*Statement presented by
Secretary as follows.*

FELLOW MEMBERS:

The secretary comes into closer touch perhaps than other members with the problems which from time to time arise affecting our undertaking and I deem it not improper to offer some suggestions regarding the same; and, as we have so far had no anniversary celebration and no "history" something in this line may well be combined.

This is peculiarly a time when it is brought home to people everywhere how interwoven our interests are and that "an injury to one is the concern of all."

How could it be expected that this little spot of earth, this hardly a pin prick on the map, on which we are trying out a policy fundamentally in opposition to ideals and policies everywhere else in vogue could be unaffected by an industrial collapse which has all the world in its grip?

We who have laid hold with out hearts as well as our intellects of the Georgean gospel, see as the greatest cause of the world's present sad condition, the denial of the equal right of men to the use of the earth; with its heavy load of tribute in form of land rent and purchase price for land, deadening in its effects and tending to great inequality in possessions in normal conditions, and with mounting menace when general inflation and unreasoning land speculation combine to produce a land boom, hailed by the thoughtless as great prosperity right up to the point when the bubble bursts leaving business demoralized and citizens shocked as by high explosive shells. We could not escape the effects even though we did our best to keep down land speculation within our little territory.

Some of the evil effects upon us were:

Speculation in our land manifested itself thro applications for choice lots not with intention to use but to reap a profit from others who might want to use them, holding them from such, by demands for bonuses for transfer of unimproved lots and more than the reasonable value of improvements for transfer of improved lots; over-assessments of improvements and increased assessments upon our lands, giving us the highest taxed territory of equal area in the county necessitating increases in rents and then decreasing ability of lessees to pay their rents by decreased business or loss of employment.

Only the past summer the representative of the State Tax Commission proposed nearly doubling our assessment, an increase of \$173,880, on \$191,740. By much effort and with considerable expense, we succeeded in getting this down to an increase of \$25,000, which being altogether in town increased our tax for 1930 by \$775, while our lawyer's fee was \$175. Some lessees we happen to know were active in securing this increase, whether any members were or not we do not know.

This incident brought home to your secretary the weak position of our corporation with regard to its land assessment because of the holding of so much bay frontage, by all deemed of highest value, but which we use only as park; conferring value upon our leased lands it is true, but not less so on land held in private ownership in the vicinity; even that in which speculation was active during the boom; because we cannot practically exclude from its enjoyment those who hold such lands, and have no means of collecting from them any share of the cost of holding it. This led the secretary to again bring before the Council the action of the members at the annual meeting of January 21, 1921, favoring the turning over of the parks to the town, so as to escape the payment of taxes upon the same, presenting the matter in a resolution as follows:

"Whereas, one of the purposes of the Single Tax Corporation is the providing of land and improving it for park purposes for the use and enjoyment of its lessees, and it has set apart for this purpose its immediate bay frontage, the most valuable portion of its land; but it has been found impracticable to limit the enjoyment of same to the lessees and owners of adjoining land and others, are receiving the same benefit from the parks as the lessees without contribution toward the same, thus causing injustice to the corporation and its lessees; and the park lands in private ownership are subject to taxation, town, county and state, which is constantly increasing and must continue to do so and there are in immediate contemplation by the town sewer and street improvements to be charged against the land affected by same, through special assessments; and

Whereas, the transfer of the park reservations to the town if accepted, would make the same non-taxable and make all within the municipal limits at least enjoying the parks share in the expense of same; and such transfer would do no violence to our constitutional provisions regarding parks, but, because of the exemption of the property from taxation and making all benefitting share in maintaining same would more effectively accomplish the purposes in mind by the framers of the constitution, and,

Whereas, the members of the Corporation in annual meeting assembled, on January 21st, 1921, did adopt a motion offered by M. A. Bowen, as follows: "That it is the sense of the meeting that the parks be turned over to the town, with reservations which will assure that they shall always be used for park purposes and without any private monopoly in connection therewith and further, that the council appoint a committee to plat parks along Marshall's and Stacks gullies and tender them to the town with other parks, and no contrary action has since been taken by members but no steps have been taken to carry out their expressed wish, now. Therefore,

Be It Resolved: that the direction of said members meeting be carried into effect, the conveyance to be made duly protecting the land described for park purposes or to revert to the Corporation. (With some other provisions as to naming the parks, etc., which are of secondary importance.)

