The following by way of report and suggestions was presented by the secretary.

Members of Fairhope
Single Tax Corporation:

In connection with the Treasurer's report of receipts and disbursements for the year 1918 attention may perhaps, well be directed to a few items of interest regarding the business and history of our Corporation during the year.

Looking over the records I find that there were fifty-two movements of land, including 16 applications, covering 16 lots and 42½ acres; 30 transfers, covering 48¼ lots and 52 acres and 6 surrenders, covering 5 lots and 40 acres.

The rent collections rose from \$7,151.42, in 1917 to \$8,013.97 a fraction over 12 per cent. The penalties collected were \$284.78 nearly equal to the treasurer's salary.

1918 was the first year in many that the Corporation was able to pay its taxes promptly, without borrowing. Deducting the Colony taxes for 1917, which were not paid until in Feb. 1918, from the total taxes paid, the 1918 taxes are shown to have been \$5437.01 of which \$1559.57 was paid directly by the Corporation and \$5437.01, paid by lessees and receipts turned in on their rent; the total taxes being almost exactly two-thirds of the rent, around which figure it has run for some time, indicating no alarming tendency for the taxes on improvements and personal property to swamp the Colony, as has been contended by some would be the case; and especially as improvements have been going on while rent rates have hardly been advanced in the last five years.

Bath-house receipts rose to a considerable item last year, \$331.05, nearly equaling the cost of the new bath-house we built in 1917. I venture to suggest that we might with great satisfaction to a number of our lessees put in a nice bathhouse or possibly two, in which rooms might be rented to such lessees as desired to be more exclusive than present ar-

rangements permit. We have a lot of turpentine timber in the country, which could be saved at one of our local mills and enable us to get such house or houses with comparatively small cash outlay.

We lost by death during the year two of our members Shuah S. Mann, one of the charter members and a member with Mr. Bellangee of our committee on location, as a result of whose reports Baldwin county, Ala. was chosen as the home of the Colony, and Miss Altonia A. Chapman.

We have received two new members, M. M. Cope, one of our valued residents, by transfer to him of the certificate of Miss Chapman and Mrs. Katherine I. duChaine, who has built one of the most beautiful homes in town, and who is a very enthusiastic Fairhoper, as is her husband. Mrs. duChaine's interest in our purposes was so great that she paid her membership in cash, rather than to buy a second-hand certificate at a less price.

Steps were taken in the closing days of the year for the enlargement of the Cemetery, by inclusion of leased and unleased ground between same and Oak street.

The Executive Council also decided that the Golf Links were of sufficient importance to the community, by way of attracting visitors and for the enjoyment of home people, to justify the assumption by the Corporation of the small cost of maintaining the same and making play on the grounds free to residents and visitors, action which appears to be greatly appreciated by golfers.

The Council provided during the summer season for the use of the north room of the beach warehouse as a shelter pavilion for Sunday and other excursion day crowds and gave the use of it to the Red Cross, for sale of refreshments thus helping them to raise many dollars during the summer for their noble cause. It also provided 50 comfortable seats for the park.

On suggestion of the president a donation of \$25 dollars to the Red Cross was also made and the fund which was to be set aside for repayment of the debt to the Library Fund, has been invested in War Savings Certificates.

The Council was liberal in its appropriations to road improvement

during the year, as the treasurer's report shows, in cooperation with the town and public spirited citizens in and out of the Colony. Perhaps its best investment was in paying one-third of the cost of a Ford tractor for use with which Commissioner Glendenning provided a new road grader, by use of which tools a large amount of good work has been done and the roads in and near Fairhope put in better condition than they have ever been. Other important improvements are planned, in cooperation with the Town and others.

Our Colony suffered in common with all other parts of the country, in the taking away of its strong, young men for army and navy service, as well as many drawn away by lure of high wages in various lines of employment, even causing the temporary loss of two of our officers, Mrs. Brown, superintendent of public health and Mr. Dyson, superintendent of public service, but we hope when conditions get back more nearly normal that most of them will return and with reinforcements.

We who remain have the satisfaction of knowing that we are making practical and successful demonstration of the great principle of the land for the people and the one efficient way of securing it, by taking land values for common use, which must eventually be adopted if the peace which has been secured at so great price is to be permanent and to

bring to mankind the blessings which should be theirs.

The following report of business of the Peoples Railroad Company was also presented, in view of the interest of the Single Tax Corporation, as owner of the wharf, whose control had been given to the P. R. R. for a period of years.
