





Replying to yours of 17th, your questions therein are given reply as follows:

- 1. What is the value of land used in Fairhopel Ans. Varies from approximately \$2,000 for a business lot, say Sox138 to land at 335 an acre in the country.
- 2. Are there many animals used in pairnope? Ans. Few animals used in town; a number in farming operations in the country.
 - 3. How many acres compse the Colony? Ans. approx. 4,000
- 4. What is the poulation at this time? No exact census. Rate poulation of town about 1500.
- 5. Average Wages? Carpenters, good, \$5 a day; masons, \$6, printers, \$5, linutype operator \$6.
- 6. Is there plenty of work for all the people? Ans. No, with in building line is rather slack. We think our policy generality applied would solve labor troubles, but our small amount of land cannot much affect general conditions. If we could guarantee steady work at fair wages, bur population sould go soaring. Those work who are able, as that is the only way they have of getting a living I am sending you folder and some other matter as well as copy of my paper.