I hoped to have this accomplished before the first of October that the park land might be eliminated from our assessment for 1931 but no action was taken.

I can see no reason why we should cling to ownership of this valuable land, except a defeatist feeling that the Colony is likely to fail in the near future and in such event the parks would be an important asset for division. I do not charge any member with this feeling. However it is particularly because I want to guard against failure that I bring up and urge reaffirmation of the action of 1921. We have difficulties enough necessarily in our way, that we should not cling to one so easily gotten rid of and with such financial saving as this.

I have the same view with regard to the wharf. I see no opportunity for its operation with any profit, or with confining of its use to our lessees, and beside taxes, heavy expense of maintenance, storm and fire hazard, we are in constant danger of suits for damages on it. A wharf will always be needed and a permanent structure should replace the one so nearly worn out, an undertaking which the town would be so much better able to handle than we and to distribute the cost over the whole property in the town area.

Relieved of the wharf and parks, our problem would be greatly simplified and would only be to collect the rental value of lots used or available for use and pay the taxes upon same and upon the improvements and other property of lessees, beneficial assessments and expense of administration; with a reasonable margin for carrying land not yet in use, but necessary to provide for continued growth.

Evidence which I think we have a right to feel proves the value of our policies in making land available for users and encouraging improvement is found in the comparative figures of population growth in the decade ending with 1930.

These show Fairhope to have made a more rapid rate of growth than any town of between 800 and 1600 population in the state, save one and that in the environs of Birmingham, where so large a share of the industrial development of the state has been centered, our percentage of gain being 81 plus, bringing to us the distinction of being the largest town in Baldwin County, topping the county seat by 4.

Our investigations at the time of the proposed great increase in our assessment also disclosed that the assessed valuation of the Town of Fairhope \$1,153,823 exceeded that of Bay Minette, (after eliminating railroad which we did not have but suffered from lack of, and light and water plants, municipally owned and not appearing on the tax rolls at Fairhope, but privately owned and taxed at Bay Minette) by \$243,688 or nearly 27 per cent. They further disclosed that the land of our Corporation in the town and the improvements of lessees thereon, were assessed higher than the entire "real estate" assessment of Bay Minette.

Were we not fully justified in claiming either that our policies were proven superior in promoting growth or that we were discriminated against in the matter of assessment?

Bearing upon the matter of rents I brought before the Council when considering rent appraisal for 1930 this line of reasoning:

"Our Single Tax Colony and its policy of applying the Single Tax by paying the taxes of lessees out of ground rent paid by them has both its theoretical and practical phases. The theory need not be further discussed at this time for it is embodied in the Corporation's constitution and charter and accepted as the basis of contracts between the Colony and its lessees. It may well be admitted that the determining of the rental value of land has not been found to be so easy a matter as some purely theoretical Singletaxers imagine. It is complicated by the fact that the Colony contracts to take off of lessees the taxes both on the land they hold and on the improvements and personal property held thereon; also by the fact that demand for land for speculative ends outside the Colony makes difficult a comparison with land in the Colony where land speculation is or should be done away with."

"There is a practical way however, of determining at least minimum rentals, for it seems all should be able to see that lessees should and must pay on the average, at least what the Colony pays out for them; for the Colony must get in the aggregate enough to meet its obligations as, if failing to do so it would have to discontinue."

And when the Council was considering the rental assessment for 1931, I offered the following in part:

"The necessity for protection against speculation in our land is not apparent at this time, when the collapse of the boom has, for the present, killed all demand for land save for use.

