In September the class welcomed six new members, and nobody picked on Bart at the Gulf Picnic.


Everyone enjoyed October's Halloween party, especially after the fun house fell in!

March brought the Science Fair. Two of the four High School entries were Juniors.



Participation in school activities included assembly programs, field and festival events, fall and spring Gulf picnics and Halloween party.















