
BILLY HOFFMAN

EDDIE BASS



BOB WALTER



 "Big Wheel", a big, slightly oversize, hard hitting tackle who helped the Pirates to a victorious season and himself to a starting position in the forward wall next year.




ALVIN TRIONE







BILLY HOFFMAN (No. 30)




CHARLIE PARISH (No. 55)




FRED CHAPIN (No. 50)

"Chap's" good work at holding down a forward's slot was very beneficial to the team and his long set shots accounted for several needed wins this season. He is another of the good players who will not return.




HAMMET STAPLETON (No. 15)


EDDIE BASS (No. 45)

"Eddie", a small dependable guard, was very valuable when the going got rough. His fine playing and high spirit this year assures him of a position on the starting five next fall.




ATT DAVIS (No. 25)

Many exciting things happened that year, we are sure but somehow we can't recall any at the moment. Soon the year was over and we found ourselves quite thrilled to know that we were JUNIORS.

Sure enough the Junior year was full of exciting moments. We were responsible for running the Snack Shop which made complications in more ways than one. However, we got those worked out and soon found we were making a profit. We even had money enough to give a party to the football team. The date we chose was after the game with Robertsedale and our party was a huge success. The next social event was the Christmas Party which the Juniors and Seniors gave together. We had Santa Claus and all the trimmings; the pictures in the annual tell the story for it was a party we shall not soon forget.

But you can't have fun all the time and soon we found ourselves confronted with work again--work spelled in capital letters. Our big money making scheme of the year was about to begin--the magazine sales contest. Carolyn was chairman of the girls and Dick Turner of the boys. Much to Dick's surprise, the girls proved themselves the champions but when the girls received their prize of a five pound box of chocolates they took pity on the boys and gave them a piece now and then.

The next great event was, of course, the Junior-Senior Prom. This was what we had been planning for the whole year so we put our hearts and souls into it and even the Senior Class voted it a great success. The theme was Treasure Island. The decorations were palms, flowers and the biggest yellow moon you ever saw. The music was out of this world, the lights were dim, the floor show was romantic and everybody had a wonderful time.

The Prom was the opening salute leading toward graduation and from then on the time flew. Some were in the band and there was a concert and a trip to Troy. Others were in the choir and when we got our excellent rating at the concert at Murphy High we knew we had to go to the University. Those were exciting days. Everybody got what he wanted in this regard; everybody had fun; and everybody returned to Fairhope where we found ourselves the pride of the whole community.

The last weeks of school found us busy with final exams but with enough time on our hands to take an interest in the campaign for Student Council president, which was exciting to say the least. Att Davis was elected and we settled down a bit until our final party at the gulf with food enough for an army and appetites to correspond.

With all our fun and activities we were proud at the end of the year to find that with the wise leadership of Mrs. Lawson and Mrs. Beck, we were the proud possessors of \$235.10 which we could take with us into the Senior Class. The last day came, report cards were handed out, we had passed, we were SENIORS and in proud recognition of that fact we discharged our last duty to the Senior Class of 1949, which was to decorate and usher for graduation. Now we were Seniors and rated honor and respect.

September 1949 we moved into the "Green Room", all sixty-three of us. There were some new faces and some of the same "old" ones we had known for years. Mrs. Bennett and Mr. Cobb were our sponsors. We elected Sam Fitzgerald, president; Charles Ingersoll, vice-president; Sylvia Nelson, secretary; Sara Jo Littleton, treasurer; and Bob Walter, Student Council representative. Charles Ingersoll and Buddy Cotton were editors of the Broadcaster and Dutch Henry, editor of the Annual. Now we were ready to roll.

In the beginning we had a dream of building a gymnasium. We enlisted the aid and co-operation of the Juniors. We began a campaign which at first looked as if it had some chance of success but which finally bogged down as so many previous attempts have in a burst of energy on the part of a group which had in mind a much more elaborate project than ours. This larger plan failing, carried our own down with it but the spark of desire is still present and if those who shall follow us in F. H. S. shall revive it our best wishes go out to them in the cause for which we all have faith and hope.

