Everyone enjoyed October's Halloween party, especially after the fun house fell in!

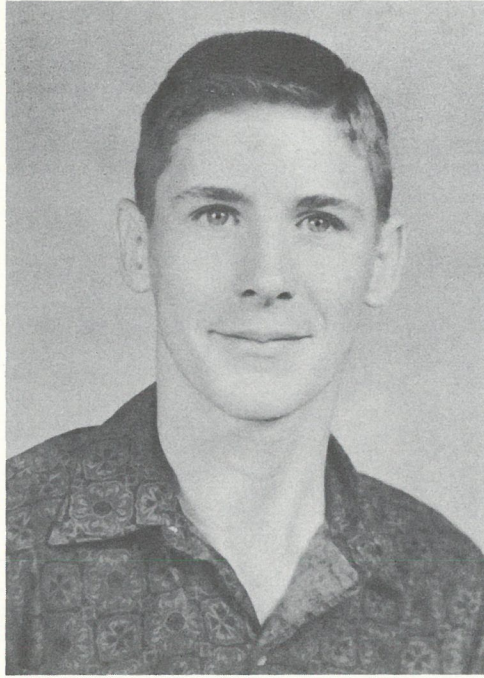
The Christmas party saw Fred Kinard star as, "The Littlest Angel".

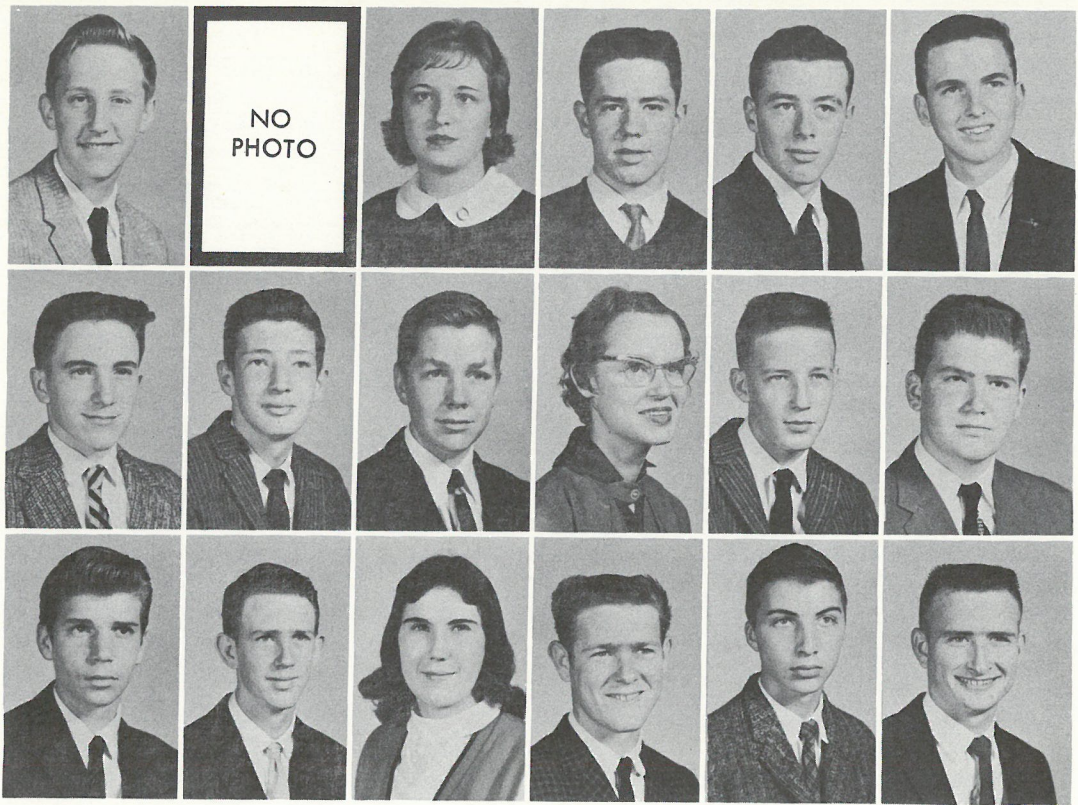

Sophomore activities for the 1960-61 year were many and varied. Reaction to the "block" system was enthusiastic and it was continued throughout the year.

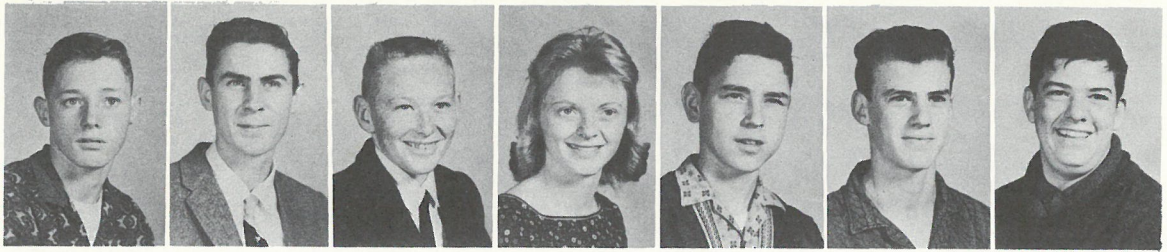
The Biology class made several field trips including a visit to Mr. Joseph Wells, to see his fossil collection and one to the Fish Hatchery in Mobile.

Participation in school activities included assembly programs, field and festival events, fall and spring Gulf picnics and Halloween party.

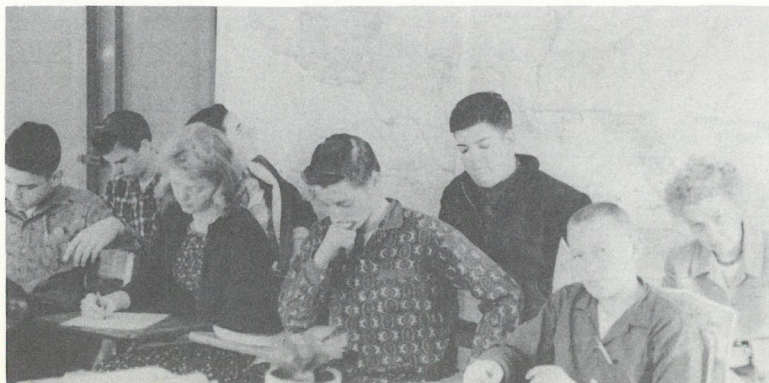




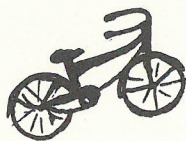
