promising to be the most outstanding of the three.

Charged with the murder of Claude Hide, widely known planter of Cullman County, Maburn King, a merchant who owns a store near Arkadelphia, was held in the county jail at Cullman.

Ten Auburn graduates in chemical engineering and in chemistry have received flattering appointments, according to information received from Dr. B. B. Ross, who is in Philadelphia.

The Bessemer city council has awarded contracts for paving Arlington Avenue from Nineteenth Street to the A. B. & A. railroad and Berkley and an additional Arlington block.

Another big contract for the paving of certain blocks on Third Ave., Ave. C, Ave. D, Ave. E, Seventh St., Eighth St., and Torbert St., has been awarded by the Opelika city council.

At the present time there is under way one of the largest building and development programs ever known in the history of Muscle Shoals district, approximately \$2,000,000 is being spent locally.

Five white and twenty-four negro teachers of Pickens County took teachers' examinations at Carrolton recently under the supervision of Prof. W. H. Storey, county superintendent of education.

Work on the new boys' dormitory at the Normal School at Jacksonville, is going forward and the structure is rapidly taking on the form of the imposing building it will be when it is completed.

Four negroes, Annanias Swanson, Zelus Swanson, Willie Swanson and Lizzie Denhison are in the Lee County jail on a charge of murder, in connection with the killing of another negro, named Sam Denhison, at Opelika.

Announcement has been made that C. Sauer, of Pennsylvania, will move to Florence and organize a construction company to operate in the local district. Purchase of real estate in the district has been made, to be used as offices.

Sheffield is to have a new industry, according to an announcement of M. M. Hepstonstall, who will install equipment for the manufacture of germicide disinfectant, furniture and automobile polish, which industry will employ ten people and will begin operations in the near future.

According to reports from Montgomery, contracts have been let for grading and top soiling of a road from Heflin to the Georgia line to Jerry Gwin at a cost of \$196,406.76, and for a bridge to span the Tallapoosa river at Bell Mills to the Southern Construction Company at a cost of \$99,003.45.

"HI" TOO BASHFUL TO VISIT "CAL"

Uncle of President Has Same Yankee Reserve.

Welsh, La.—Farmer Hiram Moor is planning to visit in the East between now and autumn. His friends here are confident he will be accorded a hearty welcome when he arrives in Washington. They proudly point out that he is an uncle of President Coolidge.

It remains to be seen whether Mr. Moor will heed the advice of his neighbors. They not only insist that he "look up" the President, but urge that he "put up" in the White House.

Farmer Moor agrees that he should take a trip to the country's capital. Yet he is not enthusiastic over suggestions that he walk up to his distinguished nephew and slap him on the back.

There is no disputing the fact, however, he would enjoy a stay at the White House. Conditions there would contrast sharply with the surroundings to which the veteran tiller of the soil is accustomed. He concedes that guests of the Chief Executive are not required to prepare their own food and wash their own dishes, as is his habit.

That Mr. Moor is not so keen about taking any of Mr. Coolidge's time is probably because the same inherent reserve that is the President's is also his. "Hi" has not seen "Cal" in more than a half dozen years. The New Englander was then governor of Massachusetts.

Hiram Moor was born in Plymouth, Vt., in 1848. When a youth he went to Guthrie Center, Iowa, and purchased a small farm. Thirty-four years ago he migrated to this state, buying property near Welch. Natives of the rice belt now class him as a wealthy man.

Farmer Moor has a prominent nose and a high, rounded forehead. He has a large straight-line mouth and a protruding chin. He is six feet tall and weighs only 135 pounds.

Though two stories high, his home contains but four rooms, two up and a pair downstairs. It is of frame construction and has no porch.

In this house Farmer Moor is master and servant. He is the sole occupant and attends personally to all the housework.

General Added to British Group of "Bakespearians"

"Bakespearians" is the title London Truth has conferred on those who continue to proclaim from the house-tops that Bacon wrote Shakespearean plays.

Brig. Gen. S. A. E. Hickson is the latest writer to produce a book designed to prove that Bacon and no other man wrote the dramas attributed to the poet of the Avon.

General Hickson not only claims the Shakespeare plays for Bacon, but also the work of Marlowe and other contemporary English dramatists. He even is willing to accept the opinion of a German professor that Bacon wrote Cervantes' "Don Quixote."

General Hickson calls his book "The Prince of Poets and Most Illustrious of Philosophers." He accepts the theory that Bacon was really the prince of Wales, son of Queen Elizabeth, and because of his high social position dared not acknowledge the authorship of practically all the masterpieces produced during the Elizabethan era.

Climbers on Mt. Rainier Witness Yawn of Glacier

Longmire, Wash.—The yawn of a living glacier was the unusual sight witnessed by a party of climbers on Mount Rainier. While traversing a portion of Nisqually glacier the guide interrupted progress by pointing to a three-inch crevasse about fifty feet in front of the trail. The crack gradually widened as the climbers retreated until it appeared nearly seventy-five feet across. The yawning was accompanied by tremendous explosions and roars as chunks of age-old ice hurtled down into the abyss, hundreds of feet deep.

Unable to withstand the massive pressure of the ice field pushing down the mountainside the crevasse with a great earth tremor closed, a terrific bang shooting splinters of ice, showers of snow and clouds of water high into the air. The guide explained the base of the glacier was apparently slipping over a very hard rock formation which broke its back.

Romanoff Coffins Rifled by Soviet

Berlin.—According to the Russian journal "Slovo" it has been learned that the Soviet government recently ransacked the crypt in the church of St. Peter and St. Paul in Leningrad.

The action was said to be an effort to obtain jewels and documents from the caskets wherein were buried Peter the Great, Catherine the Great, and other members of the Romanoff family.

According to "Slovo," the coffin of Alexander the Great was found empty by the ransackers. This bears out the old legend that Alexander had not died as recorded in history, but for many years after his supposed death traveled throughout Russia distinguished as a pilgrim.
