to Lynnville Station. Josiah
Ashren went to Columbia.
I wrote to Sarah a book.
There is no news of
importance in camp
and we would fain
leave this miserable rebel
place -.

THURSDAY 14

Weather warm.
Josiah Ashren and
I went to Columbia
on the 10 o'clock train.
one of the brakemen
lost a splendid hat
about half mile below
Camp and on my way
back from town I got it.

FRIDAY 15

Weather warm.
Josiah Ashren went to
Lynnville Station on
business and returned.
Orders have come for
us to go to Chattanooga
by rail. This news with
joy for we are tired of
playing here.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 16, 1865.

Weather warm.
we packed up this
morning expecting to leave
but no wagon came so we
did not go. four colored sold-
iers came out from Columbia
to take charge of the grs
ashren and I went to
Columbia in the evening
and learned we would leave Monday.

SUNDAY 17

Weather warm
and rainy we took
the train at Columbia
for Chattanooga at
10.30. arrived at Hunt-
ville about dark
went to the hotel got
supper come back to
the depot and staid all
night.

MONDAY 18

Weather warm.
Left Huntville at
6.30 A.M. and arrived
at Chattanooga about
dark tired enough.
found the boys gener-
ally well and expect-
ing to leave soon for
Knoxville to be mus-
tered out of service.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 19, 1865.

Weather pleasant.
I went on Lookout Mountain today in company with William H. Vermillion of Co. D - and visited the Picture Gallery and the romantic little hamlet of Swinerville. had quite a pleasant time.

WEDNESDAY 20

Weather cloudy.
I returned at 10 o'clock today to see what was to be seen and to pass the time away. we expect to start here the 24th inst for Nashville to be mustered out of service.

THURSDAY 21

Weather good.
We turned our guns over today our papers are being made out we want every thing ready before we leave here so we won't be detained long for Nashville to muster it in.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1865.

Weather good.
There is no news of importance in camp we are impatient to get away from here for we haven't any particular love for the place. I don't feel very well today.

SATURDAY 23

Weather good.
no news and nothing talked of but our muster out of service. Chattanooga is a sickly place and filled to overflowing with negroes.

SUNDAY 24

Weather good.
we left Chattanooga at 2.20 P.M. for Nashville. It took two hours to take 9 companies. Companies A & F are at Nashville.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1865.

Weather good.
arrived at Nashville
at 8. A. M. and went
into the exchange Barracks.
I slept very little last
night on account of
being so crowded.

TUESDAY 26

Weather good.
we were mustered
out of service to day -
but have not received
our pay or discharge.
I took a walk over
the city to day.

WEDNESDAY 27

Weather good.
companies B and I were
paid and discharged
this P. M. and left
for home on the 6:45
evening train. I took
Boarding at the 3rd Michigan
House today. at 30 per
day. rather steep.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 28, 1865.

Weather good.
companies A and C
were paid and discharged.
This P. M. I don't know
when I will be paid
before long I hope.

FRIDAY 29

Weather good.
companies D and I
were paid and discharged.
This P. M. well I hope
we will have a chance
after a while.

SATURDAY 30

Weather cloudy with
some rain. companies
B and I were paid
and discharged this
P. M. and left for
home. in the evening
we won't be discharged
till Monday.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 1, 1865.

Weather good.
remained at my
boarding house nearly
all day. I have a
sore throat and don't
feel very well.

MONDAY 2

Weather good.
Companies G, H & I
were ~~discharged~~ today.
The Regiment is all
discharged now. we left
for home on the evening
train - we gave three
cheers on leaving Nashville.

TUESDAY 3

Weather good.
we arrived at Louisville
at daybreak was ferried
across the Ohio River took
breakfast at Jeffersonville
and took the train for Cincinnati
at 7:30 A.M. arrived at Cincinnati
at 2:30 P.M. and left at 4 P.M. for
Columbus arrived at the latter
place at 1 P.M. and staid overnight.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 4, 1865.

Weather cool and
clear. left for Newark
at 4 P.M. arrived
there at daybreak - took
breakfast and left for
home. stopped at Mr.
Geo. W. Vermillion's and
took dinner and arrived
home at 4 P.M.
home again &c

THURSDAY 5

Weather good.
I went to Newark
to the Fair - seen several
of my former comrades
and some of my friends
of the feminine gender.
I returned to Mr. G. W. Vermillion
and staid over night.

FRIDAY 6

Weather good.
I returned home this
morning - went to
grandmother's and
to Uncle Thos. Hazlett's.
all quiet on the
Palomae.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1865.

Weather good
I helped Father
husk corn today
I have been long since
since I left the boys
in blues hope I will
soon get to see some
of them.

SUNDAY 8

Weather cloudy
with a slight rain.
Some of the feminine
gender came here today
and remained over
night. Charlie R. and
John G. were also here
in the evening - we took
a promenade and then

MONDAY 9

Weather good.
I helped shovel in
wheat today had
a party at night
had a good time
did not go home
with any of the girls
however.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 10, 1865.

Weather good.
I went to the
Election this morning
and struck once more
for Justice and the
Union. Huzza for
Governor Cox and
the Union and down
with Treason and the
devil.