"The vital question is—as it was last year—meeting the obligations we have assumed for lessees and preserving the financial standing of the Corporation. . . Our land is worth to our lessees on the average what the Colony pays for them which they would have to pay as owners." Reasoning which seems to me sound.

I followed with figures showing in representative blocks, well settled up, what we paid for the lessees in taxes upon their improvements and personal property; and on the basis of a comparative showing of taxes paid by the Colony upon the land, street improvements, library, bath houses, parks, etc., determining what percentage of the lessees' taxes might fairly be added for these other legitimate items of cost, and contrasting same with the rents actually collected in the same blocks.

The conclusion being brought out that generally speaking the residential sections were contributing fairly toward the cost to the Corporation of carrying them, but business sections were not.

It should be observed, that when paying on such a basis the lessees who make exceptionally good use of their holdings benefit as they would under the Single Tax as applied by law—not at the expense of those not able to make so good use of their holdings, but because of the elimination of profit to the legal owner of the land—the Colony; and also because of being relieved of the necessity of investing in the land.

We lost one of our most valued members in 1930, Townsend P. Lyon, who passed away in the first month of the year. Another, not a member in his own right but through his wife, Mr. Joseph P. Norton, of Mobile, died in March, and within this month we have lost another long time and useful member, Nathaniel Mershon, who died at the home of his daughter in Colorado, January 14th.

We completed payment for the Mann land during 1930 and the 160 acres is all under lease but 10 acres.

I am glad to report that another 30 acres not far from the 60 acres given us some time ago by a Mr. Harms of Canada is offered for a payment of \$100, which would give us right of redemption from tax sale, which only requires a few dollars more. Mr. Parker and I looked it up today. It is a very fine piece of land and has considerable unboxed timber upon it.

Following Statement for Trustees read by Trustee Mrs. A. B. Ball,

FELLOW MEMBERS OF THE FAIRHOPE SINGLE TAX CORPORATION:

Your Trustees, unlike trustees of other Corporate bodies, are not the custodians of or dispensors of any tangible property. Under the provisions of the Constitution, their duties are defined as those of investigators, supervisors or critics of the official conduct of the affairs of the Corporation. In keeping with the expressed language of the Constitution, we submit the various matters of a fundamental nature that have come under our observation together with the criticism that our best judgment seems to warrant thereon.

Before presentation thereof, we wish to reaffirm that a strict adherence to the Constitution of the Corporation, without fear or favor to our Lessees, should result in a community founded on justice as expressed in the teachings of Henry George.

In accordance with the duties referred to above, we must review the matter of appraising the rental values of leaseholds last year, 1930, with its disquieting effect. The method employed of appraising the annual rental value was entirely inconsistent with and in direct conflict with the method prescribed by the Constitution. If the Constitution can be so flagrantly violated, in order to relieve our officers of unpleasant or untimely duties, then indeed "What is a Constitution between friends." We respectfully recommend that hereafter no such violation of the Constitution shall be tolerated under any circumstances.

During the past year, the matter of granting a site for a Ball Park caused much adverse criticism, among our members and lessees. It is not our intention to criticize the wisdom or lack of wisdom in the selection of the Beach site; time will prove better than any comment can, whether the site was the best that could have been selected.

We do, however criticize the action of the Council in dealing with a matter of so fundamental a character as we hold the very nature of the use of the lands without leasehold, or revenue, would arouse criticism and objection from members who believe such matters should be decided by the Supreme authority as provided by Section One of Article IV of the Constitution. We believe the issue of granting the lands was not deliberated upon as would be consistent with proper parliamentary procedure, having been granted at a special meeting attended by only three members.

Trees were felled and possession taken of the lands before any publication or notice could reach the members, leaving no opportunity for a referendum on so fundamental an issue. We submit that giving the free use of lands, and permitting the destruction of fine trees, are questions that our membership are entitled to be heard upon, especially since no such powers are conferred upon the Council by the Constitution.

