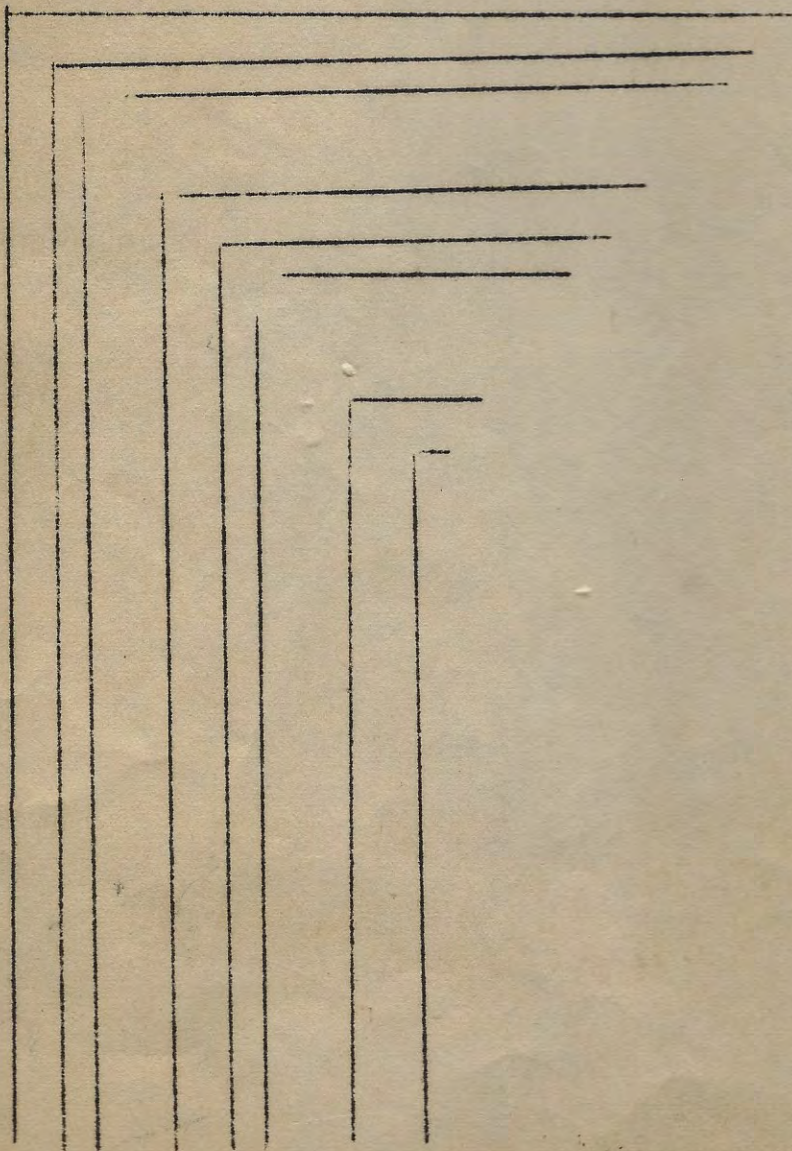

The following letter was written
in Mr. Brick's room in connection
with the Donner party's migration
to California in 1846. Each boy or
girl wrote a letter to some Eastern
friend telling of an imaginary ad-
venture he or she had on the way.
This one, written by Mary Ann Cham-
ness, was chosen as the best in the
group.

Enroute to California
Oct. 17, 1846

Dear Aunt Grace,

It has been dreadfully hot
crossing the desert. The other
night the wind blew frightfully
hard and then the sand began to
blow too.

Some Indians saw our fire.
They seemed to be very friendly
but Pa got his shotgun anyway.
It turned out that they just
wanted to get some food, for they