WEDNESDAY 11

Weather good.
I dug potatoes today.
I haven't heard from
the Election yet, but
we of course have
elected our Union men
as to J. W. Callmudge
of Columbus Ohio

THURSDAY 12

Weather good.
I went to Mr. G. W. Her-
millions in the evening
and played over night
with my friend William
B. Bernickson. heard that
our union candidate was
elected By 3 to 2 majority
Huzza for the Union.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 13, 1865.

Weather cool.
returned from Mr
Kermillion's this morning
and Sallie and I went
to uncle Fred Hazlett's
went to Claycock in
the evening and seen
— and returned
home after dark.

SATURDAY 14

Weather good.
I helped father husk
corn today. The weather
is considerable cooler
here than it was in
the sunny South.
all quiet on the Potomac
recd a letter from John & Brie
of Janesville Wisconsin.

SUNDAY 15

Weather cloudy
cool and fair. I seen
me and some ladies went
to see the new corner Mr.
Grattons in the A. M.
I went to singing at
Little Claycock Church
in the P. M. so note it

ville in the A. M.
and bought me a
pair of pants and boots
remained at home
in the P. M.

arrived at Dunkirk at
9 P. M. and staid over

found the folks in
pretty good health.
staid over night.

MONDAY 23

bargain with the man
and returned to Mr Bates
and staid over night.

TUESDAY 24

I went to Mr Houffs
this morning and from
there to North Washington
seen the man that I had
bought the land arranged
matters and returned to
Mr Houffs and staid over
night.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 25, 1865.

Weather good.
I went to Dunkirk.
This morning and took
the 10 A. M. train for
home. arrived at Newark
in the evening and walked
out home distance 11 miles
so note it be.

THURSDAY 26

Weather good
I remained about
home today. Father
returned this evening
from a trip with ware
I was glad to see
him as I always am.

FRIDAY 27

Weather cloudy
with some rain.
I went over to see
William H. Vermillion
in the A. M. and returned
no news of importance
all quiet on Redtop.
so note it be.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1865.

Weather cold and
disagreeable staid about
house. Cut stove wood
in the A. M. merely
how the wind blows
bad time to stand
guard right.

SUNDAY 29

Weather cool
I went to Mr Geo.
W. Vermillions in the
A. M. staid till two
o'clock P. M. and went
with Henry to singing
on Big Clay City and
from there home

MONDAY 30

Weather good
I remained at home
today. Father left with a
load of ware this morning
no news on Redtop of
importance.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 31, 1865.

Weather good.
I remained about
home nearly all day.
Father returned this
evening. There is no
news of importance.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 1

I went to Cambridge
Ohio to see one of my

horse and Buggy and

Emma was invited to a wedding
and accompanied her to the
same. returned to Mr Johnsons
and staid over night had a
very pleasant time. Found
people in old Guernsey Co.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1865.

I went to Cambridge
and took the train at
9:30 A.M. for Jamesville.
At Jamesville at 11 A.M.
for home arrived home
about 3 1/2 P.M. received
a letter from Mr Geo N.
Price an old comrade of
mine.

to see me he arrived home
from the army last night.

my horses performed
very well. All quiet
on the Potomac.

SATURDAY 2nd

Weather good.
I went to Mr Smith
and came back past
Mr. Vergillions. Henry
came home with me
and staid over night.
Pap came home today.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 3, 1865.

Weather pleasant
Ira Haylett and I went
to church at Little Clay-
lick at night and
returned all quiet
on the Rapidan.

MONDAY 4

with some rain.
Father Brother and I
went to Brownsville.
I got my horses shod
and bought a new
wagon of Mr. Davis for
\$100.

TUESDAY 5

All quiet on the Potomac.

after two loads of coal
got back at 1 1/2 P. M.

and rainy. went
to Brownsville to a sale.
Bought a nice carpet and
came home. Ira and I
went to church at 8 P. M. in
the evening - rode our
best horses.

FRIDAY 8

I remained at home
today. John Hindall
made an upper bed for
my wagon. no news
of import.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 9, 1865.

I went to Mr. G. W.
Vermillions in the A. M.

to church in the A. M.

at night dissolved partner-

left Mr G's for home

arrived home a little
while before dark.
drove thirty miles
Today. P. \$26.35

SATURDAY 16

I went to Claylick

quiet on the Rappahannock.

I went to Claylick
in the A.M. and in the
evening to the protracted meeting.

to a dance.

Weather cloudy
& d. rainy went
to B. in the evening
and was elected a mem-
ber of the Y. M. -
arrived home at 10 P.M.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 27, 1865.

Weather cloudy
I helped Father
haul hay today &
all quiet on the
left - or any other
man.

THURSDAY 28

Weather cloudy
and disagreeable.
I went to B. in
the A.M. with Ira.
helped Father set
some posts in the P.M.

FRIDAY 29

Weather good.
helped about some
work in the A.M.
went to get a pair
of boots made in
the P.M.

