FOREST HISTORY

With the establishment of the forest reserves in southern California, this portion of the state was covered with areas reserved for protection of watersheds. Fire suppression as a component of watershed protection was the primary objective for management of the southern California forest reserves. In order to carry out this policy it was necessary to staff the reserves. Forest supervisors were placed in charge of the reserves under the direction of B. F. Allen, the first Forest Superintendent. Each forest supervisor hired rangers to work under him.

The chronology for the establishment of the Los Padres National Forest began in 1898 when President William McKinley established the Pine Mountain and Zaca Lake Forest Reserves. Other administrative actions that affected the establishment of the Los Padres National Forest included: In 1899 the San Ynez Forest Reserve was created; in 1906 the San Luis Obispo, Monterey, and the Pinnacles Forest Reserves was created; and in 1907 the San Benito Forest Reserve was created.

In 1907 Forest Reserves changed to "National Forests". The consolidation of the Monterey, Pinnacles, and the San Benito Forest Reserves became the Monterey National Forest. In 1908 the consolidation of the Pine Mountain, Zaca Lake, Santa Ynez, and the San Luis Obispo Forest Reserves became the San Luis Obispo National Forest (and was then renamed the San Luis National Forest). In that same year, the San Luis National Forest was renamed the Santa Barbara National Forest. The Monterey and Santa Barbara National Forests showed a total of approximately 25 districts each patrolled by one "ranger". With several administrative actions during this time period these Forests became eleven ranger districts for the two National Forests.

In 1919, the Monterey and Santa Barbara National Forests merged into the Santa Barbara National Forest. In an Executive Order signed by President Franklin Roosevelt on December 3,1938 changed the name to Los Padres National Forest. It was named Los Padres National Forest because the Forest was situated near the area where the padres had performed their missionary work during the Hispanic Period.

District Rangers

Santa Barbara National Forest and Monterey National Forest

During the period of General Land Office administration and the first two or three years following the transfer of the Forest Service to the Department of Agriculture, there was a good deal of shifting and sorting of ranger personnel. The first detailed written report on the personnel of the old Santa Barbara National Forest was made by Supervisor Slosson in 1907

- There were ten full-time rangers on the Santa Barbara National Forest and Monterey National Forest. In 1925 over one-quarter million acres were transferred to the Angeles National Forest. At that time with additional administrative actions, seven ranger districts were established:
 - 1. Monterey Ranger District, headquarters at King City
 - 2. San Luis Ranger District, headquarters at San Luis Obispo;
 - 3. Santa Maria Ranger District, headquarters at Santa Maria;
 - 4. Santa Barbara Ranger District, headquarters at Los Prietos;
 - 5. Cuyama Ranger District, headquarters at the Cuyama Ranger Station;
 - 6. Ojai, headquarters at Ojai;
 - 7. Mt Pinos, headquarters at Chuchupate Ranger Station, Frazier Park

In 1972 a further reduction was carried out, with the combining of the San Luis and Santa Maria districts into the Santa Lucia Ranger District headquartered at Santa Maria, and the combining of the Cuyama District with the Mt Pinos District (retaining the latter name) headquartered at Frazier Park. These five ranger districts currently cover the area first administered with approximately 25 districts. Improved communications and transportation were the major reasons for the drastic reductions in numbers of ranger districts. The existing ranger districts today are as follows:
