THE ECLIPSE

The total eclipse of the moon Sunday night was plainly visible here throughout its duration. At the appointed time the shadow appeared across the lower half of the moon. The shadow gradually grew until the brilliant light of the moon was entirely obscured and in its place a brownish-red bail east a ghastly light over the earth. The scene was an impressive one and will be long remembered by those who saw it.

The eclipse was total throughout North and South America and parts of Europe and Africa. It was caused as is generally know by the moon falling within the shadow made by the earth. Anywhere else but in our clear atmosphere the shadow would be dense enough to totally obscure the moon, but here it was visible throughout the eclipse, but of a coppery hue.
