I am wanting some information about the Fairhope community and know no better way of getting it than to write direct to those who are in charge.

(1) How much land does the colony own?

- (2) By whom is this land farmed; by those who own a stock in the company or is some of it rented?
- (3) If this land is rented, what are the terms for renting?

(4) Does the colony own any horses, mules or tractors?

(5) What crops are raised principally in the colony?

- (6) Who are the real owners of the land; does any one outside of the community have any interest in it?
- (7) How do the members of the colony buy their supplies and how do they market their farm products?
- (8) Is there a hard-surfaced road up the bay to Cochran Bridge?

(9) Is there regular boat service to Mobile?

(10) Who is the colony doctor and how is he paid?

(11) Is there a hospital in the colony and how is it supported?

(12) Is the famous 'Johnson School' in your colony; if so how is it supported?

I am a young married man(age 29) with one child(age 15 months) and my wife make my entire family. I have taught school for the last ten years but I want to quit and farm. I mean to try to get recognition in the Fairhope colony before I try to get connected with farming any where else.

If I receive any satisfactory reply to this inquiry I mean to visit

Fairhope this summer.

As to my character I refer you to Supt. Education Geo. D. Owen, ANNAMXX Ashland, Alabama, Clay county.

Dear Sir:-

I take pleasure in replying to yours of 24th April. Presuming you have a copy of your letter + am replying to your questions in the order of their mameria ing.

Approximately 4,000 acres. It is farmed by lessees on their individual acounts-all land is rented- no stock in CO

I enclose a rent list-or rather hail under separate wrapper, and enclose blank lease.

No, the Colony owns no horses, mules, trac-tors or other farming equipment.

Principal crops, Irish and sweet potatoes, 5. snap beans, cucumbers, corn, velvet beans, vetches, pecans, Satsuma oranges Japanese persimmons. etc. Peanuts.

6. The land is owned by the Colony corporation, incorporated but having no stock, persons not members can rent on the same te terms as members.

Colonist as a rule buy individually and sell the same way. Orange growers usually sell through the Citrus Exchange.

8. No. Yes. 9.

10. No Colony doctor, 3 resident physicians, and a chiropractor. Paid by their patients.

10. Yes, there is a sanitorium, supported by patients in usual manner.

12. Yes, supported by private subscription and tuitions.

I should have mentioned in connection with 5, dairy ing and poultry. We have a creamery here making a regular demand for milk and cream; this is a fine poultry country and several are making a success of poultry.

We are out of illustrated folders-another edition now on press, but our Colony is a success and well worth your caneful investigation, is you want to get started on a piece of land. What about bringing the wife and beby and driving down?

Dear Sir:-

Replying to your recent favor, I am sorry to say that our proper literature has been exhausted new edition of illustrated folder now in hands of printer.

I am enclosing a page from Real Estate News, of Chicago, giving an article on the Colony by me with illustrations and also a copy of our form of lease, in addition to which I am sending you a late copy of my paper, the Fairhope Courier.

You will get the idea I think, that the Golony simply leases land, in town or country, on terms which prevent land speculation and give the community as such the benefit of its increasing growth in population and development, and makes no requirements of persons desiring the use of land than to make application for it in due form and pay the rent; leaving everything else to individual initiative.

" Amendments agreed upon by Mrs. Call and Mr. Gaston, in lieu of above:

Add as Section six, of Art. III the following:

The Secretary shall each year revise the list of non-resident members and their addresses, writing on or before the 15th of January by registered mail to the last known given address of each non-resident member, requesting a verification of his address; and it shall be the duty of non-resident members to assist the secretary in such revision. Any members from whom no reply is received before December 31st of such year, shall be reported to the Executive Council and their names dropped from the list; and no person so dropped shall be counted as entitled to vote; provided however, that any member who has been dropped, shall be reinstated upon his application therefor in writing to the secretary, and reported by the secretary to the Executive Council.

Also add to Section 2, of Art. IV, after the word "consti-

with the provisions of Sec. 6, Art. III, making such Section two, of Art. IV read as follows:

Sec. 2. Each member not in arrears to the Corporation shall be entitled to one vote and one vote only, at all elections involving changes in this constitution; provided that if a non-resident he shall have complied with the provisions of Sec. 6, of Art. IV; but on elections of officers and questions concerning is administration of local affairs, only those shall be entitled to vote who are in person on the Corporation grounds on the day of election and who are not in arrears.



Executive Council:-

On April 8m 1926, a petition signed by the requisite number of members was presented to the Council asking for resubmission of an amendment to the Constitute, which had been voted on at the regular election preceding and declared lost.

It was moved and carried that Council recommend to the petitioners that the election be held at a different and earlier date than regular election.

Largely on account of arrangements to have the secretary attend the International Conference at Copenhagen, it was generally agreed to lay this matter over until a later time and nothing has so far been done about it.

It appears however kaxkks that the ameridment is a designable one and that action as prayed for by the petitioners should be taken.

. The amendment proposed is as follows:

"The Secretary shall each year make a revision of the list of non-resident members, writing on or before the 15th of January by registered mail to the last given place of address of each non-resident member who has not been from officially since the beginning of the preceding year, requesting a verification of his address; and any members from whom no reply is received becember 31st, of such year shall be reported to the Executive Council and their names dropped from the list; provided, that any member who has been axapped so dropped shall be reinstated upon his application therefor reported by the Secretary to the Executive Council.