Our class members had many distinctions: Sara Jo was president of the Beta Club; Cecilia was vice-president; Sylvia was secretary and Barbara Baggette, treasurer; Att was president of the Student Council and captain of the Football Team; Willie Jean had become head cheerleader after having been a cheerleader for four years; Carolyn and Ira were willing and excellent helpers; Charles was president of the Science Seminar; Bob Walter, president of the "F" Club; Scott Clemens, president of the FFA; Barbara Baggette, president of the Secretarial Club and Barbara Lazzari of the Stylus Club. There may have been others but certainly this gives an idea of how distinguished our class was.

The Broadcaster got off to a good start with the job of putting out a printed paper again and the annual staff is now working on the final pages of a bigger and better annual. On October 5, we went to Mobile in a body to have our pictures taken for the annual. Incidentally, "I was A Male War Bride" was good, too—or was it?

Our picnic at the beach was quite an affair though some of the pictures we took Mrs. B. decided were not quite suitable for display in the annual—we never have been able to decide just why See the annual for further particulars.

The football season was exciting: WE WON THE COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP CONTEST no less and the Beta Club bought a trophy to commemorate that occasion.

Time went on and there was more interesting gossip going the rounds and pretty soon it was Christmas and time for our Christmas Party. We had this party with the Juniors and there was much discussion as to dates or no dates. Finally DATES won the day and a good time was had by all with Santa Claus coming to all the good children. Our secret sorrow is that not one picture of that party turned out to be a good one.

We had our exams before Christmas, thank goodness, and during the holidays there was no use worrying because we either had passed or had not. After Christmas holidays the end of school seemed very near and everyone was quoting, "It's later than you think". People who had not worried before began to do so; demerits were carefully counted and yellow cards were checked.

The Valentine Party came and went, the Basketball season came with what we thought was a good chance to win the Championship UNTIL—but let's change the subject. Seniors began to think of what college to attend, to apply for jobs and everyone was very businesslike.

Try outs for the Senior play, Booth Tarkington's "Clarence" found Ira Wiggins playing the title role, with Nancy, Charles, Buddy, Willie Jean, Dutch, Joyce Parker, Katherine, Carolyn and Gavin playing supporting roles and everybody pitching in to help. It was a lot of fun and we were sorry when it was over.

In spite of all the sickness that was going around in the Junior and Senior Class everybody managed to get out of bed long enough to dress up for the Prom. The theme this year was "Somewhere Over The Rainbow". We thank the JUNIORS for such a nice Prom and hope that when they are Seniors they will have just as nice a one as we had.

Spring saw the beginning of the Baseball season; everybody had spring fever, the teachers wondered what was wrong with the students, the students wondered what was wrong with the teachers. New honors came to members of the Senior Class. The Science Award went to Sara Jo Littleton who was also Valedictorian, Carolyn was Salutatorian, Bob Walter was chosen Best Sport, and Barbara Baggette was awarded the DAR Good Citizenship Award. Now for the class night program the following were elected—Joe Paul, Poet; Aileen, Historian; Fred, Prophet; Mary Ellen, Giftorian; and Barbara Baggette to write the Will. Other awards will be given on graduation night.

A sunburned but happy bunch of Seniors came back from their picnic to the Gulf on Thursday, May 4, and most of them succeeded in getting to school on Friday to see if they passed their exams.

This History would not be complete unless we expressed our appreciation to our home-room mothers, who have been with us since the first grade, for their many kindnesses to us, especially the party after Class Night. Thank you Mrs. Loftin, Mrs. Christianson, Mrs. Andrews, and also Mrs. Price and our president's mother, Mrs. Fitzgerald, and Mrs. Littleton.

Happy because all of our Graduates will appear in cap and gown on Monday May 15, 1950 to receive their diplomas we close this log of friends who will remain always in our memory.