Another unwise proceeding in connection with the granting of the Ball Park was the matter of taking top soil from other lands, belonging to the Corporation, in order to cover the diamond of the Ball Park. While the loss of the soil was not a serious matter, the matter of the land having been plowed up and ready for removal before any action was taken by the Council, granting the use of the soil, was a piece of presumption that should not prevail in the management of a Corporate body, such as the Fairhope Single Tax Corporation should be.

We find that on October 7th, 1929, extract from minutes, "Treasurer reported on delinquent lessees who paid no attention to repeated notices, or failed to meet promises made." On July 23rd, 1930, at a special meeting, it was (extract from minutes) "moved and carried that Secretary and Treasurer prepare a letter or letters to delinquent lessees, demanding payment or satisfactory provision for same, by date they

may set and if satisfactory arrangement is not made by such date, to advertise their improvements in the next issue of the Courier following." A series of letters were arranged and have been in use by the Treasurer. We find, however, that some of the advertisements he has prepared and sent to the Courier have not been published. As no action has been taken by the Council rescinding its former action, and as we can find no power vested in any one or more individuals to nullify the action of the Council when lawfully convened, it is self evident that the Council has not been able to enforce its mandates.

Your Trustees are aware that there is a serious business depression and are not desirous of selling the improvements of any one, if satisfactory arrangements can be made for the payment of arrearages, but it is manifest that it is harder to pay \$24 than \$12, and harder yet to pay \$36, and becomes increasingly hard the longer the bill runs. In addition to this, improvements that are in jeopardy are not kept up and become increasingly poor security. We believe the law governing the collection of rents should be enforced uniformly, no one should be favored to the disadvantage of paying lessees, who are entitled to the benefits of the funds not collected. Therefore, the officers should be required to perform their duties without favor.

We find from figures submitted to us by the Treasurer that the total rent roll for 1930, is \$36,119.66, of which \$20,989.29 has been paid into the Treasury leaving \$15,130.37 due on 1930. According to the Treasurer's report for the year, we have paid out in taxes for our lessees \$21,694.34 or \$705.05 more than we have taken in on this past year's rents. That we have been able to collect this past year \$11,543.12 of our past due rents is a piece of good luck, as well as excellent work on the part of the Treasurer. This amount has apparently balanced our budget and left a balance on hand of \$161.62. This, however, will be more than wiped out when we return to Mr. Gaston the proceeds of the personal note given for Constitutional reasons, that the provision in regard to interest bearing obligations might be observed and the principal of which must be refunded. We cannot expect even member lessees to continue to pay increased rents while others fail to pay.

We call your attention to the following extract from the minutes of October 21st, 1930. "President, Treasurer and Secretary authorized to make settlement with George Leavenworth of claim for delinquent rents." If it is within the powers of the Council to alter the rent roll, after it is confirmed to benefit a delinquent lessee, the exercise of such powers opens the door to a dangerous practice and should be denied to any of our officers.

We recommend as we have done before, that immediate action be taken in regard to Cemetery charges for grave spaces for outsiders and urge that it is an injustice to expect the Woman's Council to keep the cemetery in order without adequate funds.

We insist that the letter of the lease should be lived up to and that lessees be required to pay their rent before tax receipts are accepted and that any rebates be paid to them as provided in the lease in certificates. This course will be beneficial for the following reasons. If the lessee cannot avail himself of the benefit of his tax receipt until he has paid his rent, he will keep up his rent in order to obtain the benefit of the use of his certificates to balance coming rent; he will not be so inclined to overvalue his improvements and the receipt of certificates on rent will occur principally during the first half of the year when we do not have taxes to pay ourselves. The custom of crediting lessees with the amount of their tax receipts with little or no payment of rents simply results not in the substitution of revenues derived from taking the rental value of the land for the present method, but in the payment by the Corporation of the delinquent lessees taxes without the balancing payment of the rental of his land and is an injustice to both the Corporation and the balance of the lessees.

