You will probably recall that on March 19, 1927, after reading an announcement in the March 10,1927 Fairhope Courier of the transfer of my lot 7, in block 6, division 3, I wrote you regarding my lot 8 in the same block and section which also was to have been transfered to Mr. C.A. Cedarlund. Mr. Arthur Gaston, whom I met just as I was about to return North, had promised to inform you concerning lot 8. I did not receive any reply to that letter, and, therefore, assumed that the transfer had been effected.

Recently I received a statement for the rent on lots which I hold and doubted its correctness. In answer to a letter of July 19, 1927 asking to have the statement verified, Mrs. M. H. Brown returned the following itemized bill:


