## MONROVIA BAPTIST CHURCH

The Monrovia Baptist Church, costing about \$5,000, is about completed, so far as the present is concerned. The entire building will not be finished up now, but when necessity demands the remaining portion will be completed. The length of the structure is 74 feet having a studio in the rear 12x13 feet, a class room at the east side 28x16, a lecture room under the front 28x16, and two vestibules, one under the tower at the northeast corner, and the other at the northwest corner. The baptistery is under the pulpit platform. The lecture and class rooms can be opened up by the partitions dropping, which will then give a seating capacity of about four hundred. The seats will be in circular form, the main body of the church having two aisles, one from either vestibule. The church has a very neat and comfortable appearance. The windows are of stained glass. Mr. Young of Los Angeles is the architect, and H. Kronick the contractor. The Baptists of Monrovia are to be congratulated.