Weather good.
Went to Mr. George B.
Berrilliams in the evening
and staid a short time
and returned home.
no news of importance

SUNDAY 31

Weather good.
Ara and I went to
Big claylick in the evening
But there being no meeting
we returned home via
Little claylick, waxed a
little. This is the last day
of 1865 yes the eventful
year of 1865 has very near
rolled into sternity. one
year ago today I was on the
Tennessee river. we were then
engaged in civil war today
how changed - peace - bright
winged, peace, has returned
to bless us with her smile.
but all's not peaceful feel,
a void within my heart that
this world cannot fill.
miserable sinner am I.

The 1st day of 1865
dawned Beautiful...
It found me on the
Tennessee River opposite Decatur
Alabama. Whither I had gone
in company with about 240
others of my Regiment
(The 1st & 3rd Engineers)
to erect a Pontoon Bridge
across the Tennessee.

we disembarked sometime
in the A.M. and erected
quarters about 50 yards
from the river.
in the P.M. we commenced
working at the Bridge
I with several others worked
in a swampy canebrake.
cutting poles to lash the boats together.
on the 2nd we were
mustered for pay and
worked at the Bridge
until 9 P.M. and would
have completed it had
we not fell short of
Boats.

on the 3rd we finished
the Bridge by putting
in two ties.

Sunday Feb 26th
finds me on
South Chickamauga
we have had a
great deal of rain
during the last week
which has raised
the creek very high
The mud is very
deep I was on guard
last night.

See mistake of the
capture of Fort Fisher
January 15th It was
captured the 13th but I
did not learn it till
the 22nd.

March 15th 1863

I am 21 years old
today.

It finds me near
Columbia Tennessee
whither I had gone
with my Co. to build
Block houses

April 12th

It is a rainy day
The river is rising.
No 12 Bridge is gone
No 11 is partly washed
away. no news to day
& importance

June 23rd - 63-
 Orders came to day
 to prepare for the
 mustering out of the 62nd
 men belonging to this
 Co. The boys are in
 good spirits they expect
 to leave for Nashville
 the 28th

August 22nd 63-
 Yes who wouldn't be
 a soldier although we
 are far from those that
 we love and have no oppor-
 tunity of seeing our sweethearts
 (that's the word I believe) yet we
 can be as gay as the gayest -
 a soldier's life is a peculiar
 way of living he leaves home
 perhaps for the first time in
 life and goes out among
 strangers soon becomes acquainted
 with those around him and
 happy is he if he has been so
 lucky as to form the acquaintance
 of the moral and religious
 instead of the immoral and
 profane, he will find many
 very many (I am sorry to say)
 of this class well, is, it

I say if he forms the
 acquaintance of moral and
 religious for they can help and
 comfort him in trouble and
 sorrow

Sept 12 - an order in to days
 paper from Maj Genl Thomas
 relieving all white volunteers
 at Nashville of duty and ordering
 them to resign. Their requests for
 removal out of service immediately
 the military conducted on
 the rail roads also relieved.

Nov 7th 1863-
 Yes I have again left home
 to go out among strangers
 shall I ever return
 I hope so. I shall put
 my trust in the ruler
 of the universe for my safety
 and endeavor by his
 help to live sober and deal
 honestly with all men.
 If I do this I will find
 friends where ever I go.

Mon. January 1st 1866

Weather good.
Frat. Sparks Ira Haggett
and I went to B. and
returned in the evening
and had a party. had
a good time.

Tues 2nd

Weather good.
Father and I loaded
ware at B. Today. I
attended a Festival at the
Greenmason Lodge in the
evening.

Wed 3rd

Weather good.
Started this morning with
our ware, drove to Mr.
Dickersons one mile east
of Reynoldsburg and
staid over night.

Thurs. Weather cold.
Drove to Shadsville 6
miles south of Columbus
and staid over night - one
of Father's horses very
sick.

Fri 5th Weather cold

I drove 2 1/2 miles to Lockburn
and unloaded and left
for home pap sold out

two miles from Shadsville
on another road we drove
to Mr. Dickersons and staid
over night.

Sat 6th

Weather cool.
we left Mr D. this
morning for home and
arrived about dark at
the latter place p. 81350.

Sun 7th

Weather cold.
Ira and I went to
Little claylick to church
in the evening. all hunky.

Mon 8th

Weather cold.
I went to Grandmother
Haggett's after corn. Ira
came down in the evening
and I went home with
him and staid over night

Tues 9th

Weather cold.
Ira and I got Mr. Hindall
uncle Thos. Haggett and
pap cut and hauled
wood for Grandmother
in the A. M.

Wed 10th

Weather cloudy
and misty I went to
Lones after a pair of boots
but failed to get them.
George Hindall was seriously
hurt today.

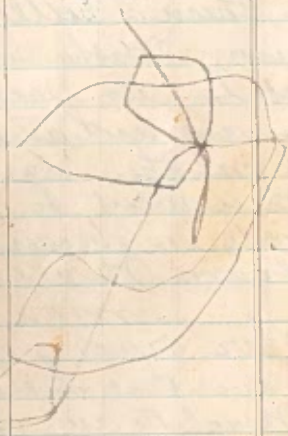