During the past year, a special meeting of the Council was held to consider deeding the Park lands to the Town. One of your Trustees presented this proposition to a noted attorney, together with the Constitution of the Corporation, receiving an opinion that the Constitution makes the setting aside and maintenance of Park lands mandatory; that before any such action could lawfully be carried out, the Constitution must be amended by a referendum vote of all the members. We think all of our members should be fully informed of this phase of the question.

The secretary shall each year make a revision of the list of non-resident members, writing on or before the 15th of January, by registered mail to the given address of each non-resident member, who has not been heard from officially since the beginning of the preceding year, requesting a verification of his addreses; and any members from whom no reply is received before Dec. 31st of such year shall be dropped from the list; provided that any member who has been so dropped shall be reinstated, upon his application therefor, reported by the Secretary to the Executive Council.

The statement or report of trustees was as follows:

Executive Council Fairhope Single Tax Corporation, Gentlemen:

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES

Your Trustees wish to make plain and of record, both to the Council and to the membership of the Corporation, our attitude in regard to the proposed transfer of the park lands of our corporation to the Town of Fairhope.

The Constitution says "The Corporation shall hold as trustee for its entire membership, the title to all lands upon which its community shall be maintained." We realized that our lands are constantly increasing in value, especially our bay front lands, and we sought to be sure, in the event that the matter was submitted to the membership, whether it should be by means of a constitutional amendment or by simple referendum vote.

We were the more anxious to be right on this point on account of the opinion of the Corporation's attorney that there could be no referendum on the rulings of the Trustees in regard to an election. Therefore we felt it incumbent upon us to be careful in regard to this matter.

The chairman of our board at that time, Mr. Schalkenbach, submitted the Constitution to two attorneys of good repute, being careful to give to neither of them his own point of view. Both informed him that in their judgment a constitutional amendment would be necessary to effect the transfer of the parks. This opinion was included in the report of the Trustees for the year 1930.

On at least three different occasions Trustee Mrs. Call, speaking in behalf of the board, has said that should the Council doubt the correctness of the opinions of the attorneys consulted by the Trustees in regard to the need of a constitutional amendment to make effective transfer of the parks, that the Trustees would if requested consult other legal authorities. The Council has made no such request but preparations have appeared to go forward to make the transfer without fur- ther authority.

An amendment has been filed seek- ing to provide constitutional grounds for the transfer, should it be desirable, to the entire membership. A circular has been issued advising "That the proposed amendment should be voted down, the Executive Council be left to carry out the mandate of resident members—the details to be sub- ject to a referendum, if desired, to a majority of members in person on the Corporation grounds, on the day of election. (Sec. 2, Art. 3.)"

The article to which reference is made says "But on election of officers and questions concerning local admin- istration of affairs, only those shall be entitled to vote who are in person on the Corporation grounds, on the day of election, and who are not in arrears. In the opinion of your Trustees the giving away of many acres of the most valuable lands, equally the property of the outside members as well as the resident members can, by no stretch of the imagination be called "Local administration of af- fairs."

We wish to go on record before the Council and the entire membership as only willing to conduct the affairs of the Corporation in a constitutional manner and as even more jealous of the integrity of our Constitution than we are concerned as to the issue of

the question before us. We are anx- ious to protect the non resident mem- bers in their rights and we wish to ask why, if those anxious to accom- plish the transfer believe our legal advice to be erroneous, they have not accepted our offer to obtain further advice.

We ask you to spread this report on the minutes.

However, this would first have to be authorized by the Executive Council, subject to Section 1, Article 6, concerning Initiative and Referendum. A constitutional amendment would not be necessary nor a referendum to the whole membership, but, as before stated, it would be necessary for the Executive Council to authorize this, on which a referendum could be had as provided in Section 1, of Art. 6. The membership referred to in such section are those on the ground actively participating in the affairs of the Corporation, as is clearly shown by the fact that 24 hour's notice is sufficient, except when it is proposed to amend the constitution."

All members present, president Brown presiding; also present Mrs. Call, Mrs. Alice Smith, R. F. Powell, M. A. Bowen, C. A. Gaston.

Mr Connolly moved adoption of suggested resolutions prepared by secretary and a copy furnished each member; seconded by Mrs Dyson. Discussion by Mr. Smith, Mr. Bowen, Mr. Gaston.

Motion put and carried with one dissenting vote, by Marion Smith.

Resolution as follows:

WHEREAS, the members of the Corporation have twice at annual meetings declared that it was in the interest of the Corporation that legal ownership of the lands which our corporation was permitting the use of by the public as parks, should be vested in the town, in whose ownership the same would not be taxable by the County and State as well as the Town; and a committee appointed by the Council to specify the lands which should be included in conveyance of the Town if made, has acted in the matter and presented its report which has been accepted, and

WHEREAS, the attorney of the Corporation has, in a written opinion declared such proposed conveyance to be within the proper discretion of the Executive Council and subject to a referendum only to members on the ground on the day of election, and

WHEREAS, it is deemed by this Council in the interest of the incorporated Town of Fairhope and its citizens, whether members or lessees of the Corporation or not, that the legal title to and control of park lands, so vital to the interest of the citizens throughout all the future, should be in the legally constituted local unit of government, the Town, rather than be subject to the vicissitudes of an organization which, however sound its principles and successful its administration hitherto, is still a private corporation; and the time is very near

at hand when such transfer must be effected to effect the exemption of the property from taxation for the coming state and county fiscal year, as well as from probable assessments against it for proposed street improvements, therefore.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the president and secretary be directed to appear before the Town Council at its next meeting, inviting an expression from the same as to its attitude toward the proposed transfer of park lands and, if in general favorable, inviting the appointment of a committee by the Council, or expressing the pleasure of the council to consider with the Colony Council, the exact terms of such proposed conveyance.

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER, that the terms of such proposed conveyance be suggested to the Town Council as follows:

Proper description, by metes and bounds or by filing an amended plat.

That the use or uses of the land shall be expressed in the conveyance, with provision for reversion to the donor if not so used.

That no monopoly or special privilege shall ever be granted in or on such lands.

That the tender be contingent on acceptance prior to October first, 1931.

That all assessments for street improvements against land included in conveyance hereafter falling due shall be assumed by the Town.

I suggest further, that as soon as agreement can be reached between Town and Colony regarding terms of conveyance, the question of authorizing the officers of the Corporation to make the conveyance be submitted by referendum to the members legally qualified by opinion of our attorney to pass upon the same.

SUGGESTED CONDITIONS FOR TRANSFER OF PARK LANDS TO TOWN OF FAIRHOPE

1. That the property conveyed shall be forever used as public parks of the Town of Fairhope, according to general usage of public parks and according to the wishes of a majority of the qualified electors of the Town, provided that in such use there shall be no special privileges of any kind to individuals or organizations and no profit it to individuals, but the latter shall not apply to use made of any concession which may be given by the Town Council or other body in which control of the parks may be placed, for the fuller enjoyment of same by the public and awarded for terms not exceeding a year, on a competitive basis; but, provided further, that the natural function of gullies included in conveyance as drainage ways for water from streets and other public and private lands, shall be recognized as a proper use of same in conjunction with their use as parks; also, that if in the future the Town decides upon putting in a sewer system and the Town Council and engineers agree that the best location for a disposal plant as an essential part of the sewer system is in or along the gully north of the cemetery as now located, such use may be made of the needed land, with laying of such sewer lines leading to the same and pipe lines for carrying the effluent therefrom as may be necessary, but modern methods shall be made use of to render the same inof- fensive.

