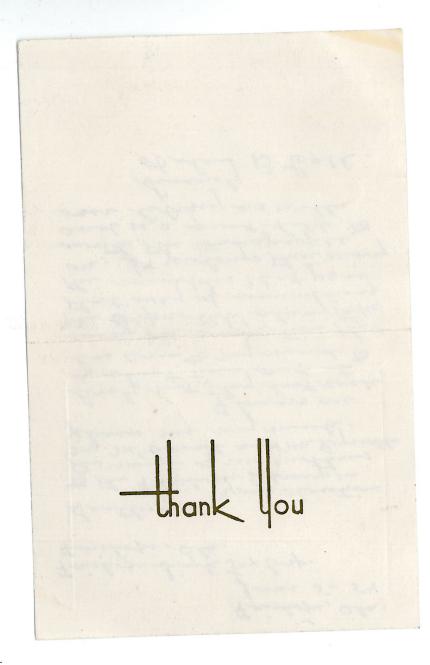

It has come to our attention that some lessees of lots such as yours on Fairhope Ave. which you lease in July, 1941 have abandoned their original plan for using the land leased and have offered to transfer the lease to another in consideration of his paying them a bonus.

At its meeting of February 16, the Council directed me to write to every lessee of an unimproved and unused lot whose lease was issued prior to January, 1948 and remind him that the asking or accepting of a bonus for the transfer of an unimproved leasehold is a violation of the lease contract and of the agreement he made over his signature when he made application for his lease.

Lessees of unimproved lots cannot recover past rents paid by them without violating the terms of the contract. Any rent paid last year was paid for the use of the land during that year. If the lessee neglected to make any use of the land in 1949 that is his loss and it is the intention of the corporation to prevent such lessee from collecting from another the rent paid by him for time that has past.

I was directed by the Council to advise all lessess such as you, who are not making present use of your land that if your plans have changed and you do not now intend to use the land you leased the Council will consider any equitable terms for the surrender of your lease so you may be relieved of the further payment of rent.

I regret very much to learn of the disagreement between you and your neighbor, Mr. Stedman.

I was indeed surprised to see your letter to Mr. Sted-man asking him to pay you \$100.00 for the cutting of the trees which were presumed to be on the dividing line between your lots. Such a price is four times the amount you agreed was a fair price for you to pay Mrs. Zeis for all improvements on the lot which, as I recall was mainly for clearing, the tree value being largely considered to be negligible.

I feel confident Mr. Stedman believed he had your agreement to the cutting of the trees and had no intention to offend you. It is my personal opinion it is an injury to both parties to have trees growing on or near a party line, and that where such is the case the best possible solution is an agreement between the parties for their removal. My position is that such growth draws sustenance from both lots and deprives both parties of the exercise of free taste in the development of their own grounds.

In the cutting of such trees it may fairly be considered that the parties have equal interests in the stumpage value, which is commercially \$3.00 to \$5.00 a cord and it generally takes several such trees to make a cord of wood. If penaltys are to be avoided your property must be assessed and taxes paid before the end of December.

Do you now have in the house any furniture other than the butane equipment and the electric water heater?

We cannot pay taxes for lessees whose rent accounts for the year are not paid in full before the end of December. Our records show that you owe us \$27.72. If you will make immediate payment to us of that amount we will attend to paying the County tax of \$23.95. However we will not have enough left to pay the Town tax of \$21.75.

I suggest that you send mm us the \$27.72 owing our corporation and that you send an additional payment for the City of Fairhope amounting to \$18.94. That will balance your account here and enable us to pay all taxes due for 1950.

As stated before these matters will have to be attended to at once to avoid additional penalty charges.

In reply to your recent letters concerning your pro rata share of the taxes on the Colonial Inn property for 1943 I believe the confusion lies in the difference between the Colony rent bill and the annual tax bill.

The Golony rent bill for 1943 was \$364.93 and you did pay half of that, \$182.47, on January 22, 1943. However the total 1943 tax obligation of the Colonial Inn Corporation was the Colony rent of \$364.93 plus the 1943 Town of Fairhope tax in the amount of \$218.50, one-half of which, \$109.25 would have to be paid by you if you were obliged to pay one-half of the 1943 tax obligations.

I hope this explanation will clear the matter for you, though I appreciate it is a little involved.

I called Mr. Rickarby to find out what your letter of the 27th was about since you failed to include the bill. He advises me that it was the Town of Fairhope tax on the Inn property for the present year which was not due nor payable prior to the first of Decmber, 1943.

The first half of the 1943 rent paid by you Jan. 22, 1943 did cover your pro rata share of the state and county tax since that wax tax was a liability of our corporation on the terms of the lease contract. The entire year's rent being taken to pay the county tax the Town tax is in its entirety an obligation of the lessee. The Tax Assessor, E. S. Tunstall and Tax Collector, M. H. Wilkins have announced that they will be at Fairhope, October 15th, 16th and 28th to receive assessments of taxable property and collection of taxes due. The law states:

"It is the duty of every person liable for taxation to attend in person before the Assessor in the precinct of the taxpayer's residence and then and there render to the Assessor under oath, a full and complete list of all property of which he was owner or of which he was trustee or agent on the first day of October of the Year."

When you go to the Assessor be sure to take your last year's assessment with you. Check it over first to see if it is in proper order as to the items listed and the valuations. Valuation of taxable property should not be the full value, but 60 per cent thereof, as required by law. If the valuations on the items of taxable personal property returned by you last year, have decreased or increased you should make a corresponding change on this year's return. If the improvement value is in excess of 60 per cent of the true value please report the same to me and I will be glad to assist in making a protest.

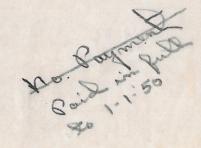

My sister Mrs. Crawford, has just handed me your letter re. Mr. Crippen and his rent on Fairhope leasehold. Any time spent on Mr. Crippen is wasted, though we have patiently given him much time and stand ready to continue to do so. He is a Towsendite and appears totally incapable of grasping any conception of editable economics.

As he reported to you he holds lease to two lots while his building improvement occupies only one. I have just gone up to his lot to look it over and I find he could surrender the corner lot and get a rent reduction of \$32.56 per year, leaving him a lot with a frontage of 76 feet on the higher value street with a depth of 132 feet with a 16 ft. alley between his and the adjoining leasehold for an annual rent of \$32.43.

porting the 60% value of the house to be only \$600.00, probably less than half of the true 60% value. At the present on his assessment sheet there is an additional \$110.00 personal property value. All is taxable at a rate of \$3.10 a hundred, for a total tax of \$22.01 which we pay out of rent received. As I pointed out to Mr. Crippen recently, if he was a resident lessee and had his car here on the premises we would also be paying for him the ad valorem tax on the car at the same rate and these taxes run as high as \$24.00 a year on some new cars.

while I offer no support for OPA, based on Mr. Cripen's valuation of his property for assessment purposes he is not so badly off. He is allowed a rent of \$420.00 a year. Based on his assessed value, the full value of improvements and furnishings amounts to approximately \$1200.00; \$96.00 would give an 8% return on the investment, \$120.00 would provide for 10% depreciation on both building and furnishings \$50.00 would provide 5% for repairs and maintenance costs on the building, and \$65.00 covers the ground rent on both the lot for the house and the other lot.

During the period of which Mr. Crippen speaks added advantages given the location were paving of the street along the 142 feet of frontage and extension of the sanitary sewer system aside from the considerable population increase in the town and other public improvements benefitting the property indirectly.

Enough for Mr. Crippen. You will be interested to learn that all of our country lands are now under lease and that we will shortly need to further subdivide some of our larger tracts within the town to make more lots available. After the war it is quite probable there will be opportunities to acquire additional country land at deflated prices if we are in position to do so.

Our rent roll as of January 1, 1944 adds up to \$35,149,63, the highest it has ever been and it will also interest you to know that rent collections for the past several years have appreciably exceeded the amount of the rent charge indicating acredication in outstanding accounts and an improved economic status of our lessees.