2. That in case of disapproval of any detail of park management evi- denced by a petition filed with the body in control of the parks, signed by 10 per cent of the qualified elec- tors, the question as framed by peti- tioners must be submitted to vote of the electors and the body in control of the parks shall be guided by the wishes of a majority as expressed by their votes and the filing of any such protest shall estop action upon any matter with which such petition shall deal until the same is voted upon.

3. That the land conveyed west of Bay View Street, north of Fairhope Ave., bounded on the north by Magnolia Avenue, and the Swift land and extending on the west to the top to the bluff above Mobile Bay, shall be designated and known as Henry George Park.

4. That the party of the first part shall be entitled to place and main- tain at its expense suitable markers, (subject to approval of the party of the second part) setting forth that the funds on which the same are placed were donated by it to party of the second part for park purposes.

5. That full riparian rights to the land conveyed touching the margin of Mobile Bay shall pass to party of the second part for appropriate development and use in harmony with the conditions of this conveyance, but un- less and until the party of the second part acquires the frontage used in connection with Fairhope Wharf, not included in this conveyance, no wharf shall be permitted to be built in competition with wharf owned and controlled by party of the first part, its successors or assigns.

6. That should the party of the second part cease at any time to use the lands conveyed in harmony with the conditions of this conveyance the

title to the same shall immediately re- vert in the party of the first part.

DESCRIPTION OF LANDS TO BE INCLUDED IN PARK CONVEY- ANCE

Embracing the lands in easily un- derstood language not necessarily to be followed in conveyance.

DIVISION ONE

All land now in use as park west of Bay View Ave., (excluding of course, land under lease to T. H. Bowen and A. O. Berglin and land leading to Fairhope Wharf, covering width occupied by Wharf, including warehouses and bathhouses.) Also land west of Bay View St. on south side of Fairhope Avenue, west of Block two to Mrs. White east line, back of leaseholds in block one and from Mobile Avenue west, and to center of Stack's Gully.

DIVISION TWO

West of Mobile Street from center of Stack's Gully south to Crawford holding, along Crawford holding to the northwest corner thereof and along the front of Crawford and Gordon Smith holdings, embracing every thing westward therefrom to the bay. "Shall the action of Executive Council Monday, September 21, 1931, relative to transfer to the Town of Fairhope, of Park Lands of the Corporation, including gullies, be approved?"

Also communication from trustees objecting to sending out of notices of proposed election, because they had not been consulted regarding same and requesting notice to be sent to members that election would not be held.

Secretary reported that the notice had been sent out in accordance to action of Executive Council, and form of ballot, had been sent to Trustee Mrs. Call, for approval or amendment and she had handed same back without consideration.

The following resolution moved for passage by R. E. L. Connolly, seconded by Mrs. Dyson:

"Resolved, That the Council do not recognize any authority conferring on Trustees by the constitution to usurp their judgment of constitutional matters as final, against the judgment of the Executive Council as settled by the considered opinion of the Corporation's Counsel, nor to deny to members of the Corporation the right of referendum."

That the Council, having according to long usage, responded to a petition presented by the constitutional number of qualified members, by calling a referendum election for Friday, the 25th of Sept. from 1 to 6, for submission to members entitled to vote on same the question stated by petitioners, and the Trustees having served written notice that they will not perform their constitutional duty in conducting such election, "Canvass the votes cast and declare the result there-

of the president be directed to be present at the place of voting at the hour set for the beginning of voting, and if no trustees appear to serve appoint from or suggest the choice by those present of qualified voters to the usual number to perform the duty refused by the trustees so that the constitutional rights of members shall not be engulled."

"Resolved further, that the president provide for personal notice to be given every resident member as early as maybe Friday morning, that the election will be held as announced. In

obedience to the petition filed."

Question discussed by members of Council, president, secretary, and others present, who included, following members, Mrs. Call, Dr. Gaston, Paul Nichols, R. F. Powell, E. C. Wolcott.

The motion being put was carried by unanimous vote.

President urged very strongly that trustees reconsider their action and come out and perform their constitutional duty at the election the following day.