Our corporation is in good financial position and we are laying by a back log for public works when labor and material are again available and there is no doubt that at that time there will be considerable private building. We have had no Federal housing here.

The continued success of Fairhope, new that most of the inspired and devoted founders have passed on is testimony to the soundness of the plan and should, in time, lead those who can to provide for the institution of political means by which others could adopt them.

Your name, as a Single Tax authority, has been given me by the Nelson's Loose Leaf Encyclopedia Research Department.

For some time I have owned single tax property in Fairhope, Alabama. I bought the house, an old but well maintained rather ramshackle four room and porch with electricity, sink and old fashioned bath room sewer arrangement connected only to a catch basin (which I later connected to a natural septic tank, and later, the town sewer). This I bought in February, 1933 (taxes paid in advance by owner).

The land was of one corner lot and one inside-on-an-alley-lot, each lot 66' x 142'. Land rent (99 year lease hold) in 1933 and 1934 \$53.22 a year.

In January, 1934 the house burned. I immediately rebuilt. Annual taxes (paid-in-advance land rent) from then on were/was as follows:

Perhaps I should explain th you that the spot I have chosen for the Redwood seedling I requested of you is the top of a hill on a present frontage of 324 feet and a depth of 23/feet. At present the spot is occupied by what was a magnificent hard maple, but a careless caretaker so wreckt it that the Davey tree experts have advised me to leave it until a better tree can supplant its majestic remains.

The spot is on that part of the Great Divide here whose Eastern waters shed into the St. Lawrence River bottom and whose Western slipes empty into the Mississippi River. The top of the slope is about 30 feet above the bottom of the hill, less than half a block away.

May I ask if you recommend planting this Red wood seedling at a point somewhat distant (but on the same site) to be transplanted to its permanent location when it has attained an height of, say, 10 to 12 feet.

I've had reports on the soil of this tract from the Agricultural experiment Station at Urbana, Illinois, and it has been accorded qualities "which can raise anything which can be grown in any part of Illinois".

Section 1. That within ten (10) days after written notice to them, all persons owning homes, business and other property in the Town of Fairhope requiring the disposal of sewerage are hereby required to apply to the Town Clerk for a permit and to make proper connection with the sewerage system of the Town of Fairhope for the disposal of sewerage; such permit shall be in words and figures substantially as follows: (See other side.)

Section 2. The specifications for

Section 2. The specifications for connecting with the sanitary sewerage system of the town are as follows:

- (a) All connections shall be made to existing house lines back of the curb or to a Y in the main line. The main line shall not be cut, except by special permission of the Town of Fairhope.
- (b) All pipe shall be of standard vitrified clay, or number one concrete, bell and spigot type not less than four inches in diameter, except where a single line serves two premises a minimum of six inch pipe shall be used.

(c) All joints shall be filled with cement mortar and packed with Jute filler to prevent infiltration.

(d) No dirt or other foreign substance shall be left in the sewer line.

(e) No line or connection shall be covered until inspected by the city and written acceptance thereof given, to be noted on original permit.

- (f) Where required, sand traps, grease traps, and other protective devices shall be installed by the property owner, subject to the appoval of the Town of Fairhope.
- (g) The Town shall not be responsible for grades used on house lines. It shall be the duty of the property owner to see that all lines are laid with sufficient fall to the main sewer to assure satisfactory operation.

Section 3. There shall be a charge of \$1.50 for each permit issued, which sum shall cover the cost of inspection and suitable adapter. The charges for sewer shall be included in the bill for water services, and no person shall be permitted to pay for water or sewer charges without paying for both.

Section 4. The following shall be the schedule of service charges:

- (a) A minimum of \$1.00 per month with a 50 per cent. discount. This discount to apply only on minimum rate unless the Government requires the Town to charge customers \$1.00 per month net, as outlined in Loan and Grant Application.
- (b) Average structure with bath-room, including toilet and lavatory, and kitchen sink will be subject to minimum rate. Additional fixtures will be charged for at rate of five (5) cents each, per month.
- (c) Charges to industrial concerns will be based on amount and character of sewerage for the pres-
